Pastor's Column

Gifts of the Magi

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany. This day celebrates the manifestation of the infant Jesus as the one given by God not just to and for the Jews, but for the entire human race. The celebration of Epiphany actually predates the celebration of Christmas by several hundred years.

The astrologers who have traveled from the East are non-Jews and the "intelligentsia" of that day and time. Yet, they find their way to Bethlehem and to the "babe wrapped in swaddling clothes" and along with poor Jewish shepherds, worship the One sent by God.

These "Wise Men" offer gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, gifts that already in this infancy narrative (Matthew 2) foretell who this Jesus is, and what will happen to him.

GOLD is the gift given to royalty. He is King and God!

The Hebrew word for incense is derived from a verb meaning "to cause to smoke" and is used to denote the smoke from a sacrifice burnt on the altar (1 Samuel 2:15-16; Psalms 66:15). There were two types of incense; one consisted entirely of frankincense (Leviticus 2:1, 15) and was used in conjunction with certain meal offerings. The incense of FRANKINCENSE, together with a handful of fine flour mixed with oil, was offered on the outer altar of the sanctuary.

Frankincense was also an ingredient of the offering of the showbread (Leviticus 24:7). This Jesus will be sacrificed and will be offered up on our behalf and is bread for us!

The use of scents and ointments was very necessary in the primitive hygienic conditions of the ancient world. In private life, perfumes and spices were used as ingredients in perfumed oils, ointments, and powders for cosmetic purposes, to protect the skin from the heat of the sun and the dry air, and in medicine. No less important was the role they played in the religious rituals of the ancient Near East.

MYRRH was one of the most important perfumes in biblical times. It was used in the preparation of the oil with which kings were anointed (Exodus 30:23-24). It was a precious gift and much used by women (Proverbs 7:17; Esther 2:12; Song of Songs 4:14). Together with aloes it was used in preparing Jesus' body for burial (John 19:39).

Myrrh is extracted by means of incisions in the bark of a small tree that grows in tropical Africa and Arabia.

This Jesus who is King, God, and "Bread For Us" will be sacrificed and will die for us!

On this Feast of the Epiphany, we celebrate the manifestation of Jesus to the world as God's gift of love to us. In the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, God shows us how completely we are loved: "In this way the love of God was revealed to us: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might have life through him. In this is love: not that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as expiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also must love one another." (1 John 4:9-11)

The gift given to us is meant to be shared with others! Happy Epiphany!

THE ENDURING POWER OF MESSIAH

Handel's Messiah is a staple of the Christmas season, with amateur and professional choirs presenting versions all over the world. But did you know that a typical "Christmas" Messiah includes only about forty percent of the whole work—stopping well before the heavy lifting of the Gospel begins. Intrigued? To close out the holiday season, on January 12 and 13, the choir that my wife Gail and I sing in will present what I have been calling a "darn-nearcomplete" Messiah at the Center for the Arts in Escondido. Joined by a professional orchestra and four great local soloists, the Center *Chorale will be singing pretty much* the whole thing (all but one chorus and a handful of the solos). A complete Messiah is not done very often. So why are we doing it? Marie Grass Amenta, a colleague from the east, penned some really good reasons a few weeks ago:

It is my favorite time of year— Advent. In addition to the usual busyness inherent to the holidays, I am preparing to conduct the choral portions of the Rotary Club of Park Forest's Do-It-Yourself *Messiah*.

When I began blogging for our local newspaper, I said I would be writing about music and disability and not necessarily at the same time. This is an instance where the two merge.

I love *Messiah*. Truth be told, it is probably my favorite large choral work. There's a little something for everyone—show piece arias, choruses that are both difficult and poignant, recitatives that move the story along while being musically interesting. The story that is told, using scriptures from both the Old and New Testaments, can be appreciated by all.

Traditionally, it is performed during the Advent and Christmas seasons

but it is really a Lenten work, first performed and commissioned for Lent. We as choral musicians often chop it up to fit our needs. And, masterwork that it is, it adapts, no matter if we sing only the Christmas portions—plus "Hallelujah"—or the Lenten and Easter portions, or everything in between.

Conducting Messiah is always challenging, no matter who the singers are. I have markings and notes and comments in my score from both long-ago performances and more recent gigs that remind me anything can happen and often does. I have had singers and instrumentalist faint. Conducting choral portions for a "Do-It-Yourself Messiah has brought the craziest moments, with a youth symphony playing and soloists from the community. One year, I had to teach a conductor-who normally works with junior high string playershow to conduct recitatives because the "powers-that-be" wanted an instrumental conductor and not "just" a choral person, with interesting results.

Still, the text moves me. The choruses move me. The music moves me. I can be reserved and professional most of the time but some turn of phrase, some musical line will strike me and tears come to my eyes briefly as I conduct. Some moment in every performance will reach me, jaded old musician that I am, and it is like I am hearing it for the first time.

One of the recitatives always gets me, no matter who is singing, who is playing, or if I am performing or conducting. It is sung by the alto, thank goodness, and it is the recitative I didn't learn as a teenager. The text, taken from the Prophecy of Isaiah, tells what will happen when the Messiah comes:



Then shall the eyes of the blind be open'd,

And the ears of the deaf unstopped.

Then shall the lame man leap as an hart,

And the tongue of the dumb shall sing.

It so moves me, I think because it reminds me of my son, Russell, who has autism and who cannot speak. He loves music and he loves *Messiah*, having heard it every year since he was a small child. I like to think that recitative is meant for him and all the people like him. I am comforted to know, even in this great work, someone had thought enough to include this text, including those who are not often thought about. And I love it even more.


Marie Grass Amenta has taught music in public and private schools, served as director of choirs for churches, and led children's choirs in the Chicagoland area for many years. In 2006, Marie devoted her energies to forming a community chamber choir, filling a void in the Chicago Southland community. Discover your spiritual voice and become spiritually strong. High school and young adults are welcome!


College Night-Out: 7:00pm-

What is Epiphany?

Epiphany, meaning "reveal" or "to show oneself", is the day the three kings visited Jesus and acknowledged Him as our Savior. Epiphany is traditionally celebrated on January 6th – exactly 12 days after Christmas. In the United States, it is celebrated to the Sunday between January 2nd and January 8th. Tradition gives the kings the names Melchior, Balthazar and Casper. They brought with them very specific gifts to present to our Lord. Gold was – and is! - a valuable, frankincense was an expensive perfume, and myrrh was a common anointing oil.

"When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy; and going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh. And being warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed to their own country by another way." Matthew 2:10-12


Celebrate it at Home!

• Make a Kings Cake A traditional Kings Cake is made in a ring, reflecting the shape of a crown. Make an easy "cake" for your family – all you need are two pack of unbaked cinnamon rolls (the kind that come in the tube in your grocer's refrigerator section) and food coloring!

To make, open the cinnamon roll packs and divide the dough into three piles. Roll each pile into a long roll, and – once all three are rolled into a "snake" shape, braid the "snakes". Form the braid into a ring, and bake. Once it cools, open the icing included in the tube and divide it, too, into three bowls. Using the food coloring, color one with yellow (gold), white (frankincense), and brown (myrrh).

- Create Crowns Make a crown for everyone in the family! On the back of this sheet is a basic template for you to use. Cut out along the dotted lines, decorate with crayons, markers, glitter, or anything else you like. Tape the two pieces together and enjoy!
- Bless Your Home Bless your home by writing (with chalk) the year with the letters C M B ("Christus Mansionem Benedicat", or "Christ Bless This House") on the top of the doors like this: 20+C+M+B+13. The first and last two numbers reflect the current year. Fun fact: the letters C M B also represent the first initial of the kings!
- Pray Together "O God, Who by the guidance of a star didst this day reveal Thine only-begotten Son to the Gentiles, mercifully grant that we, who know Thee now by faith, may be so led as to behold with our eyes the beauty of Thy majesty. Through the same Lord Jesus Christ, Thy Son, Who lived and reigned with Thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost, God, world without end. Amen." (From the Mass of St. Pius V)
