Pastor's Column

Labor Day

This week we celebrate Labor Day, but how many of us have any idea where the holiday came from or what it celebrates?

The first Labor Day was celebrated on Tuesday, September 5, 1882, in New York City and was proposed by the Central Labor Union at a time when American workers were struggling for basic rights such as the eight-hour day.

The CLU moved the "workingman's holiday" to the first Monday in September, 1883 and urged other unions to celebrate the date as well. The movement grew throughout the 1880's with 23 states passing legislation recognizing Labor Day as a holiday. By 1894 Congress followed suit and Labor Day became a national holiday.

On that date, in 1894, most American workers still did not have an eight-hour day, the right to organize, social security, health care, or even a living wage. Child labor was common and there were no health and safety laws. Indeed, just being a unionist could get you fired or even killed in some quarters. During the Progressive era, union activism began to bring some basic reforms, but it was not until the New Deal era in the 1930's that most of the basic rights we take for granted were won. And even then, many workers in the agricultural and public sectors were left out. It was not until the 1960's that public sector workers got the right to organize at the federal level. That only became true in California's education sector in the 1970's.

For much of the 20th century, Labor Day was a real celebration of American workers with parades, picnics, and speeches dedicated to the struggles and triumphs of American unions. The meaning of the holiday has been largely erased from the public memory. People enjoy the weekends by they have forgotten or never learned about the struggles of the American Labor Movement that made our weekends even possible. We lose this history at our peril.

Little Rock Scripture Study

Wednesday, September 19 at 9:00am or Thursday, September 20 at 7:00pm we begin our 14-session study of Paul's letters to the Galatians and the Romans. These sessions are open to all who would like to spend time in a



small group growing in love for the scriptures through study and discussion.

Galatians and Romans are pivotal for those seeking to understand the faith and teaching of the Apostle Paul. Many of Paul's themes are shared by Galatians and Romans, but the tone and length of the two works differ sharply.

Galatians addresses Paul's understanding of Christian freedom and justification by faith. He reprimands the Galatians for deserting the Gospel by seeking justification through circumcision rather than through faith in Christ, who achieved our salvation by his sacrifice on the cross. Romans is the longest of Paul's letters. It addresses the universal reality of sin in the world and the need for salvation in Jesus Christ. It explores both the strength and limits of the law of Moses. Paul examines the new life attained in the Holy Spirit as God's gift and proclaims the mystery of God's plan to save Israel. Romans also highlights the ethical demands of the gospel.

HOW I BECAME A ROCK STAR HANDBELL RINGING LEGEND

I became interested in handbells when Andy and I first got married. For our first Christmas together, we went to see the San Diego Symphony. They were wonderful, but what I remember most was this group of people behind the orchestra who-get this-RANG BELLS to make music! I had never seen anything like them, I was totally engrossed as they accompanied so many of the songs alongside the rest of the symphony and then completely blown away when they played Carol of the Bells, my all time favorite Christmas song ever! It was as if the rest of the theater faded away and all I could do was hear and see this amazing group making music right in front of me. We drove home that night listening to the Carol of the Bells song from our newly purchased CD. On repeat. For the entire 36 mile return trip. My husband is a very patient man.

A few years later, we joined St. Thomas More. Back barely a month, we heard an announcement of an opening in the handbell choir and anyone interested should contact Douglas. I remember an almost urgent rush feeling and telling Andy I had to do this—I was totally paranoid all weekend. What if I didn't have what it takes to ring? What if I failed miserably at tryouts?? What if someone else called first and took "the spot"???

I didn't sleep much that Sunday night and called Douglas first thing Monday morning...straight to voicemail. I left what felt like a long rambling message as to why I was qualified—piano lessons in elementary school, color guard in

college must count for something, right?—and asked him to please call me back with information on when tryouts were. He called back that afternoon, and when I realized who was ringing through, I ran into the parking lot near my office so we could talk "in private." Douglas was wonderful...he let me continue my ramble on mv (ahem) "qualifications" and then suggested I come by that Wednesday evening to give it a try.

The rest of Monday dragged by—and my boss did ask if I got a new job offer after witnessing me run off into the parking lot to take an "urgent call" on my cell and seeing me coming back into the office with the cheesiest grin ever on my face.

Wednesday finally came and I went to my first practice half an hour early to get a feel for the bells. I remember Douglas picking up one and showing me how to ring, "You make a big "D" shape with your arm." I watched intently, trying to memorize everything he said and exactly how he did it. Then, he turned to me. "Ok, your turn." Wait...what? It was the same feeling as when the Drivers Ed instructor looks at you and tells you that it's your turn to drive. Difference between a 4000-pound auto and a 1-pound bell? Absolutely. Same look of terror on my face when I'm told it's "my turn"? Absolutely. I found my gumption, picked up the bell, moved it in the same "D" shape...and nothing. No sound. Gaa! I ring again—still nothing! Panic creeps in and Douglas calmly adjusts my hand position. Ladies and gentlemen, WE HAVE SOUND! It



rings, and I restrain myself to not call my parents to tell them, "Guess what, ma? I rang a bell! I'm in the church handbell choir!!!" Images of becoming a rock star handbell ringing legend flash through my mind. 

Labor in the Pulpits 2012

Reflections on U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Labor Day Statement 2012

by Sister Justine Church, Medical Mission Sisters

In their Labor Day Statement 2012, our Catholic Bishops remind us that America continues to struggle with a broken economy, and all that this means in terms of millions of people unemployed, underemployed, or the "working poor" who must work multiple jobs to make ends meet. In fact currently there are some 46 million people living in poverty, and worse yet, there are 16 million children who grow up poor in our nation. Moreover these men, women and children are not abstractions: they are our neighbors, friends, and parishioners; mothers and fathers, sisters and brothers; aunts, uncles, and cousins; possibly our own children!

The Bishops quote Pope Benedict XVI who reminds us that poverty is in fact a violation of the dignity of human work "because a low value is put on work and the rights that flow from it, especially the right to a just wage and to the personal security" of workers and their families (*Caritas in Veritate*, no. 63). Our broken economic system, with its lack of economic opportunities, also contributes to different forms of inequities and discriminations: wage theft, unsafe workplaces, exploitation, and even abuse. These injustices which "threaten the human dignity of vulnerable workers", put additional strains on families and their ability to participate in social, civil, political, religious and educational activities. This thinking is very much in line with the letter from James which reminds us that we must never stop looking at the perfect law which sets us free – with God's blessing. (James 1:25)

In effect, this means that the multiple forms of worker injustice that surround us "require our care and solidarity." Specifically, as the Bishops point out in their letter *Catholic Framework for Economic Life*: "By our choices, initiative, creativity, and investment, we enhance or diminish economic opportunity, community life, and social justice."

What is most radical in the Bishops' thinking, though no more radical than today's Gospel passage from Mark 7.21-23, in which Jesus tells his disciples what makes people unclean: greed, meanness, unfaithfulness, deceit, stealing, and evil thoughts, etc., is their call to every one of us to both build a more just economy and support our workers. In these times of too much poverty and too little work, we must "reflect on the moral and human dimensions" of the marketplace. We must change those policies and institutions which do not create jobs with decent working conditions and just wages. This "we" includes business, labor and government.

As a way of understanding how we are to go about this task, the Bishops suggest that Catholics review and act on the economic issues presented in *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*. In keeping with the body of Catholic social teaching begun by Pope Leo XIII, in *Rerum Novarum* (1891), they focus again and again on our inherent human dignity and the respect due workers, a notion rooted in the scriptural concept of Creation and humanity's activities in God's vineyard.

In keeping with today's realities the Bishops remind us that:

"Economic decisions and institutions should be assessed according to whether they protect or undermine the dignity of the human person. Social and economic policies should foster the creation of jobs for all who can work with decent working conditions and just wages....Catholic social teaching supports the right of workers to choose whether to organize, join a union, and bargain collectively, and to exercise these right without reprisal. It also affirms economic freedom, initiative, and the right to private property. Workers, owners, employers and unions should work together to create decent jobs, build a more just economy, and advance the common good (no. 76)."

As we all know on this Labor Day 2012, there are millions of working people and their families in our country who are in desperate need of jobs with justice and dignity. Let us not only pray for them but also join together to create a more just, equitable, and sustainable economic system that "truly honors the dignity of work and the rights of workers".
