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At this time in the history of our global village, it is more important than ever that people of good will come together, rise above differences, rejoice in diversity, seek and celebrate that which we have in common.

Religion should bring people together, not keep us apart.

Unfortunately, today there are people of all religions who are making choices that desire to not only keep us apart, but are choosing to use their religion as a weapon to destroy others whose faith is lived differently than theirs.
