

Principles of Dialogue

The word "polarized" is often used today to describe the reality of our world and Church. People seem to be at opposite poles on so many crucial issues.

How do we talk to one another? How do we find solutions to our problems? How do we find "common ground?"

In my homily last weekend, I encouraged hospitable conversations—conversations that take place in an environment of hospitality.

In order for us to engage in a spirit of hospitality in all of our conversations, I share with you these "Principles of Dialogue" taken from the Catholic Common Ground Initiative. These principles can help us, I believe, structure a conversation that brings people together to find common solutions to the differences that confront us.

The Principles of Dialogue

- 1. We should recognize that no single group or viewpoint in the church has a complete monopoly on the truth. While the bishops united with the Pope have been specially endowed by God with the power to preserve the true faith, they too exercise their office by taking counsel with one another and with the experience of the whole church, past and present. Solutions to the church's problems will almost inevitably emerge from a variety of sources.
- 2. We should not envision ourselves or any one part of the church a saving remnant. No group within the church should judge itself alone to be possessed of enlightenment or spurn the mass of Catholics, their leaders, or their institutions as unfaithful.

- 3. We should test all proposals for their pastoral realism and potential impact on living individuals as well as for their theological truth. Pastoral effectiveness is a responsibility of leadership.
- 4. We should presume that those with whom we differ are acting in good faith. They deserve civility, charity, and a good-faith effort to understand their concerns. We should not substitute labels, abstractions, or blanketing terms—"radical feminism," "the hierarchy," "the Vatican"—for living, complicated realities.
- 5. We should put the best possible construction on differing positions, addressing their strongest points rather than seizing upon the most vulnerable aspects in order to discredit them. We should detect the valid insights and legitimate worries that may underlie even questionable arguments.
- 6. We should be cautious in ascribing motives. We should not impugn another's love of the church and loyalty to it. We should not rush to interpret disagreements as conflicts of starkly opposing principles rather than as differences in degree or in prudential pastoral judgments about the relevant facts.
- 7. We should bring the church to engage the realities of contemporary culture, not by simple defiance or by naïve acquiescence, but acknowledging, in the fashion of Gaudiam et Spes, both our culture's valid achievements and real dangers.

Would You Like to Join JustFaith?

JustFaith provides Parishioners with an opportunity to meet together to explore biblical tradition, the historic witness of the church, Catholic social teaching, and the relationship between spirituality and justice. The main focus of the course is on domestic and international poverty with topics ranging from the scriptural background of particular care for the poor, causes of hunger, racism, violence, consumerism, sexism, and third-world issues, to name but a few.

The course is approximately 30 weeks, one two-hour session a week, beginning the week of Monday, September 13, and concluding during the week of May 9, 2011. We will not meet around holidays like Thanksgiving and Christmas.

We have groups forming on the following days of the week: Tuesday (late afternoon), Thursday (morning), Wednesday (evening), Thursday (evening).

Costs: \$140 approximately, chiefly for books and duplicated material. Some small additional costs for two retreats, one at the beginning and one at the end. You will not pay for everything at once. Assistance is available for anyone who has a hardship.

WHAT'S ON YOUR LIST?

Scripture Themes for August

In the 2008 film "The Bucket List," Rob Reiner directed Jack Nicholson and Morgan Freeman in a story about two terminally ill men who meet while they are patients undergoing treatment for lung cancer. With little time left, the unlikely pair, a bluecollar worker (Freeman) and a very wealthy tycoon (Nicholson), go on a roundthe-world trip in an effort to cross off as many entries as possible from their personal lists of things to do "before you kick the bucket." On the list are desires to "witness something truly majestic," "help a complete stranger," "find the joy in life," and "laugh until I cry," to name only a few.

As believers pray their way through the Gospels of August, we hear the Lucan Jesus call attention to the fact that we are not permanent residents on earth but pilgrims on a journey to eternity. Each of us is challenged to formulate a bucket list of our own—so that as we fulfill the items on it, we are made better prepared for that final encounter and the judgment that will decide our place (or not) in God's everlasting reign.

It is not easy to compile, prioritize, and edit a bucket list. Some of that difficulty is reflected in the Gospel for August 1, where a rich man who placed great store on the acquisition of more and more wealth had a rude awakening. Riches had been uppermost on his bucket list, but the sudden awareness that his life would soon end confronted him with the sad truth that his riches were not portable. His experience challenges Jesus' disciples to remember daily that "one's life does not consist of possessions" (Luke 12:15).

On August 8, this lesson will be continued as the Lucan Jesus instructs his disciples in the proper attitude they should have toward the passing riches of this world. Jesus

suggests that we should put almsgiving on the top of our bucket list and not expend undue energy acquiring wealth here and now as the basis of our security. By shifting the source of our security and wellbeing from riches to God, and by trusting in God enough to be generous toward the needy, even to a fault, believers will learn the detachment from earthly things that enables them to have absolute trust and faith in God. Abraham and Sarah knew such trust and faith. Traveling to an unknown destination on God's word alone had not been uppermost on their list, but they did it, and God blessed them with riches they never imagined were possible: a son and countless descendants (August 8).

In the very middle of the month, we celebrate Jesus' mother being taken home to heaven (August 15), and we are invited to leave a few blank spaces on the bucket list. As a young woman, Mary may have imagined a rather peaceful and ordinary life for herself, as someone's wife and the mother of his children. Her imaginings were turned on their ear by the angel messenger, and much to her credit, she was willing to accept God's amazing grace. Mary acquiesced to live a life she had not planned, a life that brought her pain and sorrow, tempered only by the joy and peace of doing God's will.

"Discipleship 101" continues on the 22nd and 29th of August. In the Gospels, the Lucan Jesus reminds believers that if they wish to share a life that continues with him beyond the grave, each will need more than a passing familiarity with his teachings. We are to practice our knowledge of Jesus in our humble service of others—not the occasional kowtowing that makes us look sincere for a moment, but in the truthful, continuing



acknowledgement that because I belong to him, I put the well-being of others ahead of my own. Their needs take priority over mine, and I adjust my agenda and bucket list accordingly. Jesus even went so far as to challenge his disciples to make the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind their table companions. Seek out those who cannot reciprocate, said Jesus; then you will find yourself in the company of the least ones of this world who are God's chosen.

In order to respond to these challenges, believers must be willing to edit their bucket list as often as necessary to keep to the "narrow way" of discipleship. Anyone who has passed through airport security has had to remove shoes, belt, keys, purse, bag, jacket, etc. in order to walk through a scanner. Some are subjected to the even further scrutiny of a personal or electronic search. Only by submitting are travelers able to continue their journey. In a certain sense, the narrow path that Jesus plotted requires us to undertake a similar divesture of possessions, self-will, pride, and even our dignity so that Jesus and the well-being of those he loves will remain uppermost on the bucket list that inspires our journey through life, and through death, to everlasting life.


