Little Rock Scripture Studies: The Letter to the Hebrews

The letter to the Hebrews is one of three letters called *Pastorals*. The other two are the books of Timothy (1 and 2) and Titus. This study helps us examine and enter into the priestly ministry of Jesus and consider our role in the Kingdom of God today.

Hebrews is known in the New Testament as a letter, but is to be understood fundamentally as a sermon or homily. The sermon represents the kind of discourse the Christian church was developing to meet the needs of its members. It is not a missionary sermon designed to convert non-Christians; it is directed to believers who are in need of exhortation, guidance, and comfort.

To whom was the letter originally addressed? The writer is a Hellenistic Jewish Christian, and his arguments presuppose that he is writing to others who may well have been in Rome.

When was the letter written? It was written in a time of actual or threatened persecution. The persecution of the Christian faith presented the Christians with the possibility of renouncing their faith as a means to escape suffering and hostility, and to return to Judaism. One of the purposes of the Letter to the Hebrews was to deal with this problem.




Knights Encourage Boy Scouts



In Jesus' Words...

Jesus took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and giving it to his disciples said, "Take and eat; this is my body." Then he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you, for this is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins." (Matthew 26:26-28)

Communion in the Hand

Communion in the hand follows traditional practice, mirroring the Last Supper, which was a ritual meal, following the customs of the day. Communion in the hand was the universal practice until the ninth century, when a change in the shape of bread and a growing false sense of unworthiness on the part of the communicants led to a gradual changeover to receiving communion on the tongue.

Today, the Church teaches that Communion in the hand can deepen our faith in the dignity of the whole Christ, of every Christian as a member of the body of Christ, including our own personal dignity. Communion in the hand can help to remove disrespect for the human person and more particularly, the human body, and does not imply that some parts of the human body are less worthy than others.


Communion from the Cup

Some think taking the Eucharist from the cup is a new thing, instituted by the Second Vatican Council, but many centuries before that Council, sharing both the body and the blood was so much the norm that to refuse the cup raised suspicions about one's belief.

Today, good, faith-filled liturgy demands that our actions be consistent with our words. At the preparation of the gifts, we bring forward the gifts of bread and wine. We pray that "the fruit of the vine and work of human hands" become "our spiritual food and drink." The fullness of the mystery is lost when we do not accept the gifts in return.

Out of common sense courtesy, a communicant with a cold or other contagious illness should refrain from drinking from the cup.

When we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim your death, Lord Jesus.



As a Practical Matter...

The first rule is reverence.

- Bow your head as the person in front of you is receiving
- Walk up to the minister with the host
- Look at the minister
- Make a throne with your hands with your right hand underneath (if you are right-handed)
- When the minister says "The Body of Christ," answer "Amen" in a clear voice
- After the minister puts the Eucharist in your hand, pick it up and eat it
- Walk to the minister with the cup
- Bow your head as the person in front of you is receiving
- Walk up to the minister with the cup
- Look at the minister
- When the minister says "The Blood of Christ," answer "Amen" in a clear voice
- Take the cup from the minister with both hands, take a small drink, and return the cup
- Return reverently to your place, remaining standing until all have received, singing the communion song
- After all have received, we are seated for a few moments of silent prayer and, sometimes, for a communion meditation song

If you are ill or otherwise choose not to receive from the cup, please stop and reverence the cup (face the cup and bow your head) as you pass in front of it. Remember, this too is Jesus.







Reason #9

When we go to Mass each week, we are doing what Jesus asked us to do at the Last Supper, when he instituted the Eucharist. St. Paul reminds us "that the Lord Jesus on the night he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said, 'This is my body which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me'. In the same way also the cup, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me'" (1 Corinthians 11:23-25).

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP Stewards of Special Gifts The Consecrated Life

February 8 is designated as a world day of prayer for those among us who live the consecrated life. Those who live out this special call conjure up memories for many of us of the priest who was an overseas missionary, the nun whose healing ministry graced hospital wards, or the religious brother who taught in high school and ministered to us at our neighborhood parish.

Those who live the consecrated life are a gift to the world because of their profound witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. They give witness to what is sacred in the world, to Christ's missionary activity, evangelization, life in community, and the call of all God's children to holiness.



During February, let us pray for all those who are called to the consecrated life: that they continue to be encouraged; that they be given the strength to always be attentive to the needs of the Church and to each other. We pray that those among us who have this special vocation listen to the Lord's call, and in cooperation with God's grace, give

their lives over to Christ in a more explicit, loving, and concrete way through the consecrated life.

Those who live the consecrated life are stewards of a special gift. Their gift is a sign of love and hope in a world where societal values do not always have time for the very virtues holiness implies. Let us also pray that those who live this consecrated life continue to show us the way to holiness and to be more faithful to God who is Love.


