## Saul, Saul, Why Are You Persecuting Me?

In the Scriptures of this weekend, we hear of the conversion of St. Paul.

Saul is a zeal ous Je w working t o protect Judaism against the people of t he Way, t he people who believe t hat Jes us i s t he Messiah, a messiah who suffered on the cross, who died the death of a c ommon cri minal, and who was gloriously raised from the dead.

Saul made sure that the people of the Way were being persecuted and punished, and some historians would indicate that Saul was responsible, i ndirectly, f or t he deat hs of some of t he early Christians.

He is on his way to Damascus and something happens to him that changes his life forever.

He has a "shattering" moment in which he hears a voice. It is the voice of Jesus who says to him, "Sau l, Sau l, why are you persecuting me?" Jesus does not say, "Why are you persecuting

the Church?" or "Why are you persecuting my followers?" Jesus says, "Why are you persecuting me?"

In that moment when Saul's life was turned upside down, in that moment that Saul went from persecut or of the C hristians to a Christian leader, and in that moment that Saul became Paul, Jesus identifies himself with his followers. He and they are one! "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?"

From th is experien ce, Pau l, in his later writings, develops the theology of the Mystical Body of Christ. The Church is the Body of Christ, with Christ as the head. The Church is the physical and mystical presence of Christ for any given time and place. The followers of Jesus are each members of the Body working together to be Jesus for a specific time and place. Jesus and the Church are one.

After Paul's faith encounter with the Christ, he did not go off on his own to preach the Gospel and to found his own Churches. He went back to the very people that he was persecuting and began a journey of trying to convince them that he encountered Christ and because of that encounter he had to find a place with the m, the first followers of Jesus.

It was not easy for him, and it was not easy for the early Church to believe in and to trust Paul. The struggle was tu multuous and difficult, but it brought Paul into the fold of the Church.

The theology of the Mystical Body is an important framework in which we are called to live our Christianity.

As a Christian, we must be connected to the Church, which is the Body of Christ. There is no such thing as just "Me and Jesus."

A "Me and Jesu s" lifestyle is no t tru e Christianity. It is a personalized life style based on the Teachings of Jesus. It may be good, it may be virtuous, but it is not the fullness of Christianity.

If on e h as heard the call of Jesus and responds to that call to develop a personal relationship with Jesus, as Lord and Savior, then that call must be lived out in community, within the Church.

It is so much easier to follow Jesus on one's own path, than to submit oneself to a group of fellow believers where there will be differences of opinions, ideas, strategies, practices, customs, likes, and dislikes.

Yet, Paul makes it very clear for us, by his example, that if we are to be in communion with Jesus, we must be in communion with the Church.

As we celebrate this Feast of the Conversi on of St. Paul, may it provide a n opportunity for each of us to be m ore dee ply committed to Jesus as our Lord and Savior, and to live out our relationship with Christ, as faithfu 1 m embers of t he B ody of Christ, the Church!



In addition to providing the monies for the bus, the program offers travel bags for the children, comfort bags for the caregivers, a photo of each child with his or her parent, and meals for the day (breakfast, snacks on the bus, a special lunch at the prison with their parent and dinner on the way home, and a teddy bear with a letter from their parent and post-event counseling.

## **AUTHORITY OVER EVIL**

## **Lectionary Themes for February 2009**

In January, the authors of the sacred texts drew our attention to God's universal and salvific outreach to humankind. The outreach took on a face, received a voice, and extended the divine graciousness to us all in the person and through the mission of Jesus. Through baptism and by faith, this mission has become the privilege and responsibility of those who call themselves church.

In February, the Marcan evangelist in particular will continue t o e ducate a nd e ncourage believers in practicing a missiology (theology of mission work) that will most au thentically reflect the one first modeled by Jesus. Along with Jesus, we are to have an outreach that is exe reised wit h a uthority. especially as it regards the evils of sic kness and sin and t he resulting se paration from God community. Thr ough Jes us' ministry of heal ing, casting out demons, and forgiving sin, he show ed himself to be possessed of an authority that was not derivative like that of the prophets or scribes. On the contrary, Jesus' perception and teaching of the truth was direct and un mediated. He did not call on any external sou rce to v alidate what he said and di d. Rather, the only authority Jesus appealed to was the authority of the tru th itself. Through the power of his words, he conveyed that truth, and his impact on his contemporaries was rooted in their experience of the power of truth, the power of God at work in him.

Mark will tell his readers on more than one occasion this m onth of the impression Jes us made on his contemporaries. "All we re amazed and a sked one another, 'Wh at is this? A new teaching with authority" (Feb ruary 1). "All were astou nded and glorified God saying, 'We have never seen anything like this" (February 22). Those who saw and heard Jesus becam e awa re that at the very heart of his being was a unique experience of closeness to God that Edward Sch illebeeckx called the "Abb a experience." So united to God was Jesus that he was possessed by the very compassion and love of God. As a conse quence, all of Je sus' words and works were expressions of this fundamental experience. His so lidarity with God, which was t ranslated in to an ex perience of solidarity with humankind, made Jesus a uniquely free person, uniquely courageous, fearless, i ndependent, and t ruthful. contemporaries perceived his uniqueness and called it authority. Today Jesus challenges his followers to be similarly courageous, independent, and truthful work at continuing his mission...with as we

authority.

Just as Jesus' authority was rooted in h is so lidarity with Go d, the authority of his fo llowers begins in their relationship with Jesus. That relationship, says La mar Williamson Jr., en ables and empowers disciples to be channels for the living, authoritative words and works of Jesus ( Mark, Westminster John K nox Press, Louisville, Ky.: 1983). For that reason, the followers of Jesus are charged with the responsibility of



speaking truth to power, especially when that power is being a bused to perpetrate acts of inhumanity masquerading as "justice." Jesus 'o wn authority speaking in us demands that we, as individuals and as church, relinquish the safety of silence and make our voices heard on behalf of victims everywhere. Rooted in truth, compassion, and love, ours is to be the authoritative voice that identifies evil, names it for what it is, and works to overcome it with the very goodness of God.

Unfortunately, it seems that all too few authoritative voices are being raised to speak God's truth. Who is addressing the a moral treatm ent of refugees , displaced persons and undocumented workers? Who is speaking out for the thousands who are dying of treatable diseases because money for their medicines is no t forthcoming? Who is tellin g the plight of those who are to rtured and mu rdered in the countless wars that plague our planet? Who is there who will have the courage to question the problems of homelessness, hunger, and poverty and dare to become part of the solution?


Unless and until the followers of Jesus beg in to speak with an authority that is rooted in their union with him and with God, how will the truth be told? February's glimpse of the Marcan Jesus challenges us to speak that truth and not be cowed, despite the risk and despite the cost. Then the authority and truth of Jesus will become manifest in us. Then the compassion and love of God will begin to overcome evil in all its forms—only then, only when we begin to speak as Jesus spoke.

# "Our Journey Into The Future . . . Together" Questions & Answers/January 11, 2009 Update

- 1. I was out of town and missed the January Capital Campaign update. Are there copies of the talk? The presentation and bulletin insert are available on our website: www.stmoside.org, on the Parish Information table on the Plaza, and in the Parish Office.
- 2. When will we break ground to build our Church? When we have enough money on deposit with the Diocese. One-third of the project cost is required. For us, that is \$3.1 million, and we currently have \$2.8 million on deposit.

#### AND

Our Operations Income needs to be healthy and in a positive cash flow. Presently, our operational income is below budget. It needs to increase significantly, so that we operate in the black and show consistency over a period of time before we can apply for a Diocesan loan. Building pledges need to be fulfilled and/or renewed, and the commitment to the Operations Budget must deepen.

3. Why don't we build a cheaper church so I can see it before I die?

The estimated cost of our Church is completely in line with other recently completed Churches. And none of us know when we are going to die (unless God has told you something not shared with anyone else).

4. Can we build a smaller Church?

The Diocese has requirements for size, and we have been encouraged to build for between 1,100 and 1,200 (in keeping with our CUP.) This is positive future planning.

5. How do I renew my pledge?


