Parish Advent Communal Penance Service: "The Sacrament of Reconciliation— God's Unconditional Love for Us!"

In recent years, a name change has taken place with the "Sacrament of Confession." We no longer call the act "Confession," but rather "Reconciliation" and/or "Penance."

This name change better reflects what happens in this celebration. We do not go to the priest just to list our sins, have them forgiven, and receive a penance; but rather, and most importantly, we come to the priest to celebrate the forgiveness of God that we experience in our lives. We come to the Sacrament with a sense of joy for what God has already done in our lives and what God continues to do—showering us with unconditional love.

The verbalization of our sins, the verbalization of the words of absolution, and the acceptance of a penance are steps in the process of celebrating God's forgiveness and unconditional love for us.

If we are open to God's love, we begin to experience the many ways in which God forgives us our sins in the daily occurrences of our lives.

When we ask forgiveness from someone we have offended, our sins are forgiven. When we accept the forgiveness of another, our

sins are forgiven. Each time we talk to God in the silence of our hearts and sincerely seek forgiveness from God, our sins are forgiven. Each time we celebrate the Eucharist, we hear the words of the priest shortly before the reception of Holy Communion— "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world! Happy are we! We are called to His supper!"—our sins are forgiven.

So why go to the priest? We do so in order to celebrate the forgiveness of God that we experience in our daily lives, to ritualize it, sacramentalize it and, as in all things, to place our lives and God's involvement in our lives within the context of the Church, the Body of Christ.

The priest "stands in" for the community. As we verbalize our sins, we are mindful that there is no such thing as a personal sin. Our sins, no matter how personal we may think them to be, affect others—"No Man Is an Island." We live in community. Our lives always touch the lives of others.

Telling our sins, hearing our sins from our own lips, helps us to be real and to acknowledge our weakness and our dependence upon God. It is so easy to rationalize our sinfulness when we talk to ourselves "in our heads." It is an entirely different experience when we hear ourselves verbalize our sinfulness. Those sins become much more real! We become much more aware and sensitive of our responsibilities to others.

The priest "stands in" for Christ. Hearing the words of absolution, the forgiveness of God, from the lips of the priest is indeed comforting. You know how wonderful it feels when a family member or friend says, "I love you!" In the Sacrament of Reconciliation we allow God to say those words to us in and through the person of the priest.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is not something to be feared but to be celebrated with trust and confidence because of God's unconditional love for us.

Next weekend, on Sunday, November 30, at 4:00pm, our Parish celebrates her Advent Communal Penance Service. This day is the first Sunday of Advent. What a great way to "kick off" the season, to help make the days before Christmas "holy," not "hectic." In this Parish celebration, a number of our young people will be celebrating this Sacrament for the first time. Your presence will also be a sign of support to them.

Many priest-confessors will be available for you. They will be in Church waiting for you so that through the words of absolution God will once again say to you:

"I forgive you, and I love you unconditionally!"

Will you be there to hear God's words?

The season of Advent, which begins next Sunday, is the time for expressing the hope and strengthening the dreams that will carry us through the next year. Advent is the way we as church express our hopes. Prophetic visions, prayers and songs calling for the Lord to come do help us to hope profoundly. Advent allows us to do what most others do in Decemberbut to see in the coming Lord the answer to our dreams.

In our Catholic tradition, keeping Advent means singing the songs of expectation, of our hopes and longing, before we enter into the full-throated praise of Christmas carols.

Here are a few lines from our tradition on what Advent is about. "Advent has a twofold character: as a season to prepare us for Christmas when Christ's first coming is remembered; as a season when that remembrance directs the mind and the heart to await

Christ's second coming at the end of time. Advent is thus a period for devout and joyful expectation."

Thomas Merton, in his book Seasons of Celebration, reviewed the ways Saint Bernard of Clairvaux approached these comings of Christ. The first advent was Christ's birth. The other will be at the end of time. Faith in these two stimulates recognition of a third, the advent of Christ in our church now, today. Viewed from this perspective, the Advent liturgy, with its scriptures, prayers, and songs, is neither a romantic return to the Old Testament while we wait for the baby at Bethlehem, nor is it an exercise in expressing hope for an ever-receding end of time. The Advent liturgy is neither nostalgic nor illusory.

When we take the tradition and enter it fully, we become Advent, the people in and through whom Christ comes.



We are most grateful to our parishioners who step up each year to facilitate the nearly 100 ministries that make St. Thomas More such a vibrant Faith Community.

Following are some facts and descriptions of a few of the things that happen during the year, both visibly and behind the scenes, thanks to the efforts of our Christian stewards. More hands are always welcome!

It Takes . . .

- **422 Masses** to fill our Parish's liturgical needs each year judging by the past 12 months.
- 5-6 People (10 Person Teams) to set up the 495 chairs and arrange the Upper Level on Saturday mornings for Mass, every other week.
- ◆ 75 Liturgical Ministers to cover three Masses on any given weekend, including Eucharistic ministers, Hospitality ministers, Greeter, Readers, Altar Servers and Sacristans for each Mass.
- 16 Eucharistic Ministers to bring communion to Tri-City Hospital, on a weekly basis, each month on Tuesdays (four teams of four people).
- ◆ 12 Eucharistic Ministers weekly to administer communion to our Parish's shut-in members and to the convalescent and retirement homes we serve.
- **61 Handbells** to make up the four-octave set that 10 to 12 ringers use to play during Mass. We're very grateful for the surprise Parishioner Handbell donation, which has made this choir possible!
- 6 Artisans on our Art & Environment team to prepare and maintain our worship space for our various seasons, feasts, and solemnities.
- 83 Musicians to make the music we currently hear at the Parish during the year.
- ♦ **6 Weeks** of rehearsal for every song that any of our choirs presents during a liturgy, an average of about 1-1/2 total practice hours each.
- ◆ 275+ Stewards to help our Faith Formation and Evangelization Ministries flow so seamlessly.
- ◆ **35 Catechists and Assistants** (plus more helpers) to share faith in the RE.A.CH program for our youth twice a month. **265 children** are enrolled in this program which covers youth from 3 to 18 yrs. old.

- **50+ Parishioners** make our annual Vacation Bible School a success each summer. Enrollment is 160!
- 8 Adult Facilitators for Liturgy of the Word for Children to allow our young parishioners, ages 4 through 12yrs., to share God's Word on their level during the first part of Sunday Mass. Adult Facilitators are needed to help with this ministry!
- Many Hands to help facilitate "Looking At Life Through The Eyes of Faith" which offers multiple opportunities for adult faith formation throughout the year. Help is especially needed for our Parish Retreat in March 2009, as well as ideas for future planning. Wayne Zych would welcome your participation on the committee!
- ♦ 6-Hour and 10-Hour Faith Formation Courses to cover the needs of our teens. These are presented by those who enjoy interacting with teens. Help is needed to expand the courses offered. A team of young adult facilitators is a great alternative.
- Great Faith for 40+ Parishioners to participate in our weekly morning and evening sessions of Little Rock Scripture Studies.
- Faithful Stewards to help facilitate our RCIA team, led by Mario Diaz. This program conforms to fit the number of sponsors needed to welcome and prepare new members for initiation into the Catholic Church.
- ◆ 3 Catechists to help with monthly classes to prepare parents presenting infants for Baptism.
- 10 Baptism Banner Makers to make a special banner for each new Catholic.
- ◆ 32 People to cover the details necessary for us to have Monday Night Mass on the first Monday of every month, as well as to provide music on certain weekend and special liturgies.
- ♦ STM Parishioners to staff the serving line at Brother Benno's on the first Saturday of each month.
 12 members stand ready to fill in as it is necessary.
- Many People to provide dinners, on the last Sunday of each month, to North County Solutions for Change homeless shelter in Vista. Individual families, and/or ministerial groups provide the monthly dinners, which serve 35-40 people.

Paschal Choir Members provide musical support at every funeral

ADVENT 2008: At-Home Retreat

dvent stirs my imagination. I always look forward to the new liturgical year to put a fresh perspective on my own relationship with Christ. The ancient prophets clear away the clutter in my heart so I can cultivate again a desire to remain in communion with Jesus and live that love in service with people. The sacred texts and the quiet liturgies also remind me of the intimacy God has ready for me right now in my own relationships. The urgency of some of the pre-Christmas Scriptures focuses my attention on the ultimate coming of Christ at the end of time.

Living out the Advent message in our culture, however, is always conflicting for me. In the weeks before Christmas, our society depends on us to spend more money than our budgets can bear. I get flustered listening to Christmas commercials that begin the day after Halloween. I cringe at the reality of overindulgence, plastic decorations, and false happiness. I hate parties where I pretend that Christmas brings happiness only for the well deserving and the best dressed. In the midst of straddling these cultural lies, something deeper is invested in God's Son becoming flesh. Advent teaches us how to live. I find in the church's prayer a deep longing for God, who loves me and asks me to bring to the poor the love they deserve. I look forward to Advent because the short liturgical season renews in me a desire to continue following the risen Christ even in my complacency and doubt.

The following Advent retreat is designed for you to connect again to God, who opens up your imagination. In this busy season, I invite you to take time to explore how God births hope in you, how faith changes your perceptions of Christ in the world. This liturgical season offers us all a path to honesty, compassion, and love, even in the darkest time of the year.

Gospel: The Sunday Gospel is cited for each week. The complete text can be found at www.downtownchapel.org or at the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' webpage

(www.usccb.org/nab/). Read the Gospel from the previous Sunday every day during the week. Allow the story and the words to soak into your resistance, your stubbornness, and your doubt. Open yourself in the quiet of prayer to Christ's challenge, consolation, and forgiveness. Read and reread. Ready your heart to rest in the word of God, which forms us all in love.

Theme: Each week's theme connects the Gospel with life experience. Your prayer and reaction to the Gospels creates the theme for yourself. Do not ponder the written theme if the words do not speak to you or connect with your experience. Sit with the Gospel in silence. Allow your inner life to speak to you. Write down or journal your reactions, insights, or perspectives of the Gospel and the season of Advent. Be quiet. Write.

Guidance: These spiritual prompts are to help you enter more deeply into the Advent message and your own life experience. Pick the statements that speak to you. Write and keep writing from the Spirit's invitation. You may use one or more of the statements, either for your personal prayer or for the beginning of conversation within a group setting.

Prayer: The written prayer is a model for your own personal prayer. After your silent and written reflections, form your thoughts into a prayer to God. Be as honest as you can in the moment. The more honestly you write, the more you will see the connection to the message of the Scriptures and your own life. Pray for what you desire and what the world needs. Make your prayer a tangible statement of God's challenge and love for you. The essence of the retreat is to formulate your own prayer during this Advent season.

Advent 2008

1st Sunday of Advent: Nov. 30, 2008

Gospel: Mark 13:33-37

"Be watchful! Be alert!"

Theme

I regret not paying more attention to people. Every morning I look over my shoulder in prayer at the day before and realize what I could have seen. I missed an opportunity to affirm a colleague's creativity and insight. I was blind to a parishioner because I was in a hurry to meet someone else. I tripped over another person sitting on the sidewalk asking for a handout on my way to an appointment. I see more clearly in prayer the faces I missed before. Their eyes told me to stop and pay attention, but my agenda was far more important.

Advent calls me every year to stay awake from the inside out. My preoccupation with the world's natural disasters, skyrocketing prices, and political changes settles into my soul and often blinds me to the reality of life right before me. I shut my eyes to protect myself from people's needs. Staying awake becomes the key to prayer when I would rather sleep through the cold, blustery, dark days of Advent. The Scriptures prop open my eyes so my heart can view God's love for the world around me. The stories of the past challenge me still to view that I am neither in charge of my day nor my life. I hear the call of the prophets still challenging me in the voices of people I love and those who pass through my every day.

2nd Sunday of Advent: Dec. 7, 2008

Gospel: Mark 1:1-8

"I have baptized you with water; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

Theme

I trap myself by living in the past. I cling to moments when life went my way, when I felt in control. The older I get, the more I realize that as a youth I thought life should be a certain way. I thought everyone had what they needed — education, family, housing, and health. Now I understand I am not in control of my life or other people's lives. I experience now more than ever, working among the poor, that there is no certainty in life. My Advent prayer needs to dig into the reality of life, to be grounded in truth. I cannot live on the grace of yesterday. My friends with addiction wait for the new day of sobriety. I wait with others who search for housing and who long to let go of past abuse. Advent radically breaks into our chaotic lives and teaches us that God still brings love, and we all stand together with the prophet John, who clears away our illusions.

We do not patiently wait for a baby to be born in Advent. Jesus already came into our midst in the past, and the Eucharist today prepares our hearts for the second coming of the risen Christ. Our prayer does not give way to nostalgia but grabs us by the heart to wake us up so that we will listen again to the prophets' cries. We dig into the issues of our day, the darkness in our culture, and the lies of our society that keep us unaware that Christ first came humbly to those in need. This is the message of the Messiah, in every age, for every person.

At-Home Retreat

3rd Sunday of Advent: Dec. 14, 2008

Gospel: John 1:6-8,19-28

"I am the voice of one crying out in the desert; make straight the way of the Lord."

Theme

I hide behind the many masks of my life. I seek the shelter of other people's approval. I protect myself behind the lies I tell other people and try to justify my life by making myself acceptable to friends and strangers. When I travel this path of self-deception, I wander away from the real grace I know God is offering me. Hearing the voice of the prophet John cracks open my deceptions, my false self, and my pretense about what my life should be or who I ought to become.

Only God can change me, and I change when I acknowledge the truth of my life. The Advent Scriptures shake me out of my phony pretense and wake me from the sleep of my false power, rigid authority, and forged clericalism. I find my real self when I allow God entry into my heart and convictions. In other words, God alone is the source of my life. My true identity rests on the grace God has for my future. Advent calls us all to realize our relationship with God, and in this communion we are followers of the Christ who shows us how to live, love, and belong in the world. Being in God with a full and honest heart becomes the center of our rejoicing, of living life with grace and gratitude.

4th Sunday of Advent: Dec. 21, 2008

Gospel: Luke 1:26-38

"Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God."

Theme

Paying attention is never easy for me. The older I get, the more I realize life boils down to remembering to floss my teeth, pay the monthly bills on time, and feeling guilty about not eating healthy. I desire to be really present in life. Every morning I begin with trying to be really present to myself and expose my infidelity, my regrets, and my gratitude to God. In being present to myself, I realize God's desire to be present to me. I recall each morning that God finds favor in my uncertain faith, my hesitant trust, and my human restlessness.

Advent reminds me that God became flesh because divine favor rests on all humanity. God's love caresses the human condition and is found in simplicity, calm, and quiet. Jesus birthed hope as human beings found him in a cave, wrapped in his mother's garment, breathing the cold air with his fearless parents. His life on earth taught us not to fear our deepest longings. He showed us how to respect our differences, listen to others' needs, and serve those locked in fear. We remember his birth because we are human and still trying to grasp the empty, cold, and silent tomb of his resurrection.

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Advent Wreath - Making Your Own

Advent for children should rightly be a very busy time, starting with the making of the Advent wreath. This is a sacramental in which the whole meaning of Advent is symbolized, and symbols are a language children understand very easily. Included below are guidelines for explaining this symbolism to your children, and also a family blessing for the wreath.

Directions

If the wreath is to be hung from the ceiling, the frame can be made in a number of ways. It can be wire coat-hangers unshaped and twisted to form a circle (with cross-pieces to brace it); it can be cut from plywood; it can be a cast-off floral wreath frame; it can be several circles of heavy cardboard cut and taped together and braced with cross-pieces.

Candleholders, improvised or ready-made if suitable, can be wired to, soldered to, or cut into the frame at the four points of the compass (we made ours of bouillon tins, nailed to the braces and silvered). On a hung wreath the greens are fastened to show from the bottom rather than the top. It is tied with purple ribbons between the four candles and hung by the ribbons from the ceiling.

The principal protection against fire is to have the candleholders firm and the candles firmly in them. We never let the candles burn down too far, nor light them unless there is a grownup present. The candles need not be blessed candles, although the beeswax candles burn the most beautifully and more slowly, and there are plenty of ways to use up the leftover candle stubs.

A table wreath can be a simple wreath of greens resting in a pan of water to keep them fresh, or a large ringmold filled with wet sand which will keep the greens fresh; or you may put greens in a ringmold filled with wet plaster (of course they do not come out!). Candlesticks are placed on the table inside the wreath. The ribbon may be tied to the candle, or it may bind the wreath or be tied on it in four bows between the candles.

Well, what does it mean?

The circle is a symbol of eternity and the never-endingness of God, and the evergreen is a symbol of eternal life and the never-changingness of God. Tertullian in the third century wrote to the Christians of his day: "You are a light of the world; a tree ever green." Children love to learn by symbols.

We wondered one year if the smaller ones remembered. "What does the circle of the wreath mean, dear? Do you remember?"

A small boy thought very hard and then said: "I can't tell you but I can show you." He hugged himself with both arms and went round and round in a wide circle. "See? God never stops."

"You mean God goes round in circles?"

"No! God doesn't go round in circles. *God never stops means God never ends.* He thought "He never begins, either. Like circles." It is what the catechism says, only in his words....

Did God have a beginning? God had no beginning. He always was and always will be.

The four candles in the wreath are for the four weeks of Advent. Three candles are white or purple and one is rose to match the rose vestments permitted on Gaudete Sunday (third Sunday of Advent), reminding us of the

shout of joy in that day's Introit. . . . "Rejoice (gaudete)

in the Lord always, again I say, rejoice." The rose-colored candle says that the promise is almost fulfilled; come, everyone, rejoice!

The ribbon is purple for penance, but it is a different kind from the penance of Lent. That penance is heavy with sorrow, bitter and painful with the knowledge of our sins. We are sinners in Advent, too, but the emphasis is differently placed. The emphasis is on our longing, our need, not only for the great graces of the feast of His Nativity, for the renewing in our hearts of the mystery of His birth, but our need to be ready for the glorious moment of His Second Coming. This penance is a chastening, a cleansing, a hurrying and a waiting, a longing and an aching that is at the same time both painful and sweet. Like the family waiting for the baby to come, we could all but die with the waiting for His birthday, and His coming again in glory.

The family gathers for the blessing of the wreath on the Saturday night before the first Sunday of Advent, or on the first Sunday itself, with the father or some older member of the family reading the blessing.

Blessing of the Advent Wreath

Father or Leader: Our help is in the name of the Lord. All: Who made heaven and earth.

Father or Leader: Let us pray. O God, by Whose word all things are sanctified, pour forth your blessing upon this wreath, and grant that we who use it may prepare our hearts for the coming of Christ and may receive from you abundant graces. Through Christ Our Lord. All: Amen.

(Sprinkles wreath with holy water.)

The father or leader reads the prayer for the first week, then holds up the youngest child to light the first candle, which is also lighted all through the week when the family gathers in the room with the wreath. Two candles are lighted by the oldest child the second week, three the third by the mother, four the fourth by the father.

Weekly Candle-Lighting Prayer: Loving God, as we light our Advent candle(s) may we rekindle in ourselves the desire to prepare a way for the birth of Christ. May the food we are about to receive nourish both our bodies and our hearts. We ask this in your Holy Name. Amen.

The candles are never lighted unless an adult is present. When there is a guest who asks: "What a pretty wreath. Is it something special, with the candles like that?" the children love to explain: "It's an Advent wreath, and the four candles are for the four weeks of Advent. Every week we light another candle, you see, and the light around it grows bigger. That means that the birthday of the Light of the world is coming soon. Baby Jesus, you know, and Christmas. It's His birthday and He's the Light of the World."
