#### The Challenge of Faithful Citizenship

As we begin this month of October, we are mindful that it is "Respect Life" month. As Catholics, we are a people who believe in life, and the promotion and protection of life from womb to tomb. We call this stance, this perspective, being "pro-life."

In the last two years, during our nation's on-going health care reform debate, I have been amazed by the number of people who see this issue only in political terms, and not as a "pro-life" issue.

In deeper discussion with these people, they said to me that they understood that to be "pro-life" was to be "anti-abortion" and they did not realize that the Catholic Church saw being "pro-life" in a much broader perspective.

Reflecting upon their comments, it seems that because the Church has so focused on the abortion issue, and rightly so, we have lost our focus on the other life issues.

The challenge is to still be as strongly focused on being "antiabortion" while promoting and keeping focused on all the other life issues as well.

Neither major political party, Democrat or Republican, is "prolife" as the Catholic Church is "pro-life." Yet, as Catholics, we must exercise our responsibilities and duties as citizens of this country. We must take the values of the Catholic Church, and through our informed consciences, support the candidates and positions that best reflect a consistent "pro-life" ethic. This becomes an issue of conscience and not political party affiliation.

Written in 2004, yet still very timely, I share with you these "10 Questions for the Campaign" that comes to us from the Administrative Committee of the United States Conference of

Catholic Bishops in their statement, "The Challenge of Faithful Citizenship—A Catholic Call to Political Responsibility:"

- 1. After September 11, how can we build not only a safer world, but a better world—more just, more secure, more peaceful, more respectful of human life and dignity?
- 2. How will we protect the weakest in our midst—innocent unborn children? How can our nation not turn to violence to solve some of its most difficult problems—abortion to deal with difficult pregnancies; the death penalty to combat crime; euthanasia and assisted suicide to deal with the burdens of age, illness, and disability; and war to address international disputes?
- 3. How will we address the tragic fact that more than 30,000 children die every day as a result of hunger, international debt, and lack of development around the world?
- 4. How can our nation help parents raise their children with respect for life, sound moral values, a sense of hope, and an ethic of stewardship and responsibility? How can our society defend the central institution of marriage and better support families in their moral responsibilities?
- 5. How will we address the growing number of people without affordable and accessible health care? How can health care better protect human life and respect human dignity?
- 6. How will our society combat continuing prejudice, overcome hostility toward immigrants and refugees, and heal the wounds of racism, religious bigotry, and discrimination?
- 7. How will our nation pursue the values of justice and peace in a world where injustice is common, desperate poverty widespread, and peace is too often overwhelmed by violence?
- 8. What are the responsibilities and limitations of families, community organizations, markets, and government? How can these elements of society work together to overcome poverty, pursue the common good, and care for creation?
- 9. When should our nation use or avoid the use of military force—for what purpose, under what authority, and at what human cost?
- 10. How can we join with other nations to lead the world to greater respect for human life and dignity, religious freedom and democracy, economic justice and care for God's creation?

I encourage you to take time with these questions, to read them, reflect upon them, pray over them. May these help all of us to expand our vision on what it means to be "pro-life" in the Catholic spirit.

bow to it, the priest and deacon kiss it, and, if appropriate, the priest incenses the cross and the altar.

#### Sign of the Cross

The words that accompany the Sign of the Cross are inspired by Jesus' farewell and command to the disciples on the occasion of his Ascension (Mt 28:19).

#### Greeting

The Greeting signifies to the assembled community the presence of the Lord. By this greeting and the people's response, the mystery of the Church gathered together is made manifest.

#### **Introduction to the Mass**

This brief introduction can explain certain parts of the Mass, or the nature of the specific celebration.

#### Penitential Act / Kyrie

The Penitential Act has three forms which it may take, all beginning with a call to the whole community to take part, continuing with silence and a general confession, and concluding with the Priest's absolution.

Sometimes, the blessing and sprinkling of water may take place as a reminder of Baptism.

The Kyrie, an interior penitential discipline of the newly gathered people, is said after either of the first two forms of the Penitential Act and is incorporated in the third form. Originally the word "Kyrie" was probably addressed to God, not necessarily to Christ, and "eleison" was a general cry for mercy, not a specific appeal for forgiveness.


#### Gloria

The Introductory Rites take on a celebratory character on the occasions when the Gloria is sung. It is used for Sundays outside of Advent and Lent, except on the rare occasion when All Souls falls on a Sunday, and it is also used for solemnities and feasts on the calendar, and sometimes for special celebrations of a more solemn character, including ordinations, weddings, and confirmations. It is a most ancient hymn by which the Church, gathered in the Holy Spirit, glorifies and entreats God the Father and the Lamb.

#### **Collect (Opening Prayer)**

In the Collect, the priest invites the assembly to pray. After a brief silence during which the people become aware of God's presence and call to mind their intentions, he then "collects" the spoken and unspoken prayers keenly felt in our hearts and offers them to our loving God.





This is the second in a series on the Mass, a refresher course on its overall form and specific parts, reminding ourselves some of the things we may have learned some time ago.

This discussion is adapted from Paul Turner's book, At the Supper of the Lamb. Amy Florian's book. The Mass. the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, and Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship, the last two prepared by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.



#### CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP IN ACTION

Christians have an attractive idea that God has number one claim on us . . . everything we own, on everything we are. But there are many who live the opposite way, as if everything they are and own are theirs alone. "My talents and my work have gained for me this wealth, and I'm the only one who's going to say what I do with it." Who is right?

I asked Bob Barton, who works in the garage after school and on Saturdays to earn money for engineering school, which one was right. He said that, of course, "the self-made man" was. "I know how to handle tools," he said, "and believe me I'm going to climb to the top as an engineer. What I want, I get."

Then I asked Andy Newsome, who works with Bob, and Andy replied., "The way I figure it, this is God's world. God wants it to be a good world and sent his son to show us how it could be like that. If God loved me so much, I owe him my life. Now I'm trying to find out how God intends me to use it."

This answer caught Bob by surprise. He had never heard Andy speak in those terms before. The idea of owing our lives to God because God gave his son for us was "all Greek" to him; and yet Andy was so sure of himself, so certain in his conviction.

Then I asked Andy, "Have you any leads yet on the way God wants you to use your life?"

"I like science, and it seems logical to me that God would use that interest in some way. I've thought of going into research, where I could devote my talents to discovering something that would benefit people, or being a teacher, because a science teacher with Christian faith ought to be able to do a lot of good."

"But how will you know when the time comes?" asked Bob skeptically. "As far as I'm concerned, it's money that makes the world go around. So that's what I'm out to get, and I'll get all I can. I may never be a millionaire, but you won't see me starve. I know what I'm after. You don't. Which one of us is right?"

"I still think I am, Bob," was Andy's answer. "You seem to be more certain at the moment, but I'm working on it. I'm praying about it. I'll be ready when God shows me what to do."

"Maybe so," said Bob. "But it isn't the way I work. Does God have anything to say to you about how to use your abilities now? So far as I'm concerned working in this garage was certainly my own idea. Do you think God helped you get the job here?" He laughed as he thought of the burly, profane owner of the garage.

"You probably won't believe me, Bob, but I do believe that. I had a chance to work in the library for more money than Ed pays us. But I prayed about it, and God led me to take this job. I know because I've been able to help Ed's son with his chemistry, and now I've gotten him interested in our church school class. If I'd been at the library, I would never have known this family.

"Well, I'll be," said Bob. "I didn't know you were here to do missionary work. I'll steer clear of you from now on."

Andy laughed, though there was a serious ring to his voice. "Better watch out or I'll sneak up on you when you're not looking!"

NFP makes use of periodic abstinence from sexual intercourse based upon the observation of the woman's natural signs of fertility, in order to space births or to limit the number of children when there is a serious reason to do so. NFP methods require that couples learn, accept, and live with the wonders of how God made them. This is essentially different from contraception." ### Embracing the World in Prayer

In February of 1951, Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen, then national director of the Propagation of the Faith, inaugurated a World Mission Rosary. The different colored beads of each decade call to mind an area where the Church continues her evangelizing mission: *green* for the forests of *Africa; blue* for the ocean surrounding the *Islands of the Pacific*; white symbolizing *Europe*, the seat of the Holy Father, shepherd of the world; *red* calling to mind the fire of faith that brought missionaries to the *Americas*, and *yellow*, the morning light of the East, for Asia. You can pray the World Mission Rosary on-line at that web site — especially during October, the month of World Mission Sunday.



After the 1822 founding of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, which organizes the celebration of World Mission Sunday, three more mission societies would be established – two in France (the Holy Childhood Association and Society of St. Peter Apostle) and one in Italy (the Missionary Union of Priests and Religious) All four direct their efforts to reminding baptized Catholics of their vocation to be missionaries and encouraging participation in the Church's mission to bring the "Good News" of Jesus to the world.

In 1922, the four mission societies received the official title "Pontifical," and their central administration moved to Rome, Italy. Today, at the direction of the pope, these Pontifical Mission Societies continue to remind Catholics of their missionary call and seek their prayers and financial help for the Missions, not just on World Mission Sunday but throughout the year.

#### We're All Missionaries

Do you know the date of your Baptism?

Well, on that day, you became a missionary, called by our Lord to share your faith with those around you – and to be part of the Church's mission to the world.

We are not all able to travel to foreign lands as St. Francis Xavier did. However, we can all make effort

in our daily lives – through prayer and sacrifice – to support those men and women who are called to leave their homeland to preach the Good News of the Lord.

And don't forget to look around you right now to see how Jesus is coming to birth in new ways for today's world – for your world.



#### One Sunday for the Whole World

Every year, something special happens on the next-tolast Sunday of October – the Church reflects its deepest identity, as the Church in Mission.

On World Mission Sunday, Catholics of the world unite at Mass to recommit ourselves to our vocation, through Baptism, to be missionaries. The Church's missionary activity begins with the proclamation of faith: "Jesus is Lord!" He is our common hope – a hope that saves. On World Mission Sunday, we are invited to "celebrate the hope that saves" through prayer and participation in the Eucharist, and by giving generously to the collection.

As we pray and respond on World Mission Sunday here at home, we are sharing in those celebrations taking place in every parish, seminary, school and convent all over the world. Our brothers and sisters in the Missions themselves offer their prayers and sacrifices so that others may come to know Jesus!

World Mission Sunday was established by Pope Pius XI in 1926. He saw the day as a way to "foster understanding of the greatness of the missionary task, encourage zeal among the clergy and the people, and offer an opportunity to make the Society for the Propagation of the Faith ever more widely known and encourage offerings for the missions."

In a world where so much divides us, World Mission Sunday rejoices in our unity as missionaries! And it provides an opportunity to support the life-giving presence of the Church among the suffering and the poor in more than 1,150 mission dioceses.

#### A History for Celebration

On World Mission Sunday, we can also look back – just a little more than a century ago – to when we here in the United States were mission territory.

Missionaries from Europe proclaimed the Gospel and served the poor on our shores, all following the command of Jesus to "go, make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19). And the Catholics of Europe, through the newly founded Society for the Propagation of the Faith, supported the work of the Church here at home – building our churches, chapels and schools, educating our young people, and helping to form local priests, and religious Sisters and Brothers.

Back then, Pauline Jaricot, a young French laywoman, gathered workers in her family's silk factory, asking them to offer a prayer a day and a *sou* (the equivalent of a penny) a week for the Missions. From Pauline's vision came the founding of the Propagation of the Faith; its first collection, in 1822, went to support the vast diocese of Louisiana, which then extended from the Florida Keys to Canada, and the Missions of Kentucky. The remaining third went to China.

The young Church in the United States started contributing to missionary outreach as early as 1833, with our first humble gift of \$6. Today, Catholics here at home provide more than a quarter of the support sent to the world's Missions.

#### Making a World of Difference

There are gifts to bring to the celebration on World Mission Sunday.

Our greatest gift is prayer – daily prayer for the Missions and in support of those offering the poor Christ's hope and salvation.

*Financial help is also needed* for the young mission churches as they serve the poorest of our human family.

A gift of \$15 is a week's support of a young man in a mission seminary – young men like Joshua, a student at St. Thomas Aquinas Major Seminary in Nairobi, Kenya. In between studies, he and his classmates visit local hospitals to pray with the sick and dying, and reach out to the children who have been made orphans because of HIV/AIDS, reminding them that the Lord loves them.

A gift of \$20 helps to purchase a desk and books for a student in a catechetical class in a parish in the mountainous region of northern Vietnam.

A gift of \$75 provides support for religious Sisters in Zambia serving at a mission hospital there. The Franciscan Missionary Sisters of Assisi care for children with disabilities, as well as those suffering from malnutrition.

A gift of \$30 covers the cost of transporting sick children from the jungle area in Peru to one of the hospitals in the country's capital.

A gift of \$125 will help toward food, shelter, clothing, medical care and an education for one of the 45 young girls in the care of the Good Shepherd Sisters in Thailand. The Sisters also offer each girl – most rescued from human trafficking – the hope that comes from knowing the great love of Jesus.
