Pastor's Column

Gratitude—the Heart of Discipleship

We have been called by name. Our God, through Jesus, the Son, has embraced us, and desires to enter into friendship with us, a friendship that is a deep, intimate relationship that lasts for eternity:

I no longer call you slaves, because a slave does not know what his master is doing. I have called you friends, because I have told you everything I have heard from my Father. It was not you who chose me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain, so that whatever you ask the Father in my name he may give you. This I command you: love one another.

—John 16:15-17

AT A CROSSROADS

Scripture Themes for November

world of ours where a person can savor the experience of standing at a crossroads. In Uganda, for example, travelers on the road between Masaka and Kampala can stop at a certain point and stand straddling the equator, with one foot in the northern and the other in the southern hemisphere. Travelers to Turkey can have a similar experience in Istanbul, where a sign on a bridge across the Bosporus indicates the demarcation between the Eastern and the Western world, between Asia and Europe.

There are several places in this

Those who sail the Pacific will traverse the imaginary marker called the International Date Line. Immediately to the west of this line that sits at 180 degrees longitude, the date is always one day ahead of the date immediately to the east of the date line. Traveling east, one "loses" a day; going west, one "gains" a day.

In North America, a similar "separation" is produced by the Continental Divide that runs from northwestern Canada along the coast of the Rocky Mountains to New Mexico, where it then follows the crest of Mexico's Sierra Madre on into South America along the Andes. This line divides the flow of water from rivers, rain, and snow, such that water on the east of the divide flows to the Atlantic, while precipitation on the west heads toward the Pacific.


Some of these crossroads, whether they be geographical or chronological, are quite dramatic; others are less so, but all offer a sense of the importance of those times and places in our lives that demand a decisive response. Do I go east or west? Forward or backward? To the left or to the right?

In a certain sense, the praying assembly has arrived together, yet

again, at what could be called a crossroads in our individual and collective lives. One liturgical year is waning and another is looming on the chronological horizon, bringing with it both perils and possibilities. As we stand at this crossroads, the sacred texts create an ambience that reminds us of the unrelenting and irretrievable passage of time as well as the manner in which our lives are to punctuate and demarcate our share of that time. Rather than cling to the passing year, we are to let it go, and with it, to relinquish the regrets and guilt and sadnesses that burden us as we mourn what might have been. Here in this crossroads between one year and the next, the sacred authors arouse our hope as they direct our attention outward, upward, and onward toward what is yet to be. They awaken in us a renewed sense of God's gift of time and of our responsibility to use that time wisely and well.

To illustrate the importance of being careful stewards of time, Baptist pastor Robert G. Lee once proposed that if you had a bank that daily credited your account with \$86,400 and canceled whatever amount you had failed to use by the end of the day, what would you do? Draw out every cent, of course. Well, each of us has such a bank. Its name is time. Every morning, our account is credited with 86,400 seconds. Each night, it counts as a loss whatever has not been invested to good purpose. No balances are carried; there are no overdrafts. Each night, the records are burned, and the next day, time opens a new account. If we fail to use the day's "deposits," the loss is ours; at a loss also are all those who could have somehow benefited from our time.

Despite our awareness of its preciousness, it is often difficult to evoke a sense of urgency regarding our use of this gift. With each Douglas Lynn Director of Liturgy and Music douglasl@stmoside.org; 760-758-4100 x140



passing day, week, month, year, we become a little less attentive, a little less sharp. For that reason, the sacred texts and the authors who bring them to us call out to us each year at this chronological and spiritual crossroads. Their messages are mixed. Some speak of the suffering that is inherent in discipleship; others look beyond the suffering to the risen glory we will share when our time here is spent. Others remind us of the heroes of both testaments who have sanctified their time and ours by their sacrificial deaths. Through their blood, the seed of our faith is fed and strengthened.

While most of us will not be called to suffer in the same manner as Jesus, Paul, or the brothers Maccabee and their mother, all of us are obliged to offer who we are and what we have in the time allotted to us. To that end, at the chronological crossroads of this month, Isaiah offers an agenda most worthy of our time. Let us together accept his challenge: to allow God to instruct us so that we may walk together in the light. 

Your \$2 donation is appreciated to help cover the cost of the book. They are available today at the Faith Formation Table, or on the lower level of the Parish Center during the week.


Sunday Missals

Stewardship & Development

Christian Stewardship ~ *Giving, Receiving, or Both?*

Stewardship for most of us means giving. But I want to talk about receiving. I would like each of us to reflect for a moment on how much we receive in our daily lives and where it all comes from.

Sure, we can say that we have our jobs, families, clothes, food, and friends because we work hard for them. If I didn't get up and put in a good day's work, I wouldn't have a job and wouldn't be able to afford my apartment, clothes, or food. What I receive I could say is due to my own hard work.

This perspective reminds me of the opening scene in the musical *Shenandoah*. The father is sitting around the dinner table with his children and just before they begin to eat, he says: "Lord, we cleared this land. We plowed it and sowed it. We fought off the bugs and the worms and the varmints. We harvested and then we cooked our harvest. Lord, there wouldn't be a thing on this table if we hadn't done it ourselves, but we thank you just the same anyway, Lord, for this food we're about to eat. Amen."

Sometimes we, too, honestly feel that everything we have is due to our own sweat and tears, but just to be sure, we give the Lord a quick thank you. We don't really stop long enough in our busy lives to think about where it all comes from. Is it really our own making? Doesn't God have something, somehow to do with it?

The answer is obvious. Our talents, our abilities, our very existence is a gift from God, a gift that is given freely.

In Chronicles, David makes it very plain where our blessings really come from: "Yours O Lord is the greatness and the power and the glory and the victory and the majesty, for all that is in the heavens and the earth is yours. Both riches and honor come from you and you rule over all. All things come from you Lord."

Some things, granted, we earn by hard work and careful planning, but life and breath is a gift from God. We've done nothing to earn it. The most important thing we have, our very being, is a gift.

Luke tells us: "Everyone to whom much is given, much will be required." I used to think that meant that those who had a lot of money should give a lot to help others and that all who had great talents would be more accountable than those who had none.



I didn't worry, because I had neither great talents nor great wealth. But that's all wrong because the gifts that we all have from God are great. While I won't sing in the choir and my church does not expect me to underwrite their million dollar debt it doesn't mean that service isn't expected of me and each of us.

We are accountable to God for how we use His gifts, no matter how small we feel they are. We were created to use all we have in fellowship with God. It is not a matter of earning our salvation, but of putting God in the center where God belongs.

Sharing is not just about talent and money, but also involves the sharing of love, friendship, and concern. We need to share all of these with people inside and outside the church. That's what stewardship is all about. —*M. Boeth, Parish Stewardship 11/10 with permission*
