## The Tiger and the Goats

"A starving and pregnant tigress comes upon a flock of goats and pounces on them with such fervor that she brings about the birth of her little one, as well as her own death. The goats scatter, but soon come back to find the newborn tiger by the side of the dead mother.

The goats adopt the baby tiger and it grows up believing it is a goat. He learns to bleat and eat grass, but the trouble is that grass doesn't nourish tigers well, and he grows into a weak and miserable member of his own species.

and points out to him, 'See, you look like me. You are not a goat. You are a tiger, like me. Be like me! He then brings the young tiger to his den and shows him bloody chunks of gazelle meat from a recent hunt. Taking a big chunk, he says, 'Open up and eat this!' 'Oh no, I'm a vegetarian,' says the little one. But the old tiger would not take no for an answer, and shoves a piece of red meat down the little one's throat, causing him to gag a little. Now the real tiger food is in his gut, getting into his blood. Spontaneously, the young one gives a tiger-like stretch, and then a small little tiger roar.

'Now you've got it! Now go into the forest and eat tiger food!' says the big one.

Is there something larger than our ego that wants to come through, to demand authenticity and genuineness in the way we live? Are we to cruise onwards toward that inevitable ending, that certain exit on terms that were assumed and purchased for the first half? The second half of life is not a chronological issue, but a psychological one, in which we question what values and paradigms we are living by.

This is a question for each of us, whatever stage of life we're in—are we tigers living as goats? If the answer is in the affirmative, then a second question—what is the good tiger food? In other words, if we are not living as we ought to be, activating our fullest potentials, then what must we do, what would nourish us towards that?"

## THE PILLAR OF FIRE

What is this great paschal candle that stands in our midst, that during the Fifty Days of Easter seems always to be burning, never to go out?

It is the pillar of fire by which God led the children of Israel from slavery to freedom, through the dusty desert to the land flowing with milk and honey. Behind it, we marched freed from sin from the gloom of exile back into our church's house on Easter's eve. With it, we led those chosen for the sacraments of new life to the font of baptism that is both tomb and womb.



It is the holy sign of Christ our Light. (Thanks be to God!) On it, we traced the sign of Christ yesterday and today, the beginning and the end, the alpha and omega. Into it, we pressed five jewels that are the wounds of divine hands and feet and side. For it, we sang our song of consecration and praise: "Accept, O God, this Easter candle. Let it shine with the lights of heaven and bravely burn forever!" From it, we take our own light, a flame divided undimmed. All who are baptized walk in its glow.

For fifty days it shines gloriously in the assembly of the church. Then, held in a place of honor near the font, it is brought out and lit for every evening sacrifice of praise, for every baptism and every funeral, every birth and every birth unto eternal life. And as the days and seasons turn, slowly this pillar of finest wax and strongest wick is consumed, burned down, eaten up by fire, sacrificed—like Christ himself—and never truly extinguished. And so it measures our days and seasons until it is Easter again, until once more we sing in the light of a new paschal candle: "May the Morning Star which never sets find this flame still burning: Christ the Morning Star, who came back from the dead and shed his peaceful light on all people." Thanks be to God!



## **Safe Environment Education**

The Diocese of San Diego is committed to providing a safe environment for all who worship, work, or participate in formation opportunities in our parishes.

Parents, as the primary educators of your child, are entrusted with the responsibility of providing appropriate information regarding how to keep your child safe from sexual abuse. Empowered parents can develop and maintain an environment of trust in the home that allows children to discuss any topic, any fear, and any experience they are having. Potential abusers will avoid children who have such an open and honest relationship with their parents because abusers depend upon secrecy to avoid suspicion.

In compliance with the Diocesan Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, the topic of safe environments will be reviewed with our children in Levels 4 and 6 today and Level 1 on May 3.

Middle school and high school youth ministers will review this topic in Youth Group on April 27, and an envelope of supportive material for parents will be sent home with our youth that evening.

## Is There No End to This Giving Thing?

No. We were created to use all we have in fellowship with God. It is important to remember that all we have is pure gift from God in the first place, on loan to us to care for during our lifetime.

When we don't manage our gifts properly ~ by sharing our time, talents and resources ~ our lives are unfulfilled and incomplete. This is not a matter of earning our salvation, but of putting Jesus in the center of our lives where He belongs.

When we do that, all else falls into place. And when we do that, we enjoy expressing our thanks by sharing our gifts of time, talent, and treasure. This is food for the soul.

We notice this weekend that the Christian community described in Acts understood and practiced total stewardship. St. Paul makes clear that these believers did not claim anything as their own, but rather, held everything in common, and distributed to each whatever was needed.

Fast forward 2,000 years and realize we do not live in communes, yet there are still needs to be met in many places, and not just in our own families. Yes, our families need to come first. However, barring poverty and working two or three jobs, we all have time and talent that can be shared for the greater good.

The bottom line of the road less traveled in regard to our spiritual growth and our 'stuff' is that it will likely affect our lifestyle. Our focus will shift from building up our earthly kingdom to building up the kingdom where our eternal souls will dwell.

The goal is to make the most of our resources for God's kingdom work. Here is a good formula to follow:

- 1. Make all you can. (God wants to bless you.)
- 2. Live as inexpensively as possible (with contentment).
- 3. Provide maximum resources to God's kingdom work.



This means that we should all strive to be as prosperous as God blesses us. The key distinction is what proportion we use for God's work. God doesn't abundantly bless us just so that we can live luxurious lives, but so that we can have more leverage to help with external causes.

Generosity shows where your heart is  $\sim$  that your hope is in God and not in yourself or your money (oops, God's money).

Remember that there is *always* work to be done outside of the comfortable walls of our homes. When God asks how we shared our gifts, how will we answer?

Each week there are opportunities for Christian Stewardship in this bulletin. Page 10 is an Easter basket full of opportunities.

God has given us free will and left us in charge of His gifts.
