The Sacrament of Reconciliation—
God's Unconditional Love for Us!
Sunday, March 2, at 4:00pm—Will You Be There?

In recent years, a name change has taken place with the "Sacrament of Confession." We no longer call the act "Confession," but rather "Reconciliation" and/or "Penance."

This name change better reflects what happens in this celebration. We do not go to the priest just to list our sins, have them forgiven, and receive a penance; but rather, and most importantly, we come to the priest to celebrate the forgiveness of God that we experience in our lives. We come to the Sacrament with a sense of joy for what God has already done in our lives and what God continues to do—showering us with unconditional love.

The verbalization of our sins, the verbalization of the words of absolution, and the acceptance of a penance are steps in the process of celebrating God's forgiveness and unconditional love for us.

If we are open to God's love, we begin to experience the many ways in which God forgives us our sins in the daily occurrences of our lives.

When we ask forgiveness from someone we have offended, our sins are forgiven. When we accept the forgiveness of another, our sins are forgiven. Each time we talk to God in the silence of our hearts and sincerely seek forgiveness from God, our sins are forgiven. Each time we celebrate the Eucharist, we hear the words of the priest shortly before the reception of Holy Communion—"Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world! Happy are we! We are called to His supper!"—our sins are forgiven.

So why go to the priest? We do so in order to celebrate the forgiveness of God we experience in our daily lives, to ritualize it, sacramentalize it and, as in all things, to place our lives and God's involvement in our lives within the context of the Church, the Body of Christ.

The priest "stands in" for the community. As we verbalize our sins, we are mindful that there is no such thing as a personal sin. Our sins, no matter how personal we may think them to be, affect others—"No Man Is an Island." We live in community. Our lives always touch the lives of others.

Telling our sins, hearing ours sins from our own lips, helps us to be real and to acknowledge our weakness and our dependence upon God. It is so easy to rationalize our sinfulness when we talk to ourselves "in our heads." It is an entirely different experience when we hear ourselves verbalize our sinfulness. Those sins become much more real! We become much more aware and sensitive of our responsibilities to others.

The priest "stands in" for Christ. Hearing the words of absolution, the forgiveness of God, from the lips of the priest is indeed comforting. You know how wonderful it feels when a family member or friend says, "I love you!" In the Sacrament of Reconciliation we allow God to say those words to us in and through the person of the priest.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is not something to be feared but to be celebrated with trust and confidence because of God's unconditional love for us.

On Sunday, March 2, at 4:00pm, our Parish celebrates her Lenten Communal Penance Service. Many priest/confessors will be available for you. They will be in Church waiting for you so that through the words of absolution God will once again say to you:

"I forgive you and I love you unconditionally!"



St. Paul's Letter To The Romans

Starting March 12, 9:00am and March 13, 7:00pm

The letter to the church at Rome is unquestionably the most important of Paul's letters and "is to many the most important text in the New Testament itself."

The church of Rome was not founded by Paul as the churches of Galatia, Philippi, and Corinth to mention a few, but this lengthy letter to Romans is one of seven undisputed letters of Paul's.

From the reading of commentaries of Roman historians, we learn that in AD 49, Claudius expelled the Jews from Rome because of a disturbance which they believed was instigated by certain Christians. The Acts of Apostles 18:2 claims that the Jewish Christian Aquila and his wife, Priscilla, were among the expelled Jews.

Why did Paul write his letter to the Romans? Some scholars have used this historical knowledge to suggest there was tension between "the weak and the strong over food matters" (Rom 14:1-15:13). "The strong" represented the Gentile Christian majority, and "the weak" represented the Jewish Christian minority. Paul was concerned with Jews and Gentiles in the letter as a whole. In Romans 1:12, Paul wishes to impart to the Roman Christians some spiritual gift to strengthen them, that "we may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith, both yours and mine." In this climate, Paul produced his characteristic doctrine of "Justification by faith:" Faith is fundamental to salvation; it cannot be achieved by "works of Law;" it is accessible only through one act, the act of faith.


Other scholars believe that the letter was not intended to be read only by Christians of Rome. A widely accepted suggestion is that Romans is "Paul's last will and testament." What did Paul actually want to say in defense of himself in Jerusalem? Did it contain a summary of his views that he had developed? "The most important themes and thoughts of Pauline message and theology" from his conflicts with the Jerusalem church? In studying the "most important Letter," we hope we can come to know the author's purpose "to clarify, and abridge, defend his thesis, and recount history."

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

There is something in us that moves us to visit the scene where an important event occurred. Visitors flock to the Ford Theater to stand where President Lincoln was assassinated; mourners visit the site of the Oklahoma City bombing; Elvis admirers tour Graceland. So it was for the early Christians who greatly desired to journey to Jerusalem and to see with their own eyes the places where Jesus lived, suffered and died. The traditional sites of the Lord's passion soon became popular stopping places; even today the Via Dolorosa is included in most pilgrims' itineraries.

Because not everyone was able to visit Jerusalem, pilgrims brought back stories and images of what they had seen for those who remained at home. Eventually shrines that focused on the passion and death of the Lord appeared all over Europe. In the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries, increased emphasis on the suffering of the Messiah, coupled with the fervor of the Franciscan friars, led to widespread acceptance of a devotion that traced the footsteps of Jesus from his trial to his tomb.


But it was more than curiosity that caused this devotion to flourish. Prayers that emphasized Jesus' obedience unto death, sorrow for sin, and God's abiding love and mercy were at the heart of it. Although the reforms of the Second Vatican Council placed greater emphasis on the Sunday Mass, the stations of the cross are still a valuable resource for prayer, especially during Lent, with its twofold emphasis on baptismal renewal and penitential acts.

Essential to this devotion, whether prayed by an individual or a group, is meditation on the passion of the Lord in spoken and sung prayer, and movement from one station to the next. Ideally, everyone walks in procession to each station, uniting ourselves in our bodies to the Lord's passion and death.

The number of stations has varied widely over the centuries. Recent revisions have omitted stations not included in the scriptures, and added stations that are, such as Jesus praying in the Garden of Olives, the denial of Jesus by Peter and Jesus' promise to the good thief. Frequently, a fifteenth station depicting the resurrection of Jesus is added to illustrate the fullness of the paschal mystery.



"I don't feel brave talking about Jesus with friends, and sometimes I even get embarrassed.

Is it really that important to talk to people about my faith?"



- "It's hard to talk about Jesus when you don't know how. A great starting point is to show your friends Jesus' love serve them, care for them, be a great example of Jesus to them. When you keep consistency in your life, an opportunity will come for you to answer your friends' questions about why you act differently than others." ~ Lori Valenzisi
- "We talk about things that are important to us, but we don't go around thinking, for example, I must find a place to stick skateboarding into this conversation. I must! Right now! Instead when everyone is talking about sports, you talk about skateboarding. The same with Jesus! The person brings up a subject or a question that lets you know she or he wants to talk about spiritual things. Pray that Jesus will put you into conversations where it is natural and easy to talk about him." ~ Marlene LeFever
- "Usually when we're embarrassed about Jesus, it's because we think we have to do something 'out there' like preaching them a sermon. Instead, just live like Jesus. Be kind to someone everyone picks on, help a friend with homework, or listen to a friend who's struggling with parents."~ John Trent
- "We put a lot of pressure on kids when we're emphatic about telling them they need to talk about Jesus to their friends. It's more important to teach kids about living like Jesus as an example to friends. " ~ Ivy Beckwith

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

Discipline begins with small things done daily.

St. Paul tells us to "Bear your share of the hardship for the Gospel," in today's second reading. Being good Christian stewards is not easy. Temptations and hardships abound...

We have probably all heard that "no one promised us a rose garden," or "no one promised us that life would be fair—or easy."

Maybe we heard those words on a day when we were having a little pity party. Those are bound to happen from time to time, and that is fine as long as we don't get too caught up in them.

Mark Twain once said: "The secret of getting ahead is getting started. The secret of getting started is breaking complex tasks into small manageable tasks, and then starting on the first one."

That's good advice, whether you want to finish a short-term, medium or long-term project. Don't try to tackle everything all at once. Small steps work well and keep details where they belong.

Knowing God doesn't happen overnight either. This takes a lifetime and gets better with time. It works very well when started with one small task, such as reading scripture for 10-15 minutes a day. When this is repeated over and over, life only gets better.

If there is a worthwhile goal at stake (such as getting to know God better) the discipline is not nearly as daunting. We are human and therefore fall off our wagons, so to speak, more often than we like. Stay faithful and get right back on track. God knows and loves us, and is always there for us. Remember small steps!

Recently a fellow parishioner and friend shared something with me that bears repeating. The main point was a saying from a family that makes a lot of sense, especially during Lent. It is about simply wishing one another "enough" during our lifetime.

- ♦ I wish you enough sun to keep your attitude bright no matter how gray the day may appear.
- I wish you enough rain to appreciate the sun even more.
- ♦ I wish you enough happiness to keep your spirit alive and everlasting.
- I wish you enough pain so that even the smallest of joys in life may appear bigger.
- ♦ I wish you enough loss to appreciate all that you possess.
- ♦ I wish you enough hellos to get you through the final goodbye.
- I wish you enough discipline to make and keep God the main priority in your life.


