Pastor's Column

What Does It Mean To Be Catholic Today?

The following is the homily of Deacon Greg Kandra delivered at the Easter Vigil at Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Church in Forest Hills, Queens, New York on April 3, 2010.

Here, and now, we are seeing the ongoing miracle of not just any story, but the Greatest Story Ever Told.

You and I are a part of it. The people who are candidates and catechumens in our church tonight, about to join our faith, they are a part of it. Over a billion people around the world are a part of it.

The statistics are staggering. In 2008, 19 million people entered the Church. That's 2,169 every hour, 36 every second. And the numbers just keep growing.

We could speculate why that's so. But ultimately, it comes to this: they are drawn by hope. It is a hope that is stronger than despair... a truth that towers over a world of falsehood...the Light of the World that scatters every darkness.

That, in all its greatness and mystery and wonder, is our faith.

Pastor's Column (continued from page 1)

I've spent the last couple of days thinking about the question a reporter was seeking to answer: What does it mean to be a Catholic today?

It means first of all, history. It is looking back across 20 centuries and remembering where we came from. And were we came from begins with the gospel we just heard, and the empty tomb, and the first bewildered witnesses who had to tell the story of what they saw. And they told others. And then they told others.

And the story goes on.

It is the story of faith on a mission: "The pilgrim church on earth." It is the story of a journey—from Jerusalem to Rome to Africa...to India and Asia and islands in the South Pacific. It is a mission that eventually brought people to America, and a place called Brooklyn.

It is about the people who made the mission happen: sisters and brothers, priests and religious and lay people by the millions who did the unsung, heroic work of building up the church, often at enormous sacrifice, sometimes paying with their lives. It is immigrants who gave spare change to build churches, and nuns who cared for the sick when no one else would, and who taught our parents and grandparents and great grandparents. It is priests who celebrated Mass in auditoriums and gymnasiums, and who walked arm in arm through the south with Martin Luther King. It is standing in solidarity with the smallest, the weakest, the defenseless, the unborn.

What does being a Catholic today mean? It is parents giving up vacations so their kids can go to Catholic school.

It's those same kids giving up their weekends to be altar servers.

It is May Processions and First Communions and fish fries and bingo. It's the crèche at Christmas, and this candle at Easter.

It's the cry of a baby being baptized. It's the gentle voice of the priest offering absolution to someone who hasn't been to confession in 20 years—and offering a chance to begin again, and to be made new. And it is silence, the thundering silence of people who come here on any given weekday to light a candle, say a rosary, and pray.

It is the thousands who crowd into this church on an ordinary Wednesday in the middle of winter to receive ashes.

It is the hundreds who came here just last night to behold the wounded, scarred face of Christ—and venerate his cross with a kiss.

It is the anonymous strangers who stop by the statue of the Blessed Mother outside the church, and leave roses, or folded scraps of paper with petitions. "Mary, pray for my son. Mary, help me find a job."

It is being the Body of Christ, continuing what he began...with love, and with gratitude, and with a sense of pride.

This is our Church. This is our faith...This is a headline the world needs to know: we are people of resurrection. Easter people. People of hope. People carrying within us, and into the world, the light of Christ.

And that is how we live out, in our own way, the Greatest Story Ever Told.

And this night—by the grace of God, with "Alleluias" in our hearts and on our lips—the story goes on...

LOOKING BACK, MOVING FORWARD

Scripture Themes for April

During the Easter season, we look back to our spiritual roots. This great movement we have come to call church began and grew and continues because of the beckoning of God and the promptings of grace. Jesus initiated this movement by ministering as a prophetic teacher who called § his contemporaries to an $rac{2}{2}$ authentic faith that would translate their relationship with God into loving service of others.

Jesus' entire life, his words and works, his innocent suffering, death, and resurrection had an immeasurable impact on his followers. Beckoned by all that God had done in Jesus, prompted by grace, they were significantly transformed, and they became ministers who allowed others to know that they, too, were beckoned and graced by God. They called themselves disciples and followers of the Way (Acts 9:2; 19:23). Only decades later would they be called church.

While the Acts of the Apostlesfrom which we will read every Sunday in April-may reflect something of the origins of the community, it does not tell the whole story. However, along with the Gospels and the letters and the Book of Revelation, it gives us a good sense of our roots. This annual contact with the story of our origins gives us the inspiration to listen for the promptings of God's grace, which help us to continue with the work of being church. It is in this capacity, as church, that we look back, in order to gain the resolve to move ahead.

Looking back will bring us into the good company of Peter and the disciples. Their behavior during Jesus' last hours was understandable but less than admirable. Yet this

month, they shine with God's forgiving grace. They aren't confused or lacking in understanding now. They aren't falling asleep, denying their knowledge of Jesus, or running off to save themselves from Jewish and Roman authorities. Their intimate encounters with their risen Lord (Apr 4, 11, 18) have emboldened them. Upon hearing his familiar voice, they recognize their Shepherd, who has given his life for their sake

(Apr 25). At his word, they are ready to go forth into the world to be fishers of all, to gather everyone into the unbroken net of salvation (Apr 18). They are ready to serve as he served, to lead as he led, and to preach before open-minded gentiles (Apr 4) as well as hostile authorities (Apr 18). Like Jesus, they cure the sick who flock to them in search of healing and wholeness (Apr 11). Like Jesus, they will be made to suffer for the sake of the Gospel (Apr 18), yet all the while they will look ahead with hope spurred on by the words of the seer John, whose visions (Revelation) will be shared each Sunday of April.

In remembering our ancestral heroes in the faith, we realize that we come from sturdy spiritual stock and are well-equipped to continue the good work that God began in them. We are also encouraged by the fact that the same Spirit whose breath enlivened and empowered them continues to blow in each of us, moving us forward with the message: God is! God lives! God loves! God forgives! God saves!

Through whatever struggles we may encounter on the way, that same Spirit will strengthen us and sustain our hope. This hope will continue to move us forward to the time beyond time when every nation, race, people, and tongue will stand before



CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP Little Things Mean a Lot

We know from the Acts of the Apostles that "Many signs and wonders were done among the people at the hands of the apostles." Little things that make a difference in another's life are most certainly "signs and wonders."

A smile or a comforting word can life someone's sagging spirit. Donations that we might consider to be small, can make a big difference in the lives of others who are undergoing hard times. Little acts of kindness, when offered with love, make for great Christian stewardship.

The following piece is food for thought on our journey:

Building Rafts

Some birds build nests right beside the water, sometimes only inches away. If there is a flood, the lake rises too high, the eggs will be chilled and won't hatch. This problem can be devastating in the case of endangered birds, such as loons, leading to dangerously low numbers of chicks being raised each year.

So scientists designed and built special rafts, covered them with cattails and other weeds, and then anchored them loosely in sheltered areas. Often, birds will use them for nesting sites. If the lake floods, these rafts will float, keeping the nests and their eggs safe from the water.

In a way, raft-building is something all stewards do. Of course, they are usually not actual rafts. However, they do help others stay out of harm's way.

Starting, running, and donating to a food pantry all help keep away the dangers of malnutrition. This is especially important for children, the sick, and the elderly.

Providing school supplies and tutoring helps keep the dangers of ignorance away. In many cases, adults need help with learning just as much as children do.

Building and repairing homes helps keep the many dangers of homelessness—crime, cold, lack of sanitation, to name just a few—away from people who because of illness, disability, or unemployment are vulnerable to being on the street.

Most importantly of all, maintaining a house of worship helps people keep the dangers of sin away from themselves. Comforting prayers, inspirational sermons, and joyous hymns can and do change lives.

The water birds never thank the scientists for the rafts.

Christian stewards may not hear thanks as often as they should, either. But the world is a better place for the birds in it, and likewise for the people who benefit from Christian stewardship.
