

Pastor's Column

"Nothing Less Than All Of You Is What I Want"

Today, January 31, 2010, marks the 35th anniversary of my Ordination to the Priesthood. I give thanks to God for the gift of my vocation and God's willingness to allow me to share in the Priesthood of Jesus Christ. I pray for continued strength as I head into "the home stretch."

I am so grateful for the Church of St. Thomas More, this Community of Faith that I have the privilege and joy to pastor.

A pastor needs to be fed, just as the flock needs to be fed. Please know that I am being fed by you, the Church of St. Thomas More! Your commitment, your desire, and your efforts to live as Disciples of Jesus, and to witness to God's Kingdom in this time and this place mean much to me. You feed me and you strengthen my commitment to be faithful to my promises and vows. Always remember that we need each other. You need a pastor, and, just as importantly, a pastor needs his community.

As I celebrate 35 years of ministry, two phrases come to mind: "permanent commitment" and "humor."

Firstly, the most important charism that is needed for our time is, I believe, "permanent commitment." There are many people in our world today who believe that people cannot make a commitment that lasts "until death." All of us, married, vowed religious, and ordained are called to give to this generation the gift of "permanent commitment."

Our young people, especially, need to see that people can make commitments that last a lifetime. That is what I have chosen to do. No matter what the problem or difficulty, I believe that, with the help of God, it can be worked out.

On January 31, 1975, in Mt. Clemens, Michigan, Bishop Thomas Gumbleton, the Auxiliary Bishop of Detroit, ordained me. I will not walk away from this commitment because I believe that this generation needs to see the charism of permanence. People can say "yes," and that "yes" can last until death.

Secondly, what has "saved" me in my ordained ministry over and over again is "humor," the ability to laugh at myself and to laugh, not at others, but with others. Our very existence is Mystery. Continually we face the unknown, and as we face the joy, the turmoil, and the tragedy of life, humor is a vital gift that sees us through.

I give thanks to God that, in these 35 years, the gift of humor has found its way into my life and ministry. So much of life is unknown, and, at times, may seem meaningless and even absurd! So, in the face of "not knowing" and consciously "living the questions," I choose to laugh, regale, and enjoy the Mystery, and to be in awe of what life places before us, knowing that God walks with us through it all.

I ask that you celebrate with me. I ask that you pray for me in a special way today. I need your prayerful support! Through your commitment to this Faith Community, help me to be a priest that is faithful until death.

These are the words of my Ordination Prayer Card. I pray this prayer often. Please pray it with your household sometime this week:

Figure walking by the waters,
along the shore
white, shining and terrible?
He looks
at me with
Knowing eyes
that hurt.
I think He sees
my every fiber

with those Eyes...
glowing

blazing probing loving

Eyes, dreadful asking eyes.

I feel that I am giving more of myself to the Lord today than I did 35 years ago, but I still have a long way to go before I am able to give the Lord everything. I encourage you to join me on the journey.

Let us pray that all of us, as Disciples of the Lord Jesus, each day, give a bit more of ourselves to Him until the transformation is total and complete!



EVERYONE HAS A STORY

Scripture Themes for February

Sixty-five years ago, a photographer using the artistic name Weegee (real name Arthur Fellig) produced a book of photo-portraits he called Naked City. With each picture, Weegee attempted to reveal something of the character and the life story of the person being photographed. Three years later, in 1948, Jules Dassin produced a black-and-white film noir of the same name. Inspired by Weegee, Dassin's production had a semi-documentary quality that carefully revealed the stories of its featured characters against a New York City backdrop. Also produced as a television series in 1958 and again in 1960, "The Naked City" concluded all of its presentations with the signature line, "There are eight million stories in the Naked City... this has been one of them."

Perhaps the popularity of these media presentations can be traced to the concept that every one of us human beings has a story to tell. That story grows and develops within the context of our own personality, our experiences, the ever-changing circumstances of our world and the manner in which we interact with others in that world. As believers, we are privileged to live out our lives and tell our stories in the midst of a community united by our shared faith in God. That faith shapes and informs our story; that faith sustains believers through the happy and the difficult chapters of their life stories. In the sacred texts for this month, we are invited to listen, to learn, and to be edified by the stories of those who

have gone before us.

On Feb. 7 and 14, Isaiah and Jeremiah will invite us into their lives by sharing the stories of their call to prophesy and the personal costliness of their response to that call. Through the sufferings that both men experienced on account of their calling, each had learned to entrust himself completely to God. From their stories, we learn that it is God who empowers our best efforts and enables us to survive our failures and those of others without losing hope.

Through Abraham's story, shared on Feb. 28, we are reminded that God's love is unconditional, as is the relationship to which God calls each of us. Like Isaiah and Jeremiah. Abraham was sure of the constancy of God's presence. As each page of his story was told, and as good mingled with bad, God was the rock to which he clung and the sure shelter where he always found a welcome. Abraham's story is particularly significant for all who look to him as their father in the faith. Through him and through Sarah, the worldwide community of Jews, Christians, and Muslims is united as one faith family. Perhaps our shared roots in Abraham will one day prompt us to mutual respect and willingness to work together to ease this world's suffering.

Paul, in each of the second readings from February, shares himself and his story with the Christians of Corinth, Rome, and Philippi. His writings affirm the fact that our own stories are woven into one great, ongoing story. While our stories are in some sense unique, they are also similar because each story is told and each life is lived out in the presence of the same God. Paul's words to the earliest Christians continue to speak to us today, reminding us of the importance of our lived faith (Feb. 21); reminding us that we are to conduct ourselves in the world as



people whose stories begin with God (Feb. 28) and who one day will find our eternal, happy-ever-after ending in God (Feb. 7, 14).

Through the Gospels of February, and as Ordinary Time evolves into Lent, the Lucan Jesus will continue our training as disciples. In the shared stories of Peter and company, we will learn that whatever good we do for God is powered by grace. Similarly, whatever weaknesses we have are opportunities through which we can allow God to rewrite our crooked storylines with the straight lines of justice and truth.

As we review our personal and collective stories this month, we are also to be mindful that the telling of our stories is an integral aspect of our worship. At every liturgical gathering, we tell our own story within the greater context of the story of our salvation. On Feb. 21, the Deuteronomist's narrative affirms our belief that the telling of our stories within the context of liturgy becomes a prayer that praises God and unites us with one another. When spoken freshly and frankly in God's presence, the stories of our sadness and suffering can be helped and healed, just as the stories of our joys and accomplishments can be shared and celebrated. There are billions of stories in this world of ours—vours is one of them, mine is another, and the God who listens to all stories will be with us on every page, through every chapter, to the end.





Dedicated and Appointed Servants

We hear today from Jeremiah that God knew him before his birth, and dedicated and appointed him to his role as prophet before he even drew his first breath.

The Lord also knows us and sends us to continue His work. This is not always the way we like to consider our choices in life. It is much easier to live for the day and the comforts we enjoy.

The following is an interesting narrative:

"Isn't this the son of Joseph?" —Luke 4:22

In his home town of Nazareth, Jesus read a passage from Isaiah that prophesied the coming of the Messiah. He then closed the scroll and claimed it had been fulfilled in their hearing.

They "all spoke highly of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth." But they instinctively realized that if Jesus, the son of Mary and Joseph, the carpenter, were truly the Messiah, he was destined to do great things. And, if he did great things, he might challenge them to do great things.

He had grown up among them and was like them. They became fearful and agitated and tried to throw him off of a high cliff at the top of the craggy hill where Nazareth is located.

From our youth we have learned about Jesus through the revealed Word of God. We have come to know him as the Messiah who did great things and who saved us by his death and resurrection.

We know he expects us to be all that God created us to be. How do we respond? Do we try to throw Jesus over a high cliff?

Or, rather, do we try to imitate Jesus and do great things?
