

We Are Being Forced to Our Knees

This is the fifth in a series of perspectives that I am providing on the clergy sexual abuse crisis that continues to grip the Church.

There will be a sixth perspective next week, and then on Pentecost Sunday, May 23, I will conclude this series with my own personal thoughts.

I now share with you the words of Bishop Raymond Luecker taken from a column that he wrote in 1993 entitled, "We Are Being Forced to Our Knees." Bishop Luecker, who died in 2002, was the Ordinary of the Diocese of New Ulm, Minnesota for 25 years. These were, and are, very prophetic words, considering that they were penned 17 years ago!

His words are a reminder that our Church Leadership's attention to clergy abuse was and is very uneven. There are Bishops who began to address the issue many years ago, and, for some, it is only a recent concern that they are now beginning to face.


These are difficult times for the Church that we all love...We see confusion and dissent, religious ignorance, quarreling among ourselves, decrease in attendance at Mass, people alienated and dropping out, an ever-growing shortage of priests, struggle over gender issues, and sexual misconduct.

I would like to focus on one issue: public scandals by the clergy and others in the Church, especially over the issue of sexual abuse of minors. All too often, Church Leaders have failed to recognize the nature and severity of such abuse, have simply not known what to do about it. As a consequence, response from such leaders has looked like covering up, denial. Attempts at damage control have taken the form of manipulation of the press, have resulted in lack of concern for victims, families and for parish communities. We need to acknowledge what we don't know, and apologize for acting like we did know. We are still disciples and need to be taught, need to learn. We have to acknowledge institutional sinfulness.

I believe we are being forced to our knees, forced to recognize that we are not in charge, but rather God is in charge of the Church. We are being forced to recognize that we are human. We are coming to acknowledge and admit that as a Church (not just as individuals) we have made mistakes. We have a hard time admitting this. Suppose we come to a point where through these scandals we lose all of our savings. Suppose in the process we lose power, prestige, and control. We are not perfect. We are sinful people. We can't solve all the problems. We have to live with ambiguity and gray areas. We are vessels of clay.

We will then come to recognize that we are servants. Jesus showed us how to rule by washing the feet of others. He told us that the princes of this world lord it over others, but it is not to be this way with us. We are called to be servants and to wash one another's feet. Yes, we are being called to our knees. I believe this applies especially to our Bishops, who for so long have carried the trappings of feudal lords with all the titles and dress and privileges that go along with it. It seems to me that we are being forced to recognize that we do not have much power, and that is all right. We are called to be ministers of the word, of the worship of God, and the service of others. We come before the Lord and cry out "I am alone and afraid. I am surrounded by those who hate me. Everything is gone."

We come to a point where we admit we are powerless—our lives have become unmanageable—and there is a power greater than ourselves. We come before God and cry out, "Lord, you are my God. I need you." All of us, Church Leaders and the Faithful, are called to accept the Lord as the center of our lives. I am speaking of dependence on God, daily conversion, coming before the Lord in faith and prayer, seeking mercy and forgiveness. I hope and pray that through the grace of God we will be able to respond to the present scandals in the Church, reach out in love and healing to victims, reach out in forgiveness and reconciliation to perpetrators, and come before the Lord as a community of believers to recognize our need.



Resurrection People: Boldly Facing End-of-Life Issues with Faith

Tuesday, May 11, 9:30-11:30am

The Rev. Dr. Lewis S. León, an ordained Presbyterian Minister associated with Eternal Hills Mortuary and Memorial Park in Oceanside, will engage us in conversation on end-of-life issues that every person and every family eventually faces. Dr. León has specialized in family ministries, especially for loved ones who are in grief. Many of us feel prepared to meet a crisis spiritually, but have many uncertainties and questions on the temporal aspects of terminal illness, dying with dignity, death, and burial. Ways to address our temporal needs are through advanced conversations with loved ones, advanced planning with guidance from spiritual leaders, and pre-arrangement information. Join us for thoughtful reflection and gathering of information. The Parish Bereavement Team will also be providing important information regarding preplanning funeral liturgies and steps the family needs to take when a death occurs. How prepared are you?

"Go in peace to love and serve the Lord." With those words, all the baptized are dismissed from the Eucharist. For those who were baptized at Easter, the significance of this is that it is a new dismissal. As catechumens, they were dismissed after the homily to continue being formed by the word of God and the teachings of the church. As neophytes, now they remain with the baptized and take their part in the work of the faithful: to offer intercession, praise, sacrifice, and thanksgiving to the Father. In other words, the baptized continue the work of Jesus, in whose name they pray, who is present within and among them and in the sacrament at the altar.

But the work of the baptized and the goal of Christian initiation is not completed by participating in the liturgy of the Eucharist. The Eucharist itself is not complete until those who have celebrated it return to the world from which they came to continue to offer intercession, praise, and thanksgiving through their attitudes, actions, and interactions in everyday life. The mission of Jesus was to proclaim the Good News of God's reign and to bring all people to the Father, and that is the mission into which we all are baptized.

During the Fifty Days of Easter, and for about a year, the neophytes participate in mystagogy, a Greek word that means "teaching the mysteries." The mysteries this refers to are primarily the sacraments. During this time, and throughout their lives, the neophytes and all the faithful deepen their understanding of what it means to have been



baptized and confirmed and to continue to participate in all the sacraments, particularly the Eucharist. At the end of every Mass, we are offered a small reminder that to participate in the sacraments is to take on the work and mission of Jesus.

Go in peace to love and serve the Lord. Thanks be to God.

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP City of God

Today's reading from Revelation offers a vision of the City of God, the new Jerusalem. However, the bishop's pastoral on stewardship reminds us, "that 'life to come' is in continuity with this present life through the human goods, the worthy human purposes, which people foster now."

—Stewardship by the Book, S. Hueckel

There is a saying that life is what happens while we are busy making other plans. It is natural to want everything to be perfect in life, however life doesn't always work out that way.

We are all here for a purpose. God has gifted each of us in a variety of ways and our lives should reflect how we are using those gifts and making a return, with gratitude, each day.

One hallmark of mature discipleship is realizing that we can never have it all or do it all. We *can* create a plan for what we want to do and what we would like to accomplish.

The first thing to remember is that you are the church and are living in the City of God right now!

Does this seem a bit daunting? *This is the City of God?* Life is what we make it. What are we doing to make it better? Raising our fists at the daily news doesn't make life better.

Rather than dwelling on what is wrong in life, doing what we can to make this a better place always helps our mindset and peace of mind. God smiles on this type of attitude.

The following tips from Scott Bader, Archdiocese of Seattle, are worth review and consideration:

- Don't define yourself by your possessions—someone will always have more or better possessions than you.
- There is little correlation between money and happiness—once people's basic needs are met, the correlation between money and happiness levels off dramatically.
- Being constantly and consistently grateful is one important way to make yourself happier. Dwelling on the good things in life (even things like having heat in our homes, electricity, and a warm shower) will improve your happiness level.
- \$\forall \text{ Studies show that devoting a lot of time and money to things that bring short-term happiness—eating out, shopping or expensive pastimes—won't bring long-term happiness.
- Having purpose or direction in your life is a primary way to increase your happiness.



"Our Journey Into The Future . . . Together" Phase II



Text of presentation by Bill Ipsen at all Masses the weekend of May 2, 2010

I'm Bill Ipsen, chairperson of our capital campaign. Fr. Mike has asked that I take a few minutes this weekend to give you an update on Phase II of our campaign which began in January of this year.

On the weekend of January 16-17, I was able to share with you the good news regarding the **completion** of our five-year capital campaign, "Our Journey Into The Future . . . Together" Phase I, and also announce the immediate inception of our next campaign, "Our Journey Into The Future . . . Together" Phase II.

As you may recall, Phase I of our campaign was a great success with 90% Parish participation and \$5.7 million in pledges and gifts raised as we continue toward our goal of constructing our permanent church. When we consider the economic realities of the past two years, we are justifiably pleased that Phase I of this campaign was so successful.

At that same time, I presented a fantastic opportunity that Fr. Mike was able to work out with Bishop Brom and the Diocese, to continue on our path toward construction of our permanent church. As you know, the Diocese made a one-time offer to St. Thomas More: if we are able to raise and collect \$2 million in the next two years (2010 and 2011), giving us a total of \$5 million

dollars on deposit, the Diocese will grant us a loan for the remaining balance, allowing us to begin construction immediately. This timing would also allow us to take advantage of lower construction costs and lower interest costs, which could save an additional \$500,000 to \$1 million in overall project costs.

This is a **great** opportunity, and we must do everything we can to take advantage of it. If we do not take advantage of this exception to the usual Diocesan loan guidelines, it will delay construction for years.

As Phase II of the campaign began, we started out very quickly toward our goal of \$2 million. Prior to the actual start of the campaign, we met with several groups of Parishioners who pledged over \$600,000 to get the campaign started. In the ensuing three months, thanks to the generosity of 464 of our members, we have an additional \$675,000 in pledges, which brings our current total to \$1,275,000. As of today, 46% of our Parish has accepted the challenge and has pledged 64% of our goal. We are getting close, but we are not yet there. Of equal concern is the fact that our 24 months are now down to 20 months. So today I am asking everyone in our Parish family that has not already done so to please consider

making a pledge to help us reach our goal. As you can see, with 46% participation, we cannot meet our goal of \$2 million.

In Phase I of our campaign we had 90% participation from our Parish family. If we can reach that 90% plateau again, which would mean another 440 families pledging, we should achieve our goal. Any amount that you are able to give is greatly appreciated.

Please consider this scenario: a \$1,600 pledge over 20 months would be a monthly payment of \$80, a weekly payment of \$20, and a daily payment of \$2.86—less than a Grande Frappucino at Starbucks!

Obviously, everyone's financial situation is different, and we understand that. Fr. Mike is just asking that everyone take responsibility for the building in which you and your children will be worshiping for many years to come.

> Letters are going out this week from Fr. Mike seeking your help. Please take time to read the letter, fill out the form, and return it to the Parish Office. If you are not able to give at this time, please indicate that to us. We **do** understand!

> Everyone's response is important, because in Fr. Mike's conversations with Bishop Brom, it is vital that he has a

realistic sense of where we are now and what we will be able to do.

Finally, I would like to share with you what one household has done. This household is in a position to do more, so they made an extra pledge of \$1,600 to anonymously adopt a Parish household that is not able to make a commitment at this time. Since then, an additional two anonymous gifts have been received, and this wonderful idea is gaining momentum. What a kind and generous act! If you, too, are in a position to do so, consider an extra pledge of whatever amount you are able to give. Silently and anonymously, you will adopt a Parish household that is not in a position to pledge.

The clock is ticking, and we need to move forward immediately to take advantage of this special opportunity. Bishop Brom will be with us on Sunday, October 17, at the 10:30am Mass to lead us in the celebration of our 25th anniversary. Wouldn't it be the greatest way to celebrate 25 years by hearing him say to us, "You can begin construction!"

I thank you for your support, and most importantly, ask that you continue to pray for the success of this, our most important campaign to date.
