Catechesis and the Proclamation of the Word

Today we celebrate Catechetical Sunday here at St. Thomas More and in the Universal Church. A special ceremony of blessing and dedication takes place at our 8:30am and 10:30am Sunday Masses in which we recognize the many catechists among us who commit themselves in this coming Parish Year to "hand on the faith" to others, especially the young, in our midst.

We, so often, take a Parish for granted. It is "here" and we avail ourselves of its resources dependent upon our needs. A Parish, though, doesn't just happen. A Parish, and, especially a Parish with a lively faith, is created and maintained by conscious and very deliberate choices "to be."

St. Thomas More is an intentional Faith Community. God has called us and we respond to God by gathering together in the name of Jesus. In that intentional gathering, the Lord Jesus is present and, through us, Jesus' mission and ministry continue.

Lifeline Screening Comes to St. Thomas More in September

Have you suffered a broken bone in your hip or spine? Do you feel as if you are getting shorter? If you answer "yes" to either of these questions, you may want to consider being screened for the risk of osteoporosis. We are pleased to offer a Life Line Screening preventive health event that can be used to detect just such a risk. Life Line Screening uses a quantitative ultrasound bone densitometer, using the heel as a measurement site, to assess one's risk of osteoporosis. LISTENING FOR THE STILL, SMALL VOICE

I went to church last weekend. And the weekend before that. Not revolutionary happenings in the life of a liturgy and music professional at a Catholic church, but extraordinary in that I sat next to my wife, Gail, both times. Since she worships and sings in a choir at one church and I minister at another, our Sunday mornings are rarely spent together. Two weeks ago, we were on vacation; last week, we were visiting her mother who had returned home to Arizona to continue her fight with a cancerous brain tumor after ten weeks in a hospital in California.

So, there we were sitting together, two weekends, two small towns, two churches, two vastly different experiences.

I continue to be amazed at the variety of worship experiences one can encounter at different churches, even within the same denomination.

At one church, the preaching was deliberate, scholarly, and ended with a story pertaining to the message that made all of us tear up. (We seem to visit this church each year on "stories that make the congregation cry" week.) At the other, the preaching was passionate, fast-paced, and replete with PowerPoint slides for reference and emphasis.

At one church, the lay person helping with the reading of scripture was completely familiar with the text but difficult to understand. At the other, the lay person reading spoke with a beautiful, well-modulated voice, but stumbled through the words.

At one church, prayers offered by the people mostly celebrated loved ones who were visiting, while at the other, it was anniversary week, with seven anniversaries (from eleven to 62 years) offered up.

At both churches, the organ played. At both churches, the piano played. At one church the youth group played handchimes to accompany that week's special musical offering. At the other, a vocalist sang accompanied by the piano.

I share this with you after a Parishioner came up to me during the week and, commenting on his attendance at another parish, remarked how well we do things here at St. Thomas More.

After we go to church, Gail and I often find ourselves commenting on the services, partly because I find it hard not to critique any liturgical experience—it is part of my job, after all—and partly because it helps us to differentiate between the message that God wants to give us and the trappings in which that message can become lost.

Liturgy, in this case, the action of our corporate worship, varies dramatically in type and in quality from faith community to faith community. But what does not change across the entire Christian spectrum of worship is the intent of our actions—our praise, adoration, thanksgiving, and petition directed toward God—as a response to God's gift of his son, Jesus Christ.

two weekends, two small towns, two churches, two different experiences

I have to be careful not to miss God speaking to me because his messenger speaks unintelligibly. Or because I was focused on techniques that would help a singer's pitch problem to the exclusion of the words that she was singing. I have to focus on the music being offered and not wonder when they are going to have the piano tuned. I have to sit still in expectation and prayer and not be concerned if the altar server will notice that one of the candles has been extinguished accidentally.

Whether visiting one church or the other, at Gail's church or at St. Thomas More, God calls us to focus and figure it out:

"Be still, and know that I am God!" (Psalm 46:10)

Yes, we may "do things well" at St. Thomas More—I give thanks for the various liturgical and other ministers that make it so—but it is critically important for us to get out of the way, for us to remember to whom our worship is directed, and for us to listen, carefully, for God's still, small voice, even when that voice may be slightly garbled.



This year, Catechetical Sunday, September 20, focuses on the theme, "Catechesis and the Proclamation of the Word."
