### Gifts of the Magi

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany. This day celebrates the manifestation of the infant Jesus as the one given by God not just to and for the Jews but for the entire human race. The celebration of Epiphany actually predates the celebration of Christmas by several hundred years.

The astrologers who have traveled from the East are non-Jews and the "intelligentsia" of that day and time. Yet, they find their way to Bethlehem and to the "babe wrapped in swaddling clothes" and along with poor Jewish shepherds worship the One sent by God.

These "Wise Men" offer gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, gifts that already in this infancy narrative (Matthew 2) foretell who this Jesus is and what will happen to him.

GOLD is the gift given to royalty. He is King and God!

The Hebrew word for incense is derived from a verb meaning "to cause to smoke" and is used to denote the smoke from a sacrifice burnt on the altar (1 Samuel 2:15-16; Psalms 66:15). There were two types of incense; one consisted entirely of frankincense (Leviticus 2:1,15) and was used in conjunction with certain meal offerings.

The incense of FRANKINCENSE together with a handful of fine flour mixed with oil was offered on the outer altar of the sanctuary. Frankincense was also an ingredient of the offering of the showbread (Leviticus 24:7). This Jesus will be sacrificed and will be offered up on our behalf and is bread for us!

The use of scents and ointments was very necessary in the primitive hygienic conditions of the ancient world. In private life,

perfumes and spices were used as ingredients in perfumed oils, ointments, and powders, for cosmetic purposes, to protect the skin from the heat of the sun and the dry air, and in medicine. No less important was the role they played in the religious rituals of the ancient Near East.

MYRRH was one of the most important perfumes in biblical times. It was used in the preparation of the oil with which kings were anointed (Exodus 30:23-24). It was a precious gift and much used by women (Proverbs 7:17; Esther 2:12; Song of Songs 4:14). Together with aloes it was used in preparing Jesus' body for burial (John 19:39).

Myrrh is extracted by means of incisions in the bark of a small tree that grows in tropical Africa and Arabia.

This Jesus who is King, God, and "Bread For Us" will be sacrificed and will die for us!

On this Feast of the Epiphany, we celebrate the manifestation of Jesus to the world as God's gift of love to us. In the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, God shows us how completely we are loved: "In this way the love of God was revealed to us: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might have life through him. In this is love: not that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as expiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also must love one another." (1 John 4:9-11)

The gift given to us is meant to be shared with others!

Hello from St. Paul Minnesota! For those of you who don't know who I am, my name is Kyle Schanzenbach, I'm 19 years old and I'm on a Youth Ministry Program called NET (National Evangelization Teams), which works all over the country and in different parts of the world as well.

NET this year has ten teams. Seven teams travel throughout the country doing ministry work for young people, mostly putting on retreats. Two of the teams are stationed in Parishes that request them, specifically for the youth of that Parish. They do Relational Ministry, which means that the team runs all the youth events at a particular Parish, and the goal is to teach the Parish how to run the Youth Program by itself over the course of three years. The two teams are stationed in Hastings and Lakeville, Minnesota, not thirty minutes from St. Paul.

The Home Team, which is the team I am on this year, is very much like a traveling team, usually going to nearby states like Kentucky, South Dakota, Wisconsin, as well as serving the NET Center in West St. Paul for events such as the Gathering and Lifeline. However, this year the Home Team is also piloting two new programs for NET Ministries. Every week, four members of the Home Team travel to Providence Academy, a Catholic Elementary, Middle, and High School for young people. The school requested a NET Team to come in and show the youth that our faith isn't just a subject, it's something we all need to live out in our daily lives. Meanwhile, the other ten members of the Home Team, in addition to their regular duties, are also piloting the other new program, NET Nights. These are Youth Groups that meet once a month at St. Michael Parish in St. Cloud, Minnesota, which is about an hour and a half away from St. Paul.

Each member of the team has a different job that helps the team life and retreats run smoothly. A normal Traveling or Parish Team has 10-12 jobs. The Home Team, however, has around 36 jobs to pass around to everyone, since we run everything on our weekend retreats at the NET Center. For example, my job when we are at the NET Center is to make sure all the sound equipment is working and that it is all set up for Retreats and Lifelines. This year I am actually the Drama Leader, which second to the Team Leaders is one of the toughest jobs on the team. I have to direct and put together all the dramas that we use on Retreat. I love it, I love my Team, and I love God!

The King Tut Exhibition is in Denver. My grandson's first grade class is learning about the boy king, who was entombed in a solid-gold coffin weighing nearly 250 pounds. Forget the gold. Luc likes the scarabs found near the coffin because he likes saying "dung beetle." Poop and bugs; it doesn't get any better than that.

I remember taking our son Andrew to see an exhibit on Aztec life when he was Luc's age. I read the commentary printed alongside each picture or diorama or artifact while Andrew watched and wondered.

A few days later, I walked into Andrew's room. He had built a Legoblock tower, a pyramid with a flat top, from which he was pushing a Lego-block man down the step-like side and onto the floor.

"What are you doing?" I asked. "Playing human sacrifice," he answered.

To this day, what Andrew remembers about the trip to the museum in Denver is the "very cool" exhibit depicting an Aztec priest removing the still-beating heart of the sacrificial victim and then sending the body over the side of the temple/pyramid.

Besides the jasper and carnelian "dung beetles," Luc is hoping to see the toy boat his teacher told him archaeologists found in Tut's tomb. It is a toy boat for a boy king, a royal toy for a royal child, the trappings of a life that would continue, in station and rank, unchanged into the next.

Luc tells me, "He has a toy boat because they believe in the afterlife."

Luc is enchanted by the promise of not just everlasting life, but everlasting toys. Me, too.

I think of the bumper-sticker creed "He who dies with the most toys wins," and I think of my own faithfulness in its service.

Still, I feel the need to state what I believe, if not necessarily practice. I say, "We believe in the afterlife, too. We call it heaven. But we don't believe that kings here will be kings in heaven. We believe that a person can be very poor on earth, can have no house or car or food, and be so filled with God's love, so filled with faith in God, that in heaven her true wealth will be revealed. She will be like a queen, but a queen because of how much she *loved*, not how much she *had*."

I cannot promise celestial Legos. I see the disappointment on Luc's face. He's thinking of King Tut, who, though he had to die, still got to keep the toy boat.

I am a veteran of these conversations. I know that Luc, like all the small children in my care, has not mastered the playbook. He speaks simply of what he wants and loves, and, in first grade, they are mostly the same thing.

I have as many desires as Luc, but, unlike Luc, I am fluent in pious talk. I know how to turn the fully equipped candy-apple-red SUV into a "safe car for driving my mother on her errands." Airbags and backup monitors, get it?

I think of how we delight in Matthew's account of the magi kneeling before the child king Jesus. But it isn't the kneeling, really, it's the gifts, and the way our own excess has been grandfathered in by the helpful Easterners. They come bringing royal gifts for a royal child.

In our family crèche, the porcelain gold, frankincense, and myrrh are



glued into the porcelain hands of the visitors. Try to knock off one of the gifts and a hand would likely follow. They're inseparable.

I stand at the crèche and wonder if anyone brought a gift for a human child. Because I hope Jesus did love his toys. I hope he delighted in a spinning top or a toy boat.

Still, however much the child Jesus loves his toys, he leaves them behind. He leaves behind every material possession, even his clothes. And there is nothing in the Gospels to suggest Jesus notices that he is naked, and should, like Adam hiding from God, be ashamed. The gamblers playing for his cloak take notice of the clothing, but Jesus does not.

It is clear that Jesus neither needs nor desires a Tut-like solid-gold coffin or gold sandals for his dead feet. He sees, and seeks, something else, something beyond money, beyond position, beyond caste and class.

I want that something, too. Or, at least, I want to want it. I suspect the "childish things" Saint Paul says he learned to put away are all the toys we want to carry around with us through this life and the next. It is January. The needles on the tree are drying. The magi have reached their places next to the little family. The freshly chalked Epiphany blessing is above the front door. We sense—and the church knows—that it is time to move forward, from the crib, toward the cross.


