Painting Project Was Huge Success

More's Workers teamed with the Knights of Columbus and other STM parishioners to complete a major painting project last Saturday. Over 40 volunteers painted the interior of six apartments in Escondido for Interfaith Community Services (ICS). These six units will be ready to house the needy by early August. Our volunteers did caulking and touch-up painting in another four apartments, which will



be occupied by homeless seniors beginning this week. In addition to painting, team members pitched in to move new furniture into the seniors' apartments.

During lunch several of the mothers living in the apartments shared their stories of how ICS has helped them turn their lives around. They have gone from a life of homelessness, alcoholism, and drug abuse to a stable life thanks to housing, counseling and encouragement provided by ICS. All three of these mothers are attending a local college. Our tired bodies and sagging spirits got a big boost from these heartwarming stories.

Little Rock Bible Studies:

Working in the Desert: Amos, Hosea and Micah

The books of Hosea, Amos and, Micah are three books of the Book of the Twelve, which is a collection of various shorter prophetic books that have frequently been called the Minor Prophets. The term "minor" refers to the length of composition, in comparison to those of Major Prophets; for example, Isaiah.

The prophetic books are not easy to read. The prophets were for the most part activists rather than authors, more engaged in preaching than in the activity of writing. "By prophecy, we understand not specifically or even principally the forecasting of the future—but rather the mediation and interpretation of the divine mind and will."

This series will begin on Wednesday, September 10, at 9:00am or Thursday, September 11, at 7:00pm.

Instead, the faith community believes that a budget is a moral document that reflects the values and priorities of a society, and we call on our legislature to remember the following values when as they make difficult decisions: reason, compassion, fairness, responsible investment, and stewardship.

A PLACE TO STAND

Each of the five Sundays of August hinges upon one question: "Who do you say that I am?" This question, put to Simon by Jesus, is also posed to us (Aug. 24). This question supersedes every other question in its significance. And the answer to this question defines who we are in relation to God and to one another—not just for today, but for all our tomorrows; and not just in some instances, but in every word we say and in every work we do.

In a flash of divinely ignited insight, Simon's response identified Jesus as the Christ, the Son of the living God. This insight was affirmed by the actions of Jesus, who, like God, fed the multitudes who had followed him to a deserted place (Aug. 3), exercised power over the stormy sea (Aug. 10), healed foreigners (Aug. 17), welcomed all without regard to gender, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, or spiritual worthiness (Aug. 24), and revealed the depths of God's love for humankind, in that he was willing to become one with us in all things but sin (Aug. 31).

Jesus' question to Simon is ours to answer. With Simon, we declare, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." These are life-changing words that take their inspiration from an abiding relationship with Jesus.

But Simon's proclamation of Jesus as Christ and Son of the living God represents only half of the equation. Jesus, in turn, identified Simon as "rock." This designation meant that Simon and all who stand with him to proclaim faith in Jesus are part of the edifice of living stones of which Jesus is the cornerstone.

As rock, Peter and company are to offer solid shelter against the hostile and turbulent tides that threaten faith and hope. As rock, believers are to be a foundation on which to build rather than a stumbling block that fails to edify. As rock, Peter and all other followers of Jesus become architects of healing, growth and transformation in a broken world.

For another way of understanding the role of believers in the world, we turn to the Greek mathematician Archimedes of Syracuse (287-211 BCE). Referring to the power of a simple machine—lever and fulcrum—to achieve significant results, Archimedes once said, "Give me a place to stand and I will move the world."

In Jesus, and with Peter, Paul, Mary, Martha, Lydia, Timothy, Phoebe, et al., God has made of us a rock and given us a place to stand.

In the midst of change we seek the transforming power of the Holy Spirit to become "one body, one Spirit in Christ." We sing our prayer for the renewing Spirit of Christ to open our eyes to the rich diversity among us and to strengthen our hearts to serve others.


This will be a time of renewal for me, a chance to hear some of the great minds of our time exploring what it means to be Church: "One body, one spirit in Christ." (This phrase comes from the third Eucharistic Prayer in the *Sacramentary*, the big red book Father uses during Mass.)

In so many ways, the Church is in a time of transition, and these days will be an opportunity for me to explore where the Church has been, to envision where we are heading, and to find practical help for the issues that cross my desk each week.

I look forward to talks about "authentic worship," "exploring the mystery," "prophetic and poetic leadership," and "liturgy and life"—whatever these clever catch phrases may mean. I look forward to gathering to hear concerts in the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels and to participate in evening prayer surrounded by candlelight and icons.

The Church today is a sacred mixture of yesterday and tomorrow, of familiar and unknown, of chant and rock and roll. Our merging of these divergent realities will shape our identity as Christians, globally and here at St. Thomas More.

Please pray this week for all of these thousands of musicians as the Spirit guides us through these days of exploration and nourishment.

Coming Soon for 2008-2009

Dear Parents,

Do you have a child between the ages of 3 and 17 attending public school?

St. Thomas More Parish would like to enter into a partnership with you in the religious education of your child. We call it a "partnership" because we do not want to take over the responsibility of educating your child in the Catholic faith, but we do want to be a support and resource for you, as you fulfill the commitment you made when your child was baptized.



Daily living of our Catholic faith definitely takes place in the home and neighborhood within the context of the family. A systematic approach to the teachings of our faith, as outlined in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, and a sharing in the riches and tradition of our Church, are sometimes a little more challenging for parents to undertake effectively along with all other parental responsibilities.

RE.A.CH (Religious Education for Adolescents & Children) classes begin in September, but we really want to get everyone registered <u>now</u> so that we can have enough catechists available. Classes fill on a first come, first serve basis.

Our programs meet two times a month, September through May, at the following times:

Ages 3, 4 & 5:

2 Sundays a month during the 10:30am Mass

Grades 1-8:

2 Sundays a month, 12:30-2:00pm

Grades 1-8 (2nd option):

2 Sundays a month, 5:00-6:30pm

High School:

Modular schedule on Sundays: 6:30-8:30pm




Fr. Mike (and friends): BOOKIES!

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP How Will You Invest Your Life?

Every human being alive knows at least two things that are absolutely certain: one is that they are going to die, and the other is that they are not dead yet.

And the space between those two points: between the NOW of being alive, and the THEN of not being alive, is filled with infinite importance. Now is our interval of time, and every one of us must be deciding what to do with it.

We all have 24 hours a day of time. The differences come in our Christian stewardship . . .what we do with this vital dimension of our being. The question for all of us never really is "Do I have time?" but "What do I have time for?"

A common view of time is the idea that "my time is my own." Time is the most personal of all possessions, and who, but me, could be in charge of it? It is nobody's business but my own what I do with my time!

But this attitude denies the Christian insight that time is life, and life is God's fundamental gift to his children—a gift that deserves not only the response of gratitude, but of a responsible use of what we've been given.
