Where Are the Other Nine?

Whenever I begin feeling like it is time to throw myself a pity party, I go to the New Testament and read today's Gospel—Luke 17:11-19, the healing of the ten lepers.

All of us, from time to time, begin to feel weighed down with doubt, with a certain amount of despair, with feelings of being unwanted or under-appreciated.

We can find ourselves saying, "All that I have done for my family, for the Church, for my friends, for civic organizations, etc. and no one seems to notice. No one has offered a 'Thank You' for all that I have done. Why should I bother? Why should I continue in trying to do good? Why should I be making these sacrifices on behalf of the Gospel?"

The questions continue and the feelings of resentment build, and we find ourselves saying, "Woe is me!"

As Disciples of the Lord Jesus, we live the Gospel and we attempt to do the right things simply because they are the right things to do. Our sense of fulfillment should be in doing the right thing, not in getting recognition and reward for doing the right thing.

That was the point of last Sunday's Gospel as Jesus said to his Disciples (and to us), "So should it be with you. When you have done all you have been commanded, say 'We are unprofitable servants; we have done what we were obliged to do.""

We have been given the gift of faith, and as we live out this faith in our daily lives in service to our brothers and sisters, we are giving thanks to God for this gift. The living out of our faith on a daily basis is about gratitude to God, not about looking for a reward!

When we are looking for rewards, we will always be disappointed. Yes, we are human beings. Being thanked, being recognized feels good when it happens. But we should not live the Gospel with that expectation. When it does happen, we should view it as "icing on the cake."

When we need to be reminded of that, we should reflect on today's Gospel. Jesus heals ten lepers, but only one returns to say "Thank you." Jesus received a 10% return for his good work!

If Jesus only received a 10% return, should we expect more? I doubt it!

May the Eucharist on which we feast this Sunday strengthen us to keep doing the right things, simply because they are the right things to do.

Let's not look for rewards and recognition, but when there is that 10% return, let's make sure that we praise God!

CHARACTERS TO REMEMBER AND EMULATE

Scripture Themes for October

Years ago, each issue of *Reader's Digest* included a piece called "My Most Unforgettable Character," in which various contributors shared their experiences of someone who had made a difference in their lives. Some of those featured were known personally by the contributing authors; others were persons they had come to admire only from afar but who nevertheless had made an impact so remarkable that it begged to be shared.

Most of us also have had the chance to meet and to know similarly unforgettable characters who have entered into our lives, for a little or a long while, and who in their leavetaking have left indelible footprints that have helped us to find our way.

In this month's sacred texts, the praying assembly is introduced or reintroduced to several memorable characters, all of whom have experiences to share and wisdom to offer to those who welcome them into their hearts. These characters will speak to us from both sides of the Christ-event, hoping that their unique chapter in our shared story of salvation will enable us to learn from their missteps and to emulate the moments in which grace enabled them to shine.

Moses shines on Oct. 17 with his example of complete reliance on God. His hands upraised in prayer attest to this trust. Even though the odds were not in his favor, he entrusted his own and Israel's future to God without question. Despite the courage Moses showed against the Amalekites, he had not come willingly to the dance of discipleship.

Nor did Habakkuk (Oct 3), who, according to a tradition preserved in Daniel (14:32ff), had to be carried by the hair of his head to the place where he was to serve God. In those instances when God's challenges leave us wanting to run kicking and screaming away from the struggle, Moses and Habakkuk encourage our perseverance and courage.

At least 11 of this month's unforgettable characters were lepers (Oct. 10); their illness numbered them among the living dead for whom there was no hope, no future, no place at the communal table. Nevertheless, they speak to us of God's penchant for making the weak, the sick, the disadvantaged, and the outcasts the special venues for revealing the love and the caring that we are to emulate. It is those in whom the divine image seems most difficult to discern that God is so wonderfully and powerfully present. Remembering the experience of those ancient lepers reminds us that our own illnesses, whether they be physical, mental, spiritual, or emotional, can be an opportunity for us to learn to lean on God. Healing may come or not. Either way, in sickness and in health, God, who knows every beat of our heart and every ache, is not restricted by visiting hours. Always present, always powerful is God.

On Oct. 17, the Lucan Jesus shares the story of the widow whose perseverance won her justice. Though she is unnamed, her character is well-defined. She was irrepressible in a world that considered her of no account. Her tenacity inspires others to take hold of a principle, however unpopular or controversial, and refuse to let it go until truth and justice prevail. How might she have pleaded the cause of the unborn? The undocumented immigrant? The poor? Do you think she would have kept quiet about the abuses perpetrated on the helpless? From her, we learn that no situation is so hopeless that it cannot be reversed by the strength of a good person who refuses to give up. Her strength is an example of the tenacity with which believers are to find



support for their efforts in prayer and grace.

The tax collector Zacchaeus was also tenacious in a seemingly hopeless circumstance (Oct. 31). Curiosity led him to seek out Jesus, but the grace of conversion empowered him to change. Zacchaeus is held forth as living testimony that no matter how far one has traveled in the wrong direction, the way home to God is hastened and eased by the sure promise of loving forgiveness. Zacchaeus continues to be a memorable character for believers, not because he collected taxes, was short, or climbed a tree, but because he recognized that Jesus could turn his life around. This same grace continues to be available to us all.

Memorable for different reasons are the two who are featured in Jesus' parable on Oct. 24. They were an odd couple, these two on whose prayer we have eavesdropped through the centuries—one arrogant, one humble: they remind us of our better and lesser selves. None of us is all pride or all humility, but we are a sorry mixture of the two. Too often we inform God of how great and deserving we are; too seldom do we hang back in repentance and allow God's good mercies to make us clean and new. Nevertheless, we are God's beloved. The memorable characters in whose experience we share this month remind us to be just who we are before God so that God can lead us into clearer truth, truer goodness and ever deeper love.



If it costs something worthwhile, then the investment is clearly a weighed and weighty one.

A new sense of commitment through giving (and the trust it represents) is crucial to us all, not because of the dollars represented, but because it will be a creative conversion movement for your Church and for you.






