

#### Homily at the Easter Vigil by Diarmuid Martin, Archbishop of Dublin and Primate of Ireland

This is the fourth in a series of perspectives on the clergy sexual abuse crisis now gripping the Church. You will find previous perspectives in my April 11, April 18, and April 25 Pastor's Columns. You are encouraged to read those if you haven't yet.

The Church of Ireland is greatly suffering at this time.

The resurrection of Jesus Christ has changed human history. It enters history...as an explosion of light, light which illuminates the darkness, light which allows us to see reality as it is, light which enables us to discern the good from what is evil. Darkness already begins to be dispelled even when only one single flicker of light appears. Even one single flicker of light can be the beginning of hope within any darkness.

We remember in our prayers this evening all those for whom darkness seems impossible to overcome, for whom darkness seems unbearable and without hope. We remember those for whom the darkness of their past still haunts them. We remember those whose torment and anxiety tears away at their will to live...

As a Christian community we are called to be light in the world. We are called to be with those for whom darkness is excruciating and who see no future, no hope. Woe to a Church which hides and destroys light in people's hearts. Woe to a Church which prevents the light of Christ from appearing as it should.

Resurrection means that death has been definitively conquered. Jesus Christ entered into his passion and death *freely* out of love

for us. His death was the ultimate expression of his giving of himself. Christ's death lovingly opens the door which leads to resurrection and new life. It is love that transforms death definitively. That explosion of light which is the Resurrection tells us and reminds us even in the darkest days that there is always a future beyond darkness...

In our days there is so much scrutiny and examination of the Church. There are exposés of the failings of the Church; there is questioning of the role of the Church in society in the past and in whatever our future may be. The role of the Church is being examined under a microscope and from every possible direction. The spotlight of the media and public opinion is focused on the failures and the betrayals of Church leaders and a damaging culture which has grown up in the Church.

I am not criticizing the media for that. That is their job. In doing their job some will feel the media have been unfriendly to the Church, even unfair: others will welcome and recognize valid criticism, from whatever angle it comes, even if it comes from people patently unfavorable to the Church. We have to remember that the truth will set the Church free, even if the truth is hard to digest.

Identifying the failures of the Church may, however, be the easier task. There will be some who will hope that such exposure will mortally wound an organization which they consider has gone irreparably astray. But what of those who love the Church? How do we overcome our disgust and shame for the sins of Christians?

The sins of the Church can well be exposed by the spotlight of the media; but the Church will be converted, renewed, and reformed only when it allows the light of Christ to inspire it and guide it. It is the light of Christ which will show the real significance of the darkness that has slipped into our lives.


The light of Christ will expose the sins of Christians but the light of Christ does not abandon us naked and alone in the exposure of our shame and sin. The light of Christ heals, it leads; there is no way we can switch off or dim the light that can open the path to a new future. No generation is too sophisticated not to need the light of Christ; no generation is too sophisticated not to be able to comprehend that light and what it can bring to society...

The tomb signifies a place of death. The Resurrection brings new light. The spirit gathers us as children of the light, prepared with all our weaknesses to ensure that the message of Jesus Christ is not just transmitted abstractly to the next generation, but that the next generation will be a generation inspired by the light of Christ.

The message of the Resurrection comes to us at a moment of darkness. The message of the Resurrection comes to as a message of hope that the darkness will not prevail.

Christ is truly risen. Let us go out into life filled with joyful hope.

#### The St. Thomas More Library

In recent years, after a great beginning, and then over the years, it has been my experience, and that of the staff, that our Parish Library is more and more underutilized. Each year, fewer and fewer people take advantage of what is available. I believe that this is due to the quality libraries in our community, the accessibility of many good local bookstores, and most importantly, the ready accessibility of the internet to find the information for which one is searching.

In light of these facts, and after discussion with the Parish staff, I have decided that we will end this ministry.

The books which pertain to the various ministries of our staff members that are presently in the library will be directed to the various staff members and will be kept in their offices.

Most importantly are the books and DVD's which service our RE.A.CH program. They will be housed right outside of the office of our Faith Formation Director, Kathleen Bell.

In doing this, precious space will become available for an office for our Youth Advocate, Marc Raymundo, who begins his ministry on July 1. He will occupy the space that previously was the library. This space will give him easy access to the lower level open space where most of the activities with the youth of the Parish happen.

Our present youth ministers have never had an office or a dedicated space of their own. This is needed now as we expand our youth ministry for the Parish.

Very special thanks go to the Library stewards who, early on, dedicated a great amount of time and effort to develop and maintain the library. And to everyone who has supported the library over the years, I extend my gratitude and thanks.

#### STRETCHED BY THE SPIRIT

#### **Scripture Themes for May**

by Patricia Datchuck Sánchez and Rafael Sánchez Alonso, Celebration May 2010. With permission. Experiences of well-being punctuated by periods of struggle are inherent to the growth and development of every living organism. If an organism can develop adequate coping skills, these struggles can prove to be an impetus for it to achieve strength, stability, and a greater sense of purpose. If these challenges are not met or prove to be overwhelming, then the life of the organism is threatened with extinction. So it is with the living, breathing entity we call church.

The first believers in Jesus found themselves in a polarized world. Pax Romana notwithstanding, it was the empire versus the people living under its oppression; it was slave against free person; Jew versus gentile, man versus woman, clergy versus laity. Baptism into Christ did not automatically resolve these differences. As the sacred texts for May will affirm, the believers' process of preserving their unity in Christ while respecting their diversity was not without its challenges.

The changing complexion of the community gave rise to disagreements about its missiology. People also had differing interpretations about how the gift of salvation was to be claimed. Was Paul correct in his insistence that the cross of Christ was sufficient for the salvation of sinners who accepted its grace by faith, or were James and his party right to require that gentiles go through Moses—that is, the law, circumcision, and dietary prescriptions—before being welcomed to Christ?



# EXPOSITION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT FEAST OF ST. ROSE VENERINI

We pray...that we may live lives of service.

Was Stephen too severe in his critique of Jewish history, or was he simply urging his contemporaries to welcome a universal Messiah? Was Peter correct to accept Cornelius' hospitality and to welcome him through baptism as his brother in Christ? Or was Peter more correct when he acceded to James' authority and pushed away from the table of fellowship with gentiles? Should Paul and Barnabas have set out on their own and parted ways with those who clung to centuries-old traditions? Or were they being more sensitive to the Spirit by traveling to Jerusalem to meet with the apostles and elders in order to find a solution that would preserve the unity of the community?

To their credit, those early disciples recognized that theirs was not solely a human enterprise. On the contrary. it was grace, first in the person of Jesus and then in the abiding presence of the Spirit, that assured their stability and survival. Theirs was an organism with the clay feet of humanity, with the divine head of Jesus Christ, with the breath of the Spirit to enliven, inspire, and empower them. As their waiting for Jesus' return stretched into weeks, months, and then years, they remembered the words Jesus had spoken to them before his death (May 9, 16) and began to rely more and more on the power of the promised Spirit to teach them, to remind them, to guide them, to defend them, and to ignite their efforts with a passion they had never known. They recalled the evening when Jesus breathed that Spirit into them and the day of Pentecost when they began to realize its power at work within them (May 23). To their immense credit, they came together in the presence of the Spirit and worked out compromises that would maintain their unity. What great wisdom they showed in announcing, "It is the decision of the Holy Spirit



and of us..." (May 9).

Through the centuries, that same Spirit has been present to those who are open and discerning. At times, however, we have fixated upon our differences instead of entrusting ourselves to the Spirit who brings us together. The late Walter Burghardt lamented what he called the two camps or two mentalities of the church (Long Have I Loved You, Orbis Books, 2000). He refused to call them conservative and liberal, broad and narrow, or pre-Vatican II and Vatican II Catholics. Such labels are emotional, fighting words that fail to do justice to the situation. Rather, Burghardt chose to call them "strict" and "elastic." Strict implies rigid exactness, particularly about rules or standards. Elastic means readily stretched without essential alteration. It is the Spirit who enables believers to maintain a healthy and holy balance between strictness and elasticity: not so rigid that we can't recognize and appreciate ideas, beliefs, or spiritualities other than our own, and not so elastic that we lose our identity as Christians. Ours is to be a way of living and being that reflects our belonging to God but does not presume that God belongs solely to us.

Intrinsic to our belonging is a willingness to be stretched by the Spirit until we are able to regard all things as possible and accept that the "impossible" (such as a world without war, a married clergy, true protection for the rights of immigrants and refugees, women priests, an end to poverty, homelessness, hunger, and disease) will simply take a little more time and a lot more stretching.


