Oplatki—Christmas Wafers

The word Bethlehem means "House of Bread." The breaking of bread is a sign of charity, unity, and friendship.

Religious family traditions and customs bring the truths of Faith into the home.

One of these beautiful Christmas customs is the Christmas Wafer. A Wafer bearing a simple design commemorative of Christ's birth



is given to everyone present gathered together for the Christmas meal.

With a simple prayer for God's grace and the welfare of the present and absent members of the family, the designated family member then invites everyone to go to another person, and with a gesture of a hug, kiss, or handshake, ask forgiveness for anything they may have done to hurt that family member in the past year, and to seek God's blessings upon them in the coming year.

Each person, as the words are said, then breaks a piece off of each other's Wafer and consumes the piece that has been broken off.

The spiritual lesson in this age old custom is unity of the family—the main pillar of society. The bond of unity is the Christ-like charity that should exist among the members of the family.

The members of the family are the links in the unbroken chain of One Body, One Bread, One Christ, and the One Church. The family is part of the eternal procession no matter where they are. For there is a universal longing to be always with one another, with God.

All this brings to mind clearly our charity for one another, to seek salvation together. Family customs remind us that we seek and obtain salvation with the help of others at all times.

These Christmas Wafers, and the home ritual surrounding their use, originated in Poland. This custom and ritual is also popular in Slovakia, Lithuania, Ukraine, and other parts of Catholic Eastern Europe.

Christmas Wafers (Oplatki) are available after Mass at the information Table on the plaza this weekend and in the coming weeks before Christmas. The Wafers are free, but donations will be accepted.

I encourage you to make this home ritual a part of your Christmas traditions.

We give thanks to Parishioners, Ed and Clarice Bednarz, who have provided us with these Christmas Wafers.

Please take advantage of this gift, and if you have already, start a new family Christmas tradition. —Fr. Mike

What's with the Pink Candle This Week?

The third Sunday of Advent (like the fourth Sunday of Lent) is a day of joy in the midst of a penitential season. We continue our Advent journey, but we come to a vantage point from which we can see what lies ahead—Christmas joy.

Gaudete Sunday

This Sunday is called *Gaudete* Sunday (meaning "rejoice") because of the first words of the entrance antiphon for today, from Saint Paul's letter to the Philippians: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice! The Lord is near." (Philippians 4:4-5). The word *rejoice* comes up again and again in the readings and prayers for today.

The rose-colored candle (and a beautiful shade of pink it is) represents this joyful liturgy on our Advent wreath. Rose-colored vestments may also be worn as a sign of rejoicing.

Continuing the Journey

The prayers for today make a shift from the end times to the approaching solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord. In the Opening Prayer, we ask that as we look forward to the birth of Christ we may be filled with "joy," so that our celebration may be one of "love and thanksgiving." The Prayer after Communion asks for the fruits of the Eucharist, to "free us from our sins, and prepare us for the birthday of our Savior."

Should commercialism or the evils of the world get us down, we need to look at the Advent wreath with its candles burning down patiently, a new one each week in the spiral they create, going down as we light the rose one this week which fills us with joy that we are getting closer and closer to the coming of the Lord—the child who is our joy, the child who is our victory.

Tidbits of Faith

"You're never too old to learn!" is a familiar phrase. In recent years I have been upset in seeing XMAS signs because I felt "they" were trying to leave Christ out of "Christ"mas.

Here's a better explanation ~

In the early 70's AD, Christians hid in the catacombs (underground burial places) from the Roman soldiers, who would not enter because they were superstitious. Paintings and inscriptions have been discovered in the catacombs. The Greek letter "X" was used as one of these earliest inscriptions. X in Greek is "Chi", the first letter in the name of Christ.

So now, when I see XMAS, I say to myself, "that's Greek to me!"

The Christian symbol of the fish comes from the same origins. ICTHUS is Greek for fish.

Looking at Life Through the Eyes of Faith

HOLY HOUSEKEEPING

Parishioners tend to multiple behind-the-scenes tasks, including vestment care, that also happen on a weekly basis:

- Check altar, altar cloths and candle holders on both upper and lower level. Remove wax and polish.
- Dust and polish all altar furnishings in the Church (upper & lower level) and Blessed Sacrament Chapel.
- Clean glass door of the Chapel.
- Check altar server albs to see if they need to be washed (delicate cycle) and hang according to size.
- Altar cloths are always taken to the cleaners with a round cylinder to roll them on.
- Check small cloth that is used to cover the gift table.
- Polish trays used for Sunday and daily Masses if needed.
- Clean and polish Thurible (vessel for incensing) monthly.
- Clean Holy Water Font.
- Check to be sure that everything is ready for weekend Mass.

Year-End Checklist

- ♦ Keep all gift receipts and acknowledgment letters, especially for gifts of \$250 or more.
- If you sold securities this year and will owe capital gains tax, remember that gifts of cash or other securities may partially or fully offset any tax on your gains.
- ♦ Annual Catholic Appeal payments? Any parishioners with a balance due on their pledges made to this year's ACA are requested to conclude their payments before December 31, 2008. Thank you to all who have already fulfilled their pledges! (Tithing families, remember that your tithe covers your ACA contribution.)
- ♦ BE SURE TO <u>COMPLETE</u> all gifts by December 31 to qualify for tax savings on this year's tax return. 



John the Baptist—The Voice Crying Out in the Wilderness

John the Baptist takes on a central role in the story and the journey of Advent. He came into our Scriptures in last Sunday's Gospel and we hear of him again this weekend.

I share with you the "Second Sunday of Advent" homily of Deacon Greg Kandra from Forest Hills, New York. His words gave me a deeper insight into the prophet who prepared the way for Jesus and prepares the way for us. May you find challenge and comfort in the Deacon's thoughts:



We are here in the second Sunday of Advent—in the desert, with a strange and disheveled figure dining on strange food and proclaiming that we need to make ourselves ready for the Lord.

We tend to think of John the Baptist as the Voice—the forerunner, the prophet, the one crying in the wilderness.

And he is.



But I'd like us to think of him another way this particular Sunday. This man is a figure of great hope. More than an ominous, fearsome figure, he is also, to my mind, the Saint of Second Chances.

He wanders into the desert of our lives and invites us to start over.

Appropriately, we are entering into a liturgical cycle where we will be reading the gospel of Mark—the gospel most scholars

believe was the very first one written. And we start with the same words that start the book of Genesis: "The beginning."

And the message from the beginning? Make yourselves new. Begin again. Something is about to happen that will change everything. This is your chance at a fresh start, to make things right with God.

That is John the Baptist's message—the message of the Saint of Second Chances.

And like second chances, he doesn't necessarily appear when or how we expect him to. This preacher isn't Joel Osteen in a silk suit and an airconditioned arena. John the Baptist is rough and wild and frightening, yelling in the desert.

But then again, God doesn't always enter into our lives when or how we want him to.

The other day I read the story of a 16-year-old Korean boy named Philip Kim. During the Korean War, he was one of many boys rounded up and arrested for refusing to join the People's Volunteer Army of North Korea. They took him to prison and were going to execute him. Philip Kim stood there, lined up with other boys, facing a wall, and he closed his eyes, waiting for the gunshot that would end his life.

But at the last minute, an officer yelled for them to stop. The soldier noticed that one of the other boys lined up against the wall was holding a rosary, and was praying. The execution was called off. The boys were spared.


That moment changed everything. Philip wasn't a Christian. But he never forgot what happened, what had saved his life. Not long after, he converted and came to America. He married, raised a family, became active in his local Catholic church. He settled in San Antonio, Texas, where he opened his home to other Korean immigrants to hold Mass. Those Masses led him to help found the first Korean Catholic Church in San Antonio.

His love for the church led him eventually to being ordained a deacon. Several years later, his wife died after a long battle with breast cancer. Before she

died, she gave Philip her blessing to become a priest. And he did. He was ordained at the age of 72. Last week, tragically, Fr. Philip Kim died in a car accident. He was 76.

He owed his remarkable life to a second chance nearly 60 years ago. And he didn't let it get away. He made his life matter.

What about the rest of us?



Like the boy facing a wall, and facing death...we can start over.

So, think of those mountains and valleys, those winding roads that cut through every life. And think of the wild and untamed man in the desert. He tells us it's not too late to change.

He is the saint of "I'm sorry. Let's talk."

He is the saint of "Where did I go wrong?" and "How can I make this right?"

He is the saint of "I'm addicted and I need help."

He is the saint of "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned."

He is the saint of the slammed door being reopened...the phone being picked up...the fences being mended...the wound being healed.

Last week, we began not just the season of Advent, but a new liturgical year. So consider this a time for making New Year's resolutions. For resolving to live differently. Resolving to make room for God.

Listen to the Saint of Second Chances—and take hold of every one that comes your way.

The dark days of December, after all, are not ending.

As Mark reminds us, they are "The beginning."
