

Little Rock Scripture Studies: The Letter to the Hebrews

The letter to the Hebrews is one of three letters called *Pastorals*. The other two are the books of Timothy (1 and 2) and Titus. This study helps us examine and enter into the priestly ministry of Jesus and consider our role in the Kingdom of God today.

Hebrews is known in the New Testament as a letter, but is to be understood fundamentally as a sermon or homily. The sermon represents the kind of discourse the Christian church was developing to meet the needs of its members. It is not a missionary sermon designed to convert non-Christians; it is directed to believers who are in need of exhortation, guidance, and comfort.

To whom was the letter originally addressed? The writer is a Hellenistic Jewish Christian, and his arguments presuppose that he is writing to others who may well have been in Rome.

When was the letter written? It was written in a time of actual or threatened persecution. The persecution of the Christian faith presented the Christians with the possibility of renouncing their faith as a means to escape suffering and hostility, and to return to Judaism. One of the purposes of the Letter to the Hebrews was to deal with this problem.

Thank You from Birth Choice of San Marcos

Dear Parishioners,

We were able to serve 1,054 women in 2008. 87 babies were born to our clients. Our speakers gave two presentations to local schools and churches on abstinence, abortion, adoption, and the services we offer. We have two clients living in a host's home.

On November 5, we started training two new volunteers, and on October 25, seven of our volunteers went to a post-abortion healing workshop. On Saturday, November 15, we sent 16 of our volunteers to the *Focus on Fertility* workshop in Corona. We teamed up with Image Clear Ultra Sound on Mondays at the Oceanside Pier, seeing 35 clients, and Thursdays in our parking lot, seeing 16 clients.

Your donation of a van load of new baby things and \$280 in cash and checks helps to make all of this possible. You are a very important part of this ministry. The layettes we give to our clients after their babies are born will be even more special because of you. It is an honor to be working with you saving babies, one mom at a time.





St. Paul Miki AND COMPANIONS

February 6

Nagasaki, Japan, is familiar to Americans as the city on which the second atomic bomb was dropped, killing hundreds of thousands. Three and a half centuries before,



martyrs of Japan were crucified on a hill, now known as the Holy Mountain, overlooking Nagasaki. Among them were priests, brothers and laymen, Franciscans, Jesuits, and members of the Secular Franciscan Order; there were catechists, doctors, simple artisans and servants, old men and innocent children—all united in a common faith and love for Jesus and his Church.

Brother Paul Miki, a Jesuit and a native of Japan, has become the best known among the martyrs of Japan. While hanging upon a cross Paul Miki preached to the people gathered for the execution: "The only reason for my being killed is that I have taught the doctrine of Christ. I certainly did teach the doctrine of Christ. I thank God it is for this reason I die. I believe that I am telling only the truth before I die. I know you believe me and I want to say to you all once again: Ask Christ to help you to become happy. I obey Christ. After Christ's example I forgive my persecutors. I do not hate them. I ask God to have pity on all, and I hope my blood will fall on my fellow men as a fruitful rain."

When missionaries returned to Japan in the 1860s, at first they found no trace of Christianity. But after establishing themselves they found that thousands of Christians lived around Nagasaki and that they had secretly preserved the faith. Beatified in 1627, the martyrs of Japan were canonized in 1862. Their feast is celebrated on February 6.



CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP Whose Money Is It Anyway?!

St. Augustine answers that question for us as follows:

"Find out how much God has given you (OK, so it is God's money) and take from it what you need; the remainder which you do not require is needed by others. The extras of the rich are the necessities of the poor. Those who retain what is superfluous possess the goods of others."

Billy Graham put it this way, "If a person gets their attitude toward money straight, it will help straighten out almost every other area in their life."

Remember the Promise?

Years ago, a young man knelt with his pastor and prayed as he committed to God his tithe. His first week's pay was \$10.00 and the tithe was \$1.00. As he grew older he became more prosperous and his tithe was \$7.00 a week, then \$10.00. He moved to another city and soon his tithe was \$100 a week, then \$200, then \$500.

It was at that point that this man sent his old friend a request to come and see him. The pastor arrived at the man's house. They had a good time talking over old times. Finally the man came to his point for requesting this visit.

"You remember that promise I made years ago to tithe. How can I get released?"

"Why would you want to be released?," asked the pastor.

The old pastor looked at his friend and said, "I am afraid we cannot get released from the promise, but there is something we can do. We



can kneel and ask God to shrink your income so you can afford to give \$1.00 again."
