MUSLIM

This concept of accountability is once again well-illustrated by the rule of Caliph Umar. In a well-known incident from his life, the government issued to each of its citizens, as a type of rebate, a certain length of cloth. During prayers, one of the citizens noticed that the robe which Umar wore was longer than could be made from this single piece of cloth. The man stood up and demanded to know from whence Umar had obtained the extra cloth, since each citizen should have an equal share.

Umar responded by pointing at his son, who stood up and declared "I gave to my father half of my share, as his was insufficient to make a robe." This was because Umar was taller than average man, and hence needed more cloth. However, he did not feel at any liberty to issue for himself even a slightly longer length of than was issued to each and every citizen, and relied instead on the charity of his son.

WHY MUSIC?

I view the world from a particular perspective, as a musician and as a music minister and educator. So here are a few words from my particular soapbox.

As the school year commences, it is time to look ahead to our future—our own, and that of our children and grandchildren. Elementary and high schools have changed from when I grew up, and I imagine that you have experienced this change too.

At many school sites, my colleagues in music departments are constantly being reminded that, "Electives must support the CORE Curriculum," and that their role is to assist the school in raising the ever-important test scores. Yes, this is important, but what they do is so much more than that! Music teachers impart to students life-changing lessons that they will not receive anywhere else. As do we who teach in the church.

Why should young people make music? Music is language.

Music is the expressive word, which requires singers to understand more than just words on the page. They must bring to life the author's point of view, understand idioms, analogies, metaphors, and similes. They must infer and use figurative language. Music requires students to compare and contrast musical form as well as textual composition.

They must analyze and respond to text. Music challenges students to critique both themselves and others in oral, choral, and written presentations.

Music is science.

Music is exact, specific; and it demands exact acoustics. A singer's sheet music is a chart, a graph which indicates frequencies, intensities, volume changes, melody, and harmony all at once, and with the most exact control of time.

Music is math.

Music is rhythmically based on the subdivisions of time into fractions which must be done instantaneously, not worked out on paper, and often in multiple combinations simultaneously.

Music is foreign language.

Most of music's terms are in Italian, German, or French; and the notation is certainly not English, but a highly developed kind of shorthand that uses symbols to represent ideas. The semantics of music is the most complete and universal of languages.

Music is history.

Music usually reflects the environment and times of its creation, and often even the country and/or racial feelings therein. Music tells us of our past and intuits our future.

Music is physical education.

Music requires fantastic coordination of fingers, hands arms, lip, cheek, and facial muscles, in addition to extraordinary control of the diaphragm, back, stomach, and chest muscles, which must respond instantly to the sound the ear hears and the mind interprets.

Music develops insight.

In music, patterns are analyzed, similarities and differences are identified, and style and period characteristics are observed.

Music is all these things...and more! But mostly, music is art.

Music allows a human being to take all these dry, technically boring (but difficult) techniques, and use them to create emotion. This is something that science cannot duplicate: humanism, feeling, emotion—call it what you will. Young people should study music not because we expect them to major in it though some of them will, not because they will sing or play music all of their lives—though many of them will—and not only so they can relax and have fun—although most of them will.

Young people should study music so that they will be HUMAN, so that they will recognize beauty, be sensitive, have something to retain for enrichment forever, have more love, more compassion, more gentleness, in short—more LIFE!

Of what value will it be to our young people to make a prosperous living unless they know how to live!

As the music ministry year begins (the school year, too!), consider music-making—for your children, for your grandchildren, for yourself, for your school, for your God. All are welcome here!

LIVE BETTER... MAKE MUSIC!

A cry from deep within our being, music is a way for God to lead us to the realm of higher things.

As St. Augustine says, "Singing is for the one who loves."

Music is therefore a sign of God's love for us and of our love for him.



The following piece was submitted by someone who knows how it feels to be on the receiving end of many helping hands:

When we read, watch, or listen to the daily news broadcasts we are bombarded by their seeming obsession with negative news. Stories about war, crime, motor vehicle accidents, economic crises, substance abuse, and loss of human lives due to an abundance of violence can have a numbing effect on us.

The temptation to descend into a slow-motion cynicism appears all too great. However, it is especially during these times that we should be mindful of the positive events that take place in the world every day; those events large and small that won't get the media's attention, but are important to understanding God's love in the world.

These events are enacted daily by Christian stewards: God's ambassadors of love.

Let me refer to a personal experience. Due to a fall in my home earlier this year, I was at risk of losing the sight in my left eye. From the moment my injury occurred and soon thereafter, when they were apprised of my situation, family friends, professional colleagues, and neighbors provided me with assistance and ongoing support. From the beginning of this journey, throughout the time of my surgery, and throughout the recovery period, the collective love and care for me from all of these people was priceless. This time and circumstance taught me so much about

God's loving presence through others.

At this very moment, neighbors are helping neighbors, strangers are being fed, conflicts are being solved, people are offering words of kindness, support, and compassion to those who are in the most need.

When we do our best for others in God's name, and promote God's love in our family, neighborhood, community, church, and world, we are ambassadors of God's love

Let's make this effort daily, from the time we wake up every morning until the last minute of each day for ". . . the Kingdom of God is within you." (*Luke 17:21*)
