Centering Prayer Introductory Workshop

Saturday, May 3 ■ 8:30am-3:00pm

We may think of prayer as thoughts or feelings expressed in words. But this is only one expression. In the Christian tradition, Contemplative Prayer is considered to be the pure gift of God. It is the opening of mind and heart—our whole being—to God, the Ultimate Mystery, beyond thoughts, words, and emotions. Through grace we open our awareness to God whom we know by faith is within us, closer than breathing, closer than thinking, closer than choosing—closer than consciousness itself.

Centering Prayer is a method designed to facilitate the development of Contemplative Prayer by preparing our faculties to receive this gift. It is an attempt to present the teaching of earlier times in an updated form. Centering Prayer is not meant to replace other kinds of prayer; rather it casts a new light and depth of meaning on them. It is at the same time a relationship with God and a discipline to foster that relationship. This method of prayer is a movement beyond conversation with Christ to communion with Him.

DIVIDED BUT UNDIMMED

On Easter eve, when we gave thanks and praise to God for the large Easter candle that continues to shine in this most happy season of Easter, we heard the minister sing in that long and beautiful prayer called the *Exultet*:

Accept this Easter candle, a flame divided but undimmed, a pillar of fire that glows to the honor of God.

Just before the prayer began, we shared the light of the candle, each to each, among all who are baptized. Whenever we share the flame of a candle, one to another, the flame is divided among us. Now usually when we divide something up, it means that what was once a large portion is now several smaller individual portions. But notice what happens with the flame. It does get divided into many individual flames, but the overall effect, the light, actually grows and is brighter. The whole church was lit up on Easter eve just by the light of candles! (And so was the room!)

This is how it is with Christ. This is how it is with the Eucharist. We break the bread that is Christ's body. We pour out into cups the wine that is Christ's blood. What was one loaf becomes many pieces. What was one cup becomes many sips. But the overall effect, the mystical body of Christ, this assembly, this church, actually grows stronger, bigger, more loving. Light of Christ! Thanks be to God!

The Jewish Observance: Yom hashoah holocaust Remembrance Day

The full name of the day commemorating the victims of the Holocaust is "Yom Hashoah Ve-Hagevurah"—literally the "Day of (remembrance of) the Holocaust and the Heroism." It is marked on the 27th day in the month of *Nisan*—a week after the seventh day of Passover, this year, on May 1. It marks the anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto uprising.

Since the early 1960s, the sound of a siren on Yom Hashoah stops traffic and

pedestrians throughout the State of Israel for two minutes of silent devotion. The siren blows at sundown and once again at 11:00am on this date. There is no public entertainment on Yom Hashoah, as theaters, cinemas, pubs, and other public venues are closed throughout Israel.

Jews in North America observe Yom Hashoah within the synagogue as well as in the broader Jewish community. Commemorations range from synagogue services to communal vigils and educational programs. Some communities choose to emphasize the depth of loss that Jews experienced in the Holocaust by reading the names of Holocaust victims one after another—dramatizing the unfathomable notion of six million deaths.

Rituals associated with Yom Hashoah are still being created and vary widely among synagogues. One suggestion is that every Jewish home should light a yahrzeit (memorial) candle on this day.

While Yom Hashoah rituals are still in flux there is no question that this day holds

great meaning for Jews worldwide. The overwhelming theme that runs through all observances is the importance of remembering—recalling the victims of this catastrophe, and insuring that such a tragedy never happen again. The Shoah (Holocaust) posed an enormous challenge to Judaism and raised many questions: Can one be a believing Jew after the Holocaust? Where was God? How can one have faith in humanity? Facing this recent event in history, does it really matter if one practices Judaism? Jewish theologians and laity have struggled with these questions for decades. The very fact that Jews still identify Jewishly, practice their religion, and have embraced the observance of Yom Hashoah answers some of the questions raised by the Holocaust.



Charge It?

Many of us own our homes and cars on credit. When we make a purchase, we invariably say "Charge it." Unless we are extremely fortunate we really don't own much, but rather we owe a lot, or have the loan of something until it is paid in full.

In a similar sense, whatever we have of the goods of this world, we have on loan from God. We can't take them with us. We are stewards of the time, talents and treasures loaned to us and we do eventually have to render an accounting.

There is little doubt that we try to be "good and faithful" servants, but it is a difficult thing to part with what we think is ours.

The temptation of a token return is strong, especially in this day and age. It takes prayer, courage and fortitude to measure up to our responsibility and to our opportunity. There should be consistent and meaningful stewardship of what God has given us; sharing those things with others to improve their time on Earth.

This is the common work on which religion, education and charity is based. Responsible Christian Stewardship is a very important aspect of our relationship with God and with one another.

We are called to keep God's commandments. Jesus makes this very clear in today's Gospel. Does your lifestyle reveal your desire to share what you have been given by God?

The fact is that God doesn't need your money, time or talents. The other fact is that there are many on this earth who do need assistance, and God expects each of us to use our gifts to help where help is needed.

Giving our resources should not be done out of guilt, and should not be our leftovers. Rather, God wants our giving to be a natural expression of our love of God and of others.

"If you are really eager to give, it isn't important how much you are able to give. God wants you to give what you have, not what you don't have."

—2 Corinthians 8:12

April 29 is the feast day of St. Catherine of Siena, patroness of Italy. St. Catherine died at the age of 33 years (the same as Jesus) but exemplified Christian Stewardship during her lifetime. She was especially attentive to Jesus' teaching in the Sermon on the Mount: "Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God."

Her dedication to prayer and devotion in helping the sick and the poor prompted other people to respond in kind. Even though she did not have a formal education and was the twenty-third child of a merchant, St. Catherine realized that she could share the gifts she had been given.


She took care of people with illnesses in their homes and in hospitals. She found creative ways to help relieve the suffering of many who had little or nothing to sustain themselves. The model of Christian Stewardship set by St. Catherine in the 14th century, remains something for us to emulate to this day!




