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Gratitude—the Heart of Discipleship

We have been called by name. Our God, through Jesus, the Son, has embraced us, and desires to enter into friendship with us, a friendship that is a deep, intimate relationship that lasts for eternity:

I no longer call you slaves, because a slave does not know what his master is doing. I have called you friends, because I have told you everything I have heard from my Father.
