were no shortcuts to this gift! It simply took 50 years to create the gift!"

There are no easy routes and shortcuts with Gospel living. Jesus demonstrated that to us with the giving of His very life. If we want to hand on good gifts, real inheritance, to our children and grandchildren, it will cost us dearly. It will cost us in our efforts to be faithful and to be committed to the promises we make to each other.

There are many people in our world today who believe that lifetime commitments are not possible or that they are not needed.

Our Faith teaches us otherwise. Our God is the Faithful Lover. We are reminded of this over and over again in the Scriptures. Yahweh says through Moses and His prophets, "I am your God. You are my people, and I shall be with you always."

The basis of our Faith is that God has chosen us, each and every one of us, to live in covenant with Him. Our God is the God who never walks away from us, who is always there for us, no matter how many times we may walk away from God. The God who loves us unconditionally is the God who calls us each day to live in covenant with God.

As married persons, as vowed religious, as single people living and awaiting God's promises in our lives, we are called to be faithful to one another, day in and day out—as God is faithful to us.

The most needed charism in this new millennium, I believe, is the charism of permanence—the belief that we can make covenants with one another as God has made with us; that we can be faithful to one another, unconditionally, as God has been faithful to us—in life, until death, into eternity.

The most needed charism for this new millennium is the charism of permanence. As a People of Faith, let us imitate our God and give this gift to our families, friends, and world. This gift of permanence, for which we are willing to sacrifice until death, does bring peace, stability, and security to the next generation!

Can we, and with God's help, are we willing to say to those around us, as our God says to us, "I am your spouse, your lover, your friend, your parent, your sibling, your child, and you are my 'people.' I will ALWAYS be with you?"

Let us pray for each other as we continue to "permanentize" our relationships.

SHOULD YOU SING?

Third in a three-part series from the National Association of Pastoral Musicians © 2002

The answer, obviously, is yes. God gave us voices with which to sing. We may not ever have had the chance to develop those voices, but they are God's gift. People who study music have learned that there are very few people who cannot sing. They may not be able to sing the melody, but they are usually singing in harmony with it, in some way. Very few people who can hear and speak are truly tone-deaf. Those who do not have a voice to singthose who are also unable to speak-still participate in the congregation's song. If we sing well, if we sing out strongly, they will feel the sound vibrations through their

bodies. Those w ho have because bodies and sound interpreted minds.

hearing impairments also participate in the song this way. In fact, when we are in the middle of a singing congregation, all of us participate in the song in this same way, our are designed to feel receive waves, which are then our ears and our

Singing is too important to be left to the cantor, the choir, or other song leaders. Their job is to invite us into the song, to invite us to use this great gift of song to get our faith into our blood and our bones and our hearts and our minds. Singing is the first and most fundamental act of worship, the first ritual act that we can do. Singing—chanting—was the way the Scriptures were first proclaimed in the church; it was the first way that the Eucharistic Prayer was prayed, and it is the best way to pray it today, according to the Roman Missal.A11 congregational responses were sung for a thousand years, and we have been encouraged for nearly a century, by popes and bishops, to return to that practice.

Singing the liturgy is so important that it is the one ritual act included in every description of the heavenly liturgy by the author of the Book of Revelation. There, at the end of the New Testament, this final book of

the Bible gives us images of the liturgy of saints and angels. We read about the living creatures w h o sing without ceasing: "Holy, holy, holy." We are given a picture of the twentyfour elders gathered around the throne of God. singing: "You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honor and power..." We

learn that the prayers of the saints take the form of song to Christ the Lamb: "Worthy is the Lamb that was slain..." The prayers of the whole creation reach heaven in the form of song: "To the one seated on the throne and to the Lamb / be blessing and honor and glory and might / for ever and ever. Amen!"

Christian Stewardship Beholding the Sacred in our Lives

Stop for a moment. Take a look around you. What do you see that you can describe as sacred? You may first see obvious things such as a bible, a favorite rosary that was blessed, the inside of a church. What about the sacred you encounter every day of your life that may not immediately strike you as being sacred? What about nature, the rhythm of your day, the fruits of your labors, the person who is standing next to you?

The ancient and traditional notion of the sacred was tied up with the notion of blessing, but not as we generally understand the concept. In ancient Hebrew times something was blessed and made holy when one acknowledged to God that he had provided it as his most purposeful and personal gift.

Thus, one praised and blessed God for this gift. When the rain was not just some natural phenomenon, but God's watering of the earth to make it fruitful, then it became holy for the steward of the harvest.

But if one took things and people for granted and simply thought of them as random objects or events that occurred in the course of time with no personal affection or concern associated with them, then they were considered profane, unblessed.

Christian Stewardship gives us a lifetime of ongoing insight into the awe-inspiring gifts that God has given to us, the people, the things, the events in our lives. What is sacred is what we have come to discover as God's gift.

We have a lifetime of blessing not when we receive new things, but when we notice that they have been there all the time. Good stewards constantly thank God for these gifts and bless themselves for receiving them.

Now, look around again and thank God for the precious bounty he has laid before you.
