Stop worrying about the fact that people are calling the tree a holiday tree, instead of a Christmas tree. It was I who made all trees. You can and should remember me anytime you see any tree. Decorate a grape vine if you wish: I actually spoke of that one in a teaching explaining who I am in relation to you and what each of our tasks is. If you have forgot that one, look up John 15:1-8.

If you want to give me a present in remembrance of my birth, choose something from my wish list:

- 1. Instead of writing protest letters objecting to the way my birthday is being celebrated, write letters of love and hope to soldiers away from home. They are terribly afraid and lonely this time of year. I know, they tell me all the time.
- 2. Visit someone in a nursing home. You don't have to know them personally. They just need to know that someone cares about them.
- 3. Instead of writing the President complaining about the wording on the cards his staff sent out last year, why don't you write and tell him that you'll be praying for him and his family this year. Then follow up. It will be nice hearing from you again.

- 4. Instead of giving your children a lot of gifts you can't afford and they don't need, spend time with them. Tell them the story of my birth, and why I came to live with you earth. Hold them in your arms and remind them that I love them.
- 5. Pick someone that has hurt you in the past and forgive him or her.
- 6. Did you know that someone in your town will attempt to take their own life this season because they feel so alone and hopeless? Since you don't know who that person is, try giving everyone you meet a warm smile; it could make the difference. Also, you might consider supporting the local Hot-Line: they talk with people like that every day.
- 7. Instead of nit picking about what the retailer in your town calls the Holiday, be patient with the people who work there. Give them a warm smile and a kind word. Even if they aren't allowed to wish you a "Merry Christmas," that doesn't keep you from wishing them one. Then stop shopping there on Sunday. If the store didn't make so much money on that day they'd close and they would let their employees spend the day at home with their families.
- 8. If you really want to make a difference, support a missionary, especially one who takes my love and Good News to those who have never heard my name. You may already know someone like that.
- 9. Here's a good one. There are individuals and whole families in your town who not only will have no "Christmas" tree, but neither will they have any presents to give or receive. If you don't know them (and I suspect you don't) buy some food and a few gifts and bring them to St. Thomas More Parish. The Parish is providing many opportunities in the coming weeks to support those who are in need. Bring your gifts to Church and they will make the delivery for you.
- 10. Finally, if you want to make a statement about your belief in and loyalty to me, then behave like a Christian. Don't do things in secret that you wouldn't do in my presence. Let people know by your actions that you are one of mine.

P.S. ~ Don't forget: I am God and can take care of myself. Just love me and do what I have told you to do. I'll take care of all the rest. Check out the list above and get to work; time is short. I'll help you, but the ball is now in your court. And do have a most blessed Advent and Christmas with all those whom you love and remember...



Today, Advent ushers in the Church New Year! We are reminded in the Gospel to be watchful and alert, as we do not know the time or the hour when Jesus will return.

VOICES OF THE SEASON

On any given day, numerous and varied voices speak their words into our lives and invite our attention. Some voices are familiar and cherished and, therefore, readily welcomed. Some voices engage our attention and invite our joy. Other voices are less welcome, as in the automated telemarketer who calls at dinnertime.

Still other voices test our trust. Some voices are wise and informative. Others are entertaining. Some voices lie, others tell the truth. Some chide, others challenge. Some voices try to alarm us, while others offer us a levelheaded message.

There are also inner voices that make themselves heard in mind and heart. Who has not heard the voice of reason vying with the voice of inordinate passion or desire? Who has not been called to task by the nagging voice of guilt or burdened by the voices of self-doubt or fear? Don't all of us recognize and welcome the voice of conscience when we hear it? Even when its counsel seems difficult, this Godgiven inner voice of truth requires our close attention.

Other similarly truthful and righteous voices will call out for a hearing this month as we prepare for and celebrate the coming of God's own voice in flesh and blood. Foremost among these voices is that of John the Baptizer. John will identify himself as one through whose voice God is revealing truth (Dec. 7, 14). Prepare God's way, make straight the pathways on which the Lord will come to you, cries John. His message challenges those of us whose cluttered and busy lives have taken a wrong turn or a detour. Get back on track. Make things right between you and others so as to recognize and hear and heed the One who comes to speak truth to your heart. Tell this truth to all others at all times, regardless of the personal cost or consequences.

Like his prophetic colleague, Isaiah (Dec. 7, 14), John understood that God's voice speaking in Jesus is good news, gospel. This good news has a specific audience of people and these are identified as the repentant, the brokenhearted, the prisoners, and the poor. To all who will listen, this good news will speak of healing, justice, wholeness and peace. November 30, 2008

However, only those whose hearts are both pure and poor will be able to hear its truth. Only these will be empowered to become powerful voices through which the truth of God will be revealed. But when the message is garbled and inconsistent, when our voices say one thing but our actions say another, then the voice of John should reverberate in our minds: Be direct! Let your integrity prepare a path for the God who comes.

As one who was essentially honest, pure and poor in spirit, Mary will also lend her voice to this season to teach us of the quiet calm of faith that comes with prayer and trust in God. Mary's faith enabled her to withstand the suffering and struggles that are inherent to belonging to God. Her voice calls out to each of us this Advent to be similarly strong.

Mary's voice, interpreted by Luke, reassures us that the word "impossible" is not in the dictionary of the divine. Therefore, Mary's voice invites us to surrender whatever in our lives may seem overwhelming, unbearable, hopeless or impossible. Joining our voices to Mary's, we pray, "May it be done to me according to your word" (Dec. 21).

Through the second readings of this month, the voices of the epistolary writers will speak spiritually about what should characterize our waiting for God through every season of our lives. Take advantage of the time at hand, says the author of 2 Peter. Use it to repent so as not to be caught off-guard or ill-prepared to meet God (Dec. 7). Paul calls us to constant prayer and a grateful heart. Don't be fooled, he says. Use your head; discern good from evil and choose wisely (Dec. 14).

On the feast of the Holy Family (Dec. 28), the voice of the author of Colossians offers a "recipe" for Christian living as we wait for the final coming of God. Forgiven much by God, we are also to forgive one another. Utterly loved by God, so we are to love. With the word of God to guide us and with gratitude, let whatever we do in word or deed be an authentic reflection of the one in whom we believe, Jesus Christ. His is the voice to which we are to remain attuned; his is the voice that should be echoed in our own.




