Pastor's Column

The Christian Reflection from the Children of Abraham Prayer Service

This is the reflection that I gave at the Children of Abraham Prayer Service on the Eve of Thanksgiving, Wednesday, November 23, 2011.

From time to time, I think about what would have happened to me if I were born a Jew or a Muslim? Now I think there may be some Jewish blood in me. My mother's family is from Poland, and her maiden name was Zacharias—a very Jewish sounding name. But I digress...

I was born a Christian, a Catholic Christian, and I became a priest. I truly believe that if I had been born a Jew, I would be a Rabbi today, and if I had been born a Muslim, I would be an Imam today.

Why? Because I was born with a yearning and longing for things spiritual, and a desire to talk about God and to encourage and help others find God and rely upon God for their journey of life.

I still remember one of the first questions of my childhood Catechism, and for me it summed up my entire existence. "Why did God make me?" "God made me, to know God, to love God, and to serve God in this world, and to be happy with God forever (Continued on page 2)

in heaven." So with this spiritual yearning, I relied upon the context into which I was born: my Catholicism.

I first learned from my parents who taught me their spirituality by teaching me their prayers, by taking me to Mass on Sundays, and by their example of right living—their love of family and neighbor. Then I continued to develop my spirituality by relying on what the Catholic religion taught me through grade school, high school, college, and seminary.

Catholicism's doctrines, pastoral practices, rituals, activities, and so on, all helped me grow in spirituality, until that time when I made a decision to be a priest. And then, the Church affirmed the call that I believed that I heard from God to be a priest, and then the Church invited me into the priesthood.

I believe that I would have followed the same kind of journey if I was born into a Jewish or Muslim context. And I would have become a Rabbi or an Imam.

My point here is that we rely upon religion, whatever that Faith Tradition may be, to help us develop, grow, and mature into spiritual beings: to see this world in a different way, to see the world through the eyes of God.

This is the purpose of all religion, the purpose of all Faith Traditions, to see the world through the eyes of God.

We gather together this evening as people of different religions, but gather together as people of a common spirituality.

We gather together as a people who look at the world through the eyes of God—a God who loves all people, and who makes no distinctions about race, color, ethnic background, educational or economic status, sexual orientation, and creed.

The clergy here with you tonight are people who practice their religions in order to become more spiritual beings.

And to become more spiritual beings, we must be a people who love and serve all people without distinction.

In the Apostle Paul's letter to the Church in Corinth, he talks about the three greatest gifts: faith, hope, and love. And he concludes that love is the greatest of gifts! He says: "If I have faith to move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing!" Think about that: faith without love is nothing. If I am a faithful Jew, a faithful Christian, or a faithful Muslim, but do not have love, it means nothing.

God is not interested in our rituals and practices if we fail to be loving people, if we fail to care for others without distinction.

It is love, the greatest gift, as Paul states that propels us beyond faith and religion and into spirituality. It is in this area of spirituality which is beyond religion where we peoples of different faiths, different traditions can meet and celebrate our existence, our diversity, and our short time on earth.

Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, a Jesuit priest who was a theologian and a scientist, once said: "We are not human beings having a spiritual experience. We are spiritual beings having a human experience."

This is how and why we gather tonight. We come together as spiritual beings to celebrate our lives and our faiths, and to recommit ourselves to love, and to building a more just, peaceful and loving world.

We know that faith, hope, love remain, these three, but the greatest of these is love!

May our time together today deepen our commitment to be lovers...lovers of God and lovers of all that God has made!

'Scuse Me While I Sing "Hallelujah"

"Messiahs" all around. So, we were singing this concert, and we—the basses—were slaloming through "For Unto Us a Child Is Born." The notes flashed by, but by some miracle, we stayed upright.

Then, we came to "And the Glory of the Lord" and we swelled with majesty. Really. Swelled. With majesty. We shouted, "Wonderful! Counselor!" And in a blaze of trumpets and drums, we roared "Hallelujah!" to kingdom come.

If you want to know why people sing in choirs, this is it. Exhibit A. For a few minutes, I'm not hedging or ducking or drenched in irony. I am pure expression.

Very occasionally, a book, a film, or a painting expresses exactly who you are. I could name a dozen pieces of music that are me. You could, too. The list is more than an inventory of music you like. It's your own trail of bread crumbs, a path that shows where you've been and, maybe, where you have yet to go.

Scientists claim that children start to prefer certain types of music by age 2. By 10 or 11, we begin paying close attention to music. In our teens, we listen to what our friends are listening to. We listen to identify with certain groups at school, or we listen in opposition to our parents. By about 18, music has imprinted on us; we know what we like.

I was 17 when I veered away from Jimi Hendrix and toward Beethoven. Try explaining that to your friends. One day I was a hippie kid mouthing "Scuse me while I kiss the sky" and the next day, it was Beethoven's "Appassionata." Suddenly, I knew who I was and what I wanted to be, for better or worse.

Talk about transference: I felt I understood every artistic decision, every impulse in the angry, noble music. Beethoven was so sure of himself. "This is me," I declared. "This is what I feel like, inside. This is what I would sound like if I were to find a voice."

I did find a voice, eventually, but it was mine, not his. It wasn't angry or noble, much to my chagrin. I wanted his anger, his powers of persuasion. That would make me a more compelling pianist, I thought. In those days I had murky dreams of a performing career, but my voice turned out to be quieter, less sure of itself, and it took me years to trust it.

At this time of year, I hear myself in Handel. The 26 sections of his "Messiah" are a hall of mirrors that show me, not so much who I am, but what I want to be, in my own inarticulate way. Or, more accurately, what I need. "Messiah" connects us to the stuff we try to suppress, the stuff that we as kids learn to censor: delight, tenderness, fear.

When I hear the ridiculous simplicity of "Comfort Ye," I think, yeah, it really is that simple. With those three little notes, we can briefly step out of the ocean of irony we all swim in and feel the power of plainness. "For Unto Us a Child Is Born," is like recess and we've been allowed to run around the yard in the fresh air. When the bass soloist proclaims "The Trumpet Shall Sound," I know, I don't just believe, there are some things worth fighting for.

As for the "Hallelujah" Chorus, when the sopranos soar over our heads, clawing higher and higher, note by note ("King! Of! Kings! And Lord! Of! Lords!"), old Handel finally cues the drums, and we stand—every man, woman, and child—on the threshold of glory.

It sounds so corny that I can barely write it, but I swear there's not an ounce of corn in Handel. Even more



than Bach, who layers his devotion in counterpoint, he trusts pure emotion. Why is that so rare? No wonder carpenters, consultants, plumbers, and real estate agents flock to sing-along "Messiahs" every December. And no wonder the darn thing remains incorruptible, from the sleekand-slim period-style versions to the great, cymbal-crashing hootenannies that have no more to do with Handel than the All-Star Game.

You can see I'm struggling, here, trying to explain what probably doesn't need explaining. Classical music is so beyond the fringe these days, I automatically adopt the salesman's pitch.

Nick Hornby, whose "High Fidelity" shows his deep affection music, says he doesn't listen to classical music because it sounds too churchy. I can't let him off the hook. Just put him in a room with "Rejoice Greatly, O Daughter of Zion," in which an ecstatic soprano leapfrogs over her own voice, and we'd have him.

See? I'm doing it again. Not trusting the music to speak for itself. Not trusting the music's clarity and power to make us feel alive. I worry that we don't trust that kind of clarity, and if we do, we don't admit it because part of our persona involves skepticism.

But when those singers swing like Diana Krall through "And the glory, the glory of the Lord, shall be re-vealed," Handel hits us again, and it's all pretty simple. Hallelujah for that.

Mike Gavin hated Christmas, not its true meaning, but the commercial aspects, including the overspending on gifts for people who really didn't need anything.

One year, Mike's son, Kevin, age 12, was wrestling on the junior high team. Shortly before Christmas, they competed against an inner-city church team. These youngsters, dressed in old sneakers and gym shorts, presented a sharp contrast to Kevin's team in their spiffy uniforms and regulation wrestling shoes. Also, the other team wrestled without headgear, which alarmed Mike's wife, Nancy.

Kevin's team easily won the match in every weight class. Mike, who loved kids, said, "I wish just one of them could have won... losing like this could take the heart right out of them."

That afternoon, Nancy bought an assortment of wrestling headgear and shoes and sent them anonymously to the inner-city church. On Christmas Eve, she placed an envelope on the tree, with a note inside telling Mike what she had done and that this was his gift from her. She reports that Mike's smile was the brightest thing about Christmas that year.

So in succeeding years, she continued this tradition, selecting various people to help in Mike's name. The envelope became the highlight of their family Christmas. Even their children looked forward to learning who was receiving Mike's gift each year.



After 10 years, Mike died of cancer. Nancy was in grief, but when Christmas came, she still placed an envelope on the tree. In the morning, she was thrilled to see three more envelopes as well, one from each of their children, who had each made a gift to someone in need on their father's behalf.


