## Parish Advent Communal Penance Service:

"The Sacrament of Reconciliation – God's Unconditional Love for Us!"

In recent years, a name change has taken place with the "Sacrament of Confession." We no longer call the act "Confession," but rather "Reconciliation" and/or "Penance."

This name change better reflects what happens in this celebration. We do not go to the priest just to list our sins, have them forgiven, and receive a penance; but rather, and most importantly, we come to the priest to celebrate the forgiveness of God that we experience in our lives. We come to the Sacrament with a sense of joy for what God has already done in our lives and what God continues to do—showering us with unconditional love.

The verbalization of our sins, the verbalization of the words of absolution, and the acceptance of a penance are steps in the process of celebrating God's forgiveness and unconditional love for us.

If we are open to God's love, we begin to experience the many ways in which God forgives us our sins in the daily occurrences of our lives.

When we ask forgiveness from someone we have offended, our sins are forgiven. When we accept the forgiveness of another, our sins are forgiven. Each time we talk to God in the silence of our hearts and sincerely seek forgiveness from God, our sins are forgiven. Each time we celebrate the Eucharist, we hear the words of the priest shortly before the reception of Holy Communion—"Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world! Happy are we! We are called to His supper!"—our sins are forgiven.

#### **Pastor's Column** (Continued from page 1)

So why go to the priest? We do so in order to celebrate the forgiveness of God we experience in our daily lives, to ritualize it, sacramentalize it and, as in all things, to place our lives and God's involvement in our lives within the context of the Church, the Body of Christ.

The priest "stands in" for the community. As we verbalize our sins, we are mindful that there is no such thing as a personal sin. Our sins, no matter how personal we may think them to be, affect others—"No Man Is an Island." We live in community. Our lives always touch the lives of others.

Telling our sins, hearing ours sins from our own lips, helps us to be real and to acknowledge our weakness and our dependence upon God. It is so easy to rationalize our sinfulness when we talk to ourselves "in our heads." It is an entirely different experience when we hear ourselves verbalize our sinfulness. Those sins become much more real! We become much more aware and sensitive of our responsibilities to others.

The priest "stands in" for Christ. Hearing the words of absolution, the forgiveness of God, from the lips of the priest is indeed comforting. You know how wonderful it feels when a family member or friend says, "I love you!" In the Sacrament of Reconciliation we allow God to say those words to us in and through the person of the priest.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is not something to be feared but to be celebrated with trust and confidence because of God's unconditional love for us.

This weekend, on Sunday, November 29, at 4:00pm, our Parish celebrates her Advent Communal Penance Service. In this Parish celebration, a number of our young people will be celebrating this Sacrament for the first time. Your presence will also be a sign of support to them.

Many priest/confessors will be available for you. They will be in Church waiting for you so that through the words of absolution God will once again say to you:

#### "I forgive you and I love you unconditionally!"

#### THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

If asked to name their favorite story from the Bible, most Christians would probably choose something from the Gospel of Luke. These stories are indeed unforgettable, and the Christian tradition is graced by this gospel from Luke's hand.

It is the only one of the four gospels to describe the angel's annunciation of the coming birth of Jesus to Mary, and the visit of the shepherds at his birth; it is the only one to tell the parables of the Good Samaritan, of the prodigal son, and of the rich man and Lazarus; it is the only gospel to relate the story of Jesus and the disciples on the road to Emmaus after the resurrection.

that our lives will be built on the rock of the Gospel.

Gospel of Luke to around 80CE. One piece of evidence that helps with the dating is that the gospel contains nearly all of Mark, and from this we know that it was composed after 70CE (about when Mark was written).

In addition to having Mark as a source, the Gospel of Luke shares a large chunk of material with Matthew, material that appears neither in Mark nor in John. From this we assume that there was another source for Luke, one that he and the writer of Matthew used together. Luke also had a source of information that only he used.

> The evangelist Luke is also the author of the Acts of the Apostles, which is, in a sense, the second part to the gospel. This is evident from the very polished Greek of these two books, but more specifically, from the fact that both books are addressed to Theophilus, a fellow believer. (See Luke 1:3 and Acts 1:1.) Luke's contribution, therefore, makes up more than onequarter of the second testament.

> The portrait of Jesus in the Gospel of Luke is of an itinerant prophet who is

attracted to the poor and the outcast. He explains that his ministry is to them, and he envisions the heavenly banquet as filled with the poor and disenfranchised. The evangelist draws powerful portraits of despised members of the society, and much of the wonder of this compelling gospel is in its address to sinners.

We read the Gospel of Luke in Year C, which begins this week, on the First Sunday of Advent.

### Today is A Good Day to Think About **FORGIVENESS**

Today is our parish's communal celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation at 4:00pm. All Parishioners are strongly encouraged to attend, not only for our own experience of the forgiveness of our loving God, but also to bear witness and celebrate with our children who approach this Sacrament for the first time.



#### Philip Yancey concludes:

The gospel of grace begins and ends with forgiveness. And people write songs with titles like "Amazing Grace" for one reason: grace is the only force in the universe powerful enough to break the chains that enslave generations.


Helmut Thielicke, a German who lived through the horrors of Nazism (states):

This business of forgiving is by no means a simple thing. . . . We say, "Very well, if the other fellow is sorry and begs my pardon, I will forgive him, then I'll give in." We make of forgiveness a law of reciprocity. And this never works. For then both of us say to ourselves, 'The other fellow has to make the first move. And then I watch like a hawk to see whether the other person will flash a signal to me with his eyes or whether I can detect some small hint between the lines of his letter which shows that he is sorry. I am always on the point of forgiving. . .but I never forgive. I am far too just.


The only remedy, Thielicke concluded, was his realization that God had forgiven his sins and given him another chance. Breaking the cycle of ungrace means taking the initiative. Instead of waiting for his neighbor to make the first move, he must do so, defying the natural law of retribution and fairness. He did this only when he realized that God's initiative lay at the heart of the gospel he had been preaching but not practicing.



# CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP Advent Faith in Action

As we enter the season of Advent and a new liturgical calendar year, it is helpful to ask ourselves how our Christian Stewardship unites relationships with actions. Three questions can serve as directive guides to link intentions with expressions as we journey through life.

- ♦ Who is Jesus of Nazareth for you?
- **₽** Is your faith translated into actions?
- ♦ What do you want to be remembered for?

These questions can inspire us to dedicate and renew our efforts to become true disciples of Christ and good stewards in our daily lives. The month of November has given us a number of days to particularly reflect on our Christian stewardship as a way of life.

Since becoming a part of the Pastoral Staff at St. Thomas More, I have had the opportunity to witness a number of things that I never witnessed during 18 years in the banking industry, 24 years as a Jazzercise Instructor, as a wife, mother, and Christian steward. My little corner of life was certainly full, but God had other plans for me ~ a huge learning curve was in store.

One thing that particularly stands out to me is the number of funerals that take place over the course of a year. Another thing that stands out is the broad age range of our beloved members who have gone before us in death ~ from the very young to those who lived very long lives, and all ages in between.

I attend as many funerals as possible, as a sign of respect to our deceased members and to their families. While each funeral is unique, one aspect that resounds at each of them, is the lifetime of accomplishments and contributions that are recognized. Over and again, accounts are given from family members about how much our Faith Community meant to their deceased loved one. It is comforting to know how much fulfillment our friends found through their service to Jesus by way of their involvement in various ministries at St. Thomas More.



Advent provides an opportunity for us to begin again and to prepare ourselves anew for the coming of Jesus Christ. It is a time of waiting and expectation, of anticipation and preparation. We can use the coming weeks for personal prayer, growth and change in the way we live.

As we anticipate the Nativity of Jesus, we can dedicate special time toward considering our relationship with Him.

As we remember previous Advents, it is good to remember all those who have inspired us (both living and deceased) through their faith and actions.

We, too, can be memorable mentors and models to others through our demonstrations of discipleship and Christian stewardship.

- ♦ BE SURE TO COMPLETE all gifts by December 31 to qualify for tax savings on this year's tax return. Advance planning with the Parish Office is essential, since the office will be closed from December 24 at noon-January 1, 2010. Gifts received in the offertory at Masses the weekend of December 26-27 will be credited for year ending 2009.
