To Remain With Jesus

"In last Sunday's liturgy, a passage from the Gospel of John was used which was dominated by the expression: 'I am the good shepherd.' A parallel statement is used this Sunday as Jesus proclaims: 'I am the true vine.'

Jesus continues to speak to his disciples through imagery which they readily understood from their everyday experience, and with symbols which come from Jewish religious tradition. The language of shepherd came from the pastoral practice of Israel, but it also had links with the Jewish idea of a King Messiah. The vine is also a staple part of Israel's agricultural life. It carries within it the idea of life which flows into the branches of a spreading plant, and the fruit which depend upon that life in the branches. But it also summons up memories from Israel's religious past, a symbol for Israel and for peace and prosperity.

But we must be careful not to focus our attention too sharply on the image; this can lead us to lose the message. There are two parts of the argument. There is Jesus' claim to be the giver of life, the fulfillment of all that was best in Israel, its ultimate hope for

peace and prosperity, but there is also the demand that the disciple 'remain with' Jesus. He uses this expression no less than six times. Of course, it is because Jesus claims to be not only the vine, but 'the true' vine, that the latter demand is so urgent.

Jesus is the source of life, peace and prosperity for all who would be his disciples. But, as always through the Gospel, Jesus admits that behind his life-giving presence is a Father. Like a vine-dresser, the Father must cut away those who claim to have their life in and through Jesus, but whose fruits deny the values of Jesus and his Father. We have already been formed in our Christian lives by Jesus' word. We have been prepared to bear fruit, but even in this situation we are unable to set out on our own. As Jesus, the vine, only exists to make the Father known, so must it also be with the Christian disciple. We pray so often 'thy kingdom come, thy will be done,' but often it is our own kingdom and our own will that we seek.

No matter how well we have been 'pruned already by means of the word,' we must remain intimately linked to Jesus. We must not set off on our own mission. The person of Jesus must be our model and our inspiration. He is the vine. Without him our skills turn in upon ourselves, we wither, die, and must be thrown away. Fruitfulness in spreading God's kingdom depends upon our accepting the word of Jesus and then allowing it to be nourished by our continued contact with him in our sacramental life, our Christian community and in our intimacy with him through prayer.

To remain in Jesus means to be his disciples. In this way we are associated with the fulfillment of all that Israel promised. Now we have the possibility of the full possession of the Spirit, rendering glory to God as we work for his kingdom, rather than our own."

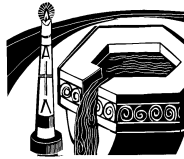

THE MYSTERY OF THE VINE

excerpted from Pope John Paul II's Christi Fideles Laici, 1988

The Sacred Scriptures use the image of the vine in various ways. In a particular case, the vine serves to express the Mystery of the People of God. From this perspective which emphasizes the Church's internal nature, the lay faithful are seen not simply as laborers who work in the vineyard, but as themselves being a part of the vineyard. Jesus says, "I am the vine, you are the branches" (Jn 15:5).

The prophets in the Old Testament used the image of the vine to describe the chosen people. Israel is God's vine, the Lord's own work, the joy of his heart: "I have planted you a choice vine" (Jer 2:21); "Your mother was like a vine in a vineyard transplanted by the water, fruitful and full of branches by reason of abundant water" (Ez 19:10); "My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill. He dug it and cleared it of stones and planted it with choice vines..." (Is 5:1-2).

Jesus himself once again takes up the symbol of the vine and uses it to illustrate various aspects of the Kingdom of God: "A man planted a vineyard, and set a hedge around it, and dug a pit for the winepress, and built a tower and let it out to tenants and went into another country" (Mk 12:1; cf. Mt 21:28 ff.).

John the Evangelist invites us to go further and leads us to discover the mystery of the vine: it is the figure and symbol not only of the People of God, but of Jesus himself. He is the vine and we, his disciples, are the branches. He is the "true vine," to which the branches are engrafted to have life (cf. Jn 15:1ff.).

The Second Vatican Council, making reference to the various biblical images that help to reveal the mystery of the Church, proposes again the image of the vine and the branches: "Christ is the true vine who gives life and fruitfulness to the branches, that is, to us. Through the Church we abide in Christ, without whom we can do nothing" (Jn 15:1-5). The Church herself, then, is the vine in

the gospel. She is mystery because the very life and love of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are the gift gratuitously offered to all those who are born of water and the Holy Spirit (cf. Jn 3:5), and called to relive the very communion of God and to manifest it and communicate it in history (mission): "In that day," Jesus says, "you will know that I am in my Father and you in me, and I in you" (Jn 14:20).

Only from inside the Church's mystery of communion is the "identity" of the lay faithful made known, and their fundamental dignity revealed. Only within the context of this dignity can their vocation and mission in the Church and in the world be defined

...Vatican Council II has invited us to contemplate the mystery of the Church through biblical images which bring to light the reality of the Church as a communion with its inseparable dimensions: the communion of each Christian with Christ and the communion of all Christians with one another. There is the sheepfold, the flock, the vine, the spiritual building, the Holy City. Above all, there is the image of the Body as set forth by the Apostle Paul. Its doctrine finds a pleasing expression once again in various passages of the Council's documents. In its turn, the Council has looked again at the entire history of salvation and has reposed the image of the Church as the People of God: "It has pleased God to make people holy and to save them, not merely as individuals without any mutual bonds, but by making them into a single people, a people which acknowledges him in truth and serves him in holiness." From its opening lines, the *Constitution Lumen Gentium* summarizes this doctrine in a wonderful way: "The Church in Christ is a kind of sacrament, that is, a sign and instrument of intimate union with God and of the unity of all the human race."

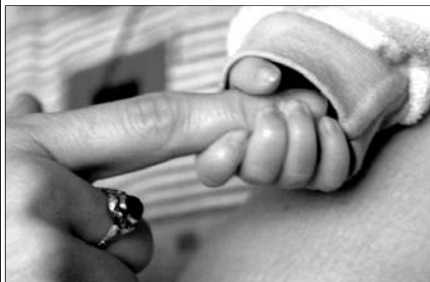
