Perseverance

If you are interested in the works of Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, a Jesuit priest and a paleontologist who died in the 1950s, I would encourage you to read his book, *Letters from a Traveller*. It is a compilation of his correspondence to a variety of people. The book is out of print, but copies can be found in used bookstores.

Fr. Pierre was raised in France and spent much of his life in China. He was a scientist and a mystic who attempted to create a theology that united science and Christianity within the framework of the Catholic Faith.

During his lifetime he wrote a number of books. All his writing was prohibited from being published by the Catholic Church because his theology was considered "unorthodox." Pierre Teilhard de Chardin struggled with this prohibition all his life, but he remained a faithful priest and member of the Church and abided by this order.

Only after his death, were his books published! He knew that someday there would be a time and a place for his ideas. In the last 40 years his writings continue to gain much popularity and provide much in helping people to once again look at God and the



universe with a sense of awe and mystery rather than a sense of dread and fear.

His works include: The Phenomenon of Man, The Future of Man, The Divine Milieu, and Hymn of the Universe.

Knowing this about his life, these words of his on perseverance written to a friend in France, take on even more meaning: "Never give up: try to attack it from another angle, the correct angle—where success is in proportion not to the extension of the individual but to

the constancy in the effort to make the world around God less harsh and more human. If the pressure of events can induce you to make the mental sacrifice of every personal ambition in favor of a higher duty, I am convinced that you can reach a degree of emancipation and clearness of vision in relation to the external world, far greater than you imagine. One must contrive to preserve a real appetite for life and action whilst at the same time renouncing any desire for personal happiness. Therein lies the secret—and not illusion—of living in the 'Divine Milieu.'"

Lifeline Screening Comes to St. Thomas More on Monday, September 28

Have you suffered a broken bone in your hip or spine? Do you feel as if you are getting shorter? If you answer "yes" to either of these questions, you may want to consider being screened for the risk of osteoporosis. We are pleased to offer a Life Line Screening preventive health event that can be used to detect just such a risk. TOUCHED AND TREMBLING Scripture Themes for October 2009

Relationships can be the blessing or the bugaboo of human existence. On the one hand, a relationship with another person can open a new way of being, where two people become one and each complements the other in a marital union that completes both. On the other hand, relationships and the mutual responsibilities that are inherent in sharing life together can prove to be a burden that becomes untenable (Oct. 4). Similarly, relationships can bring blessings into the lives of those who love and care for one another as brothers and sisters on life's journey.

However, if fellow travelers begin to look upon one another as "the competition" rather than as companions, difficulties arise. Even Jesus' first disciples were susceptible to a certain degree of ambitiousness. Each wanted to enjoy seniority over the others and to enjoy the "perks" that their authority would bring (Oct. 11). Some among Jesus' early followers, although sincere and earnest in their desire to belong to him, found it very difficult to value that relationship and its demands above their fondness for wealth and security (Oct. 11).

Even today, the responsibility involved in a relationship with Jesus challenges his disciples; on any given day, the same relationship can be a blessing as well as a bugaboo.

Nevertheless, relationships form the heart and soul of who we are. They are as essential to our health and holiness as breathing. Even before we draw a breath, each of us has been conceived within the mind and heart of a compassionate God who chose to relate to us as loving Parent, as sacrificing Sibling, and as the very Breath of life.

From our origins within the triune relationship who is God, we are called forth into life; we are conceived and born into a family, and these family bonds will form the matrix from which will grow all our other relationships in life. Author Frederick Buechner is fond of comparing these relationships to a spider web: "If you touch it anywhere, you set the whole thing trembling. ... As we move around this world... the life that I touch for good or for ill will touch another life, and that in turn another, until who knows where the trembling stops or in what far place and time my touch will be felt. Our lives are linked forever" (*The Hungering Dark*, Seabury Press, 1969).

As one who chose to go forth from the serenity of the divine "web" in order to immerse himself in the vast network of relationships that connect all of humankind, Jesus has much to teach us about

touching and trembling. Jesus modeled for his disciples a wisdom derived from the profound and penetrating word of God (Oct. 11), touching others carefully, kindly and with a healing in his hands that made them whole. In his presence, the sick, the poor, the weak, and the marginalized were set to trembling with a sense of dignity and self-worth that gave them hope and peace (Oct. 25). He was and is willing to touch sinners in their sinfulness and to experience all the weaknesses of the weak. And so, Jesus has set the sad and the sorry to trembling with the sheer joy that comes with forgiveness and with the excited anticipation of being blessed with a new beginning (Oct. 18). Although Jesus' saving touch has made an immeasurable impact on every living length of humanity's great web, no freedoms have been compromised. On the contrary, Jesus' touch imparts the freedom to be all that God has intended for every beloved creature.

As Jesus' followers, believers have the privilege and the responsibility to extend that touch to others. Like Jesus, we must set that great web tremblingtrembling with joy, with a sense of purpose, with a desire to make things whole, with a sense of justice that will not be denied until every victim of discrimination, prejudice, hatred, and violence has been touched with reverence and right. Poet Rainer Maria Rilke has suggested that the spaces between us are as important and deserving of reverence as are the ties that bind us to one another in humanity's web: "Once the realization is accepted that even between the closest human beings, infinite distances continue to exist, a wonderful living side by side can grow up, if they succeed in loving the distance between them which makes it possible for each to see the other whole against the sky."

This month, the sacred texts gather us in to celebrate this great relational webwork within which we discover God, ourselves and one another. Touched and set to trembling by God's love and by one another, we are thereby empowered to reach out to a world so much in need of the loving touch of God.

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP Caring, Sharing, & Bearing

The affairs of God can be described in three words that rhyme: caring, sharing, and bearing.

Bearing the burden of the cost to support the work of God in this world, whether through charitable donations, raising money for a particular need, or even paying our taxes, is one way in which we carry out the affairs that God has entrusted to us.

In the second reading today, St. James once again warns against accepting the standards of the world and assuming that what is normative in society needs no countercultural challenge.

The temptation to hoard riches and make sharp bargains at the expense of the powerless is pervasive because these things are generally done and look respectable enough. St. James points to God's judgment on these attitudes and actions of amassing wealth and comfort at the expense of others.



How might we be better Christian stewards of the material blessings we have been given by God? Giving my time and money to various charities makes me feel a real part of our community.

Imagine how powerfully we could transform our neighborhood, our cities, our nation, and

our world if all of us shared an hour of our time or an hour's worth of our money, weekly or monthly. We could do serious damage to hunger, disease, sadness, loneliness, and oppression.

Already, the generosity of a small percentage does a significant number of things to alleviate many of these ills. Catholic Relief Services, St. Vincent de Paul, Catholic Community Services, and many other agencies are leading this effort. This is what inspires me about Christian Stewardship!

We have the power to change the world by working together. In doing so, we can make our neighborhoods, cities, nations, and the world a community imitating the love of Jesus.


