

Ritual As Kingdom Play

I share some thoughts from Jesuit Fr. James L. Empereur, vicar and liturgist at the San Fernando Cathedral in San Antonio that may be helpful to you in setting a context as you come to the Eucharist each week:

"Several years ago, Robert Hovda, one of America's most pastorally oriented liturgists, wrote that the liturgy is like playing at the kingdom of God. What he meant was that in the ritual enactment of liturgical celebrations we momentarily act as if the kingdom of God has arrived. Liturgy is like a rehearsal for a play. When a theatre group is in its final rehearsal it does everything—music, costumes, directions—as if it is the actual performance. Only the full audience is absent. For Hovda, that is what liturgy should be. For an hour on Sunday the Christian community is in its final dress rehearsal. In the celebration it does everything as if the kingdom of God has arrived. All barriers between sexes, classes, races, and generations are brushed away. For

this hour, presider, ministers, and congregation are united in 'playing the play.' The only difference is that the kingdom has not yet arrived, and so when the worshipers leave the place of the assembly, all those old injustices, biases, and personal enmities reemerge in their attempt to govern their lives.

What Hovda and others saw so clearly is that all authentic worship must be contextualized by the reform of sinful structures and a ministry to the poor and oppressed."

As we, the Church of St. Thomas More, gather together each week to celebrate the Eucharist may our worship be authentic. May we leave the Assembly reenergized to move in the midst of our world and society to reform sinful structures, to minister to the poor and oppressed, and to help bring about the kingdom of God for this time and place.

Would You Like to Join JustFaith?

JustFaith provides Parishioners with an opportunity to meet together to explore biblical tradition, the historic witness of the church, Catholic social teaching, and the relationship between spirituality and justice. The main focus



of the course is on domestic and international poverty with topics ranging from the scriptural background of particular care for the poor, causes of hunger, racism, violence, consumerism, sexism, and third-world issues, to name but a few.

The course is approximately 30 weeks, one two-hour session a week, beginning the week of Monday, September 13, and concluding during the week of May 9, 2011. We will not meet around holidays like Thanksgiving and Christmas.

We have groups forming on the following days of the week: Tuesday (late afternoon), Thursday (morning), Wednesday (evening), Thursday (evening).

Costs: \$140 approximately, chiefly for books and duplicated material. Some small additional costs for two retreats, one at the beginning and one at the end. You will not pay for everything at once. Assistance is available for anyone who has a hardship.

ON A PILGRIM JOURNEY WITH HOPE AND HARMONY



A few weeks ago, I returned from five days spent with 2,000 of my closest musical and liturgical friends at the annual conference of the National Association of Pastoral Musicians (NPM). We gathered to pray and sing, to learn and listen, and to re-connect and refresh.

We reveled in our community, thanked God for our differences in styles and gifts, and hoped for a future of new growth as we continue upon the Church's liturgical journey.

Along with twelve pounds of new sheet music for our congregation and music ensembles, I brought back both affirmation that we are doing things well liturgically and guidance for our future from some of the best minds in the business.

The convention was titled *Hope & Harmony*, acknowledging that times are difficult in the Church and in the world, and that we are called through our music, our liturgy, our Christian lives to be beacons of hope for the people of this world.

It was an inspiring week!

Sr. Kathleen Hughes, RSCJ, a former national provincial for her order and our keynote speaker, pointed us toward Peter's response to the conflicts and divisions in Church and in society in his First Letter (3:15):

Always be ready to give an account of the hope that is within you.

She encouraged us to think, study, and pray about our participation in liturgy, asking God's assistance to embrace our role as part of the assembly, avoiding the easy path of superficial participation, and so allow the liturgy to energize us that we might announce hope in our world and recommit ourselves to the obligations of justice and love that Christian discipleship requires.

Steven Janco, director of the Rensselaer Program of Church Music and Liturgy at St. Joseph's College, reminded us that our mission of hope requires that we overcome our differences. In the music arena, this can mean finding ways for our liturgies and music to honor the past, embrace the present, and encourage the new that awaits us in the future.

John Witvliet, director of the Calvin Institute of Christian Worship, charged us to dispel the dichotomy of "ritual" versus "passion" in our ministries. He noted that these opposing approaches are at the heart of the Catholic versus Protestant divide, with Protestants finding Catholic worship overly structured and Catholics finding Protestant worship (especially the evangelicals) too unrestricted. In his view, the two approaches are mutually supporting, and the greatest passion for God can occur within ritualistic moments, if (!) we are fully enveloped in the ritual.

And finally, Melissa Musick Nussbaum, author of books and contributor to the National Catholic Reporter, explored the pilgrim journey that we undertake each Sunday—priest and people together on a journey toward God. Pilgrimages are rarely in a straight line, and pilgrimages take time to complete.

So, off we go! Where are we going? I'm not too sure. What direction will the path take? We'll see when we get there. How can we, all together, overcome the obstacles set before us? By walking forward. Together.


To achieve harmony in our community and our world, we must have hope. And we must be ready to give an account of that hope that dwells within us!



In the Book of Jeremiah we encounter a very human prophet, and a God who is alarmingly alive. Jeremiah makes it clear that no one chooses to fall into the hands of such a God. You are chosen, you resist, you resort to rage and bitterness and, finally, you succumb to the God who has given you your identity in the first place.

One monk said he was glad to be reading Jeremiah in the morning, and not at evening prayer, when there are more likely to be guests. "The monks can take it, he said, "but most people have no idea what's in the Bible, and they come unglued."

Dear Parents,

Do you have a child between the ages of 3 and 17 attending public school?

We call it a "partnership" because we do not want to take over the responsibility of educating your child in the Catholic faith, but we do want to be a support and resource for you, as you fulfill the commitment you made when your child was baptized.



Daily living of our Catholic faith definitely takes place in the home and neighborhood within the context of the family. A systematic approach to the teachings of our faith, as outlined in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, and a sharing in the riches and tradition of our Church, are sometimes a little more challenging for parents to undertake effectively along with all other parental responsibilities.

RE.A.CH (Religious Education for Adolescents & Children) classes begin in September, but we really want to get everyone registered now so that we can have enough catechists available. Classes fill on a first come, first serve basis.

Our programs meet two times a month, September through May, at the following times:

Ages 3, 4, & 5: 2 Sundays a month during the 10:30am Mass

Grades 1-8: 2 Sundays a month, 12:30-2:00pm

Grades 1-8 (2nd option): 2 Sundays a month, 5:00-6:30pm

High School: Modular schedule on Sundays, 6:30-8:30pm

Christian Stewardship Mirrors and Windows

Mirrors and windows are both found in most homes and both made of glass, but differ in one very important way. Mirrors tell us about ourselves, while windows tell us about others.

Look into a mirror for even one minute, and you're almost guaranteed to see something you don't like. It may be a crooked hair part (easily fixable with a comb) or a need to lose weight (not so easy, even with a gym membership), but our appearances are so important to us that we're likely to at least want to improve what we can.

Windows are different. Through a window, we see the world around us. If we look long enough, we may see something or someone that needs help. It may be the lawn of a shut-in that needs mowing. It may be a new neighbor we could invite to church. Maybe it's only a can lying in the gutter, which we could drop in our recycling bin.

The question is, do we actually do any of these things?

If we all spent more time looking through windows instead of at mirrors, we could make the world a much better place.

We hear in today's first reading about the danger of vanity. Even in the old testament, people were warned to beware of vanity in all forms.

Then in the Gospel, we are reminded that we don't own anything here on earth. It is all on loan from God and we are told to be good stewards (managers) of God's gifts.



God gifted us with our talents and we are to use them wisely until Christ returns to hold us accountable. The Holy Spirit is our guide and we are smart to constantly listen to the messages that are sent our way in a variety of forms.

As part of their total stewardship, Christians are concerned about the

dedication of their talents. They regard personal abilities to work and to lead as another evidence of God's loving care.

In a spirit of consecration, they desire to have those talents utilized in business, in the home, in church, in such a manner that they will make a contribution to the Kingdom of God on earth. These priorities are important to them, including during the summer months.

You may have a talent sitting inside your heart that you can use to serve your church. Discover what the Holy Spirit is calling you to do with that ability!
