

(This Pastor's Column is back by popular demand!)

As we begin this Holy Week and prepare ourselves to celebrate the Feast of the Resurrection on Easter, next Sunday, I want to remind all of us that we have no excuses when it comes to worshipping our God. In the Resurrection of Jesus, God has taken away any and all excuses from us. We have no reason not to celebrate the gift of life we have been given.

God's will for us is to live life to the full, to be at peace, and to possess a sense of inner joy and direction as we make our journey of life, our pilgrimage of faith.



I would like to draw parent attention to a great resource to help you bring the Sunday Scriptures and the liturgical year into your family life. We use the internet for everyday living . . . As a family, try to find a sacred 15 minutes for family discussion before Sunday liturgy. It might make a wonderful difference in each family member's participation at Mass!

Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Read Mark 14:1-15:47.

Gospel Summary

The Passion reading in Mark's gospel is the shortest of all gospel accounts and is known for its swift impact and drama. It begins with an unnamed woman pouring expensive perfume on Jesus' head and continues through the Last Supper, Jesus and his disciples praying in Gethsemane, the arrest of Jesus, his trial, crucifixion, death and burial. Of course the disciples scattered and made no claim to Jesus. He was left alone to die a degrading death. Some women stood and watched at a distance and a Jewish man, Joseph of Arimathea, gave him a tomb.

Reflection for Families

It's human nature, even the nature of our own children, to cry out when an injustice has taken place. "I didn't do it," or "It's not my fault," are phrases that wear us thin dealing with infractions in our children's lives day after day. But don't we marvel at how much Jesus suffered without a word. He didn't argue with Pilate. He didn't even express sadness at the desertion of his disciples. In fact, he knew that Judas would betray him and Peter would deny him. Like Jesus, we hope for the best of strength and courage from our children, but things will happen in their lives where they fail. The most important lesson we can learn from Jesus is that of the unconditional love he had for his disciples. Even after they denied and deserted him, he still came to them in love and reconciliation.

Bringing the Gospel into Your Family

Throughout the Passion of Jesus, we see much suffering and disappointment. People accuse Jesus, desert him, betray him and in the end, execute him. 

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

You Are a Child of God.

Sometimes it is not easy to act like one, is it? We are ALL God's children...even those people we might intensely dislike and/or avoid or condemn.

Often challenges and frustrations enter our lives like a snowstorm out of season. Remember that God never gives us more than we can handle. Try to view challenges in a positive light, as an opportunity for growth, and discern how you can grow in Christ's love through the experience.

The ICSC, March 2010 excerpts below provide food for thought:

Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery. Now, in the law, Moses commanded us to stone such women. —John 8:1-11

Reason would lead us to conclude that if the scribes and Pharisees caught a woman "in the very act of adultery," that they also caught the man. The law required that both parties "caught in the very act of adultery" be stoned (Deut. 22:22).

But here, they only bring the woman before Jesus. Hmmm... Could the man "caught in the very act" have been an influential or high ranking public or religious official? Hmmm... It is not unusual for people to be selective in their decisions, to be quick to judge and unfair with condemnation.

Would not the world be a much better place if we all stopped judging others, at least not so quickly, and were quicker to be generous with all that God has given to us—that is, everything we are and have?

Note that Jesus does not condemn the men who wanted to stone the woman. They actually condemn themselves. The woman does not deny her sin, but Jesus does not condemn her. He tells her to sin no more. When we are judgmental and selfish, Jesus does not condemn us. But we condemn ourselves and should turn to Jesus to help us.

How will you be remembered? As one who adhered to a strict observance of the law? Or, as one who was not too quick to judge, and lovingly gave others a second chance?

Throughout our lives, we will experience many relationships, and they are *all* gifts from God. How will you be a good steward of those relationships? In Jesus' encounter with the woman caught in adultery, we are given an example of how we are to care for the people we encounter in our lives.


