Ministerial Leadership in the Church—Lay Ministry

In the last number of years, we have experienced great changes in ministerial leadership in the Church. The shift from priests and sisters providing the majority of service to the community to lay women and men, in the majority, ministering along with priests, deacons, and sisters has created an entirely different “face” to Parish leadership. This new “face” is very evident here at St. Thomas More.

With this in mind, I want to share some thoughts on the role of a pastor taken from Canon Law and then some thoughts on lay leadership and collaboration with clergy.

Last week I focused on the role of the pastor. This week, the focus is on lay leadership.

In a cover letter to his statement, “As One Who Serves,” which appeared in *The Tidings*, the Los Angeles Archdiocesan newspaper on September 30, 2005, Cardinal Mahoney said, “From one point of view we are facing a crisis. But the diminishing number of priestly and religious vocations has brought with it a deeper realization that it is in the nature of the Church to be given diverse gifts, ministries, and offices. At this time, we are being called to discern new modes of Parish leadership and a more participatory exercise of ministry in which lay, religious, and ordained together seek to build up the body of Christ through the charism of leadership.”

And from *Co-Workers in the Vineyard of the Lord: A Resource for Guiding the Development of Lay Ecclesial Ministry* (U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, November 2005):

Co-Workers in the Vineyard of the Lord expresses our strong desire for the fruitful collaboration of ordained and lay ministers who, in distinct but complementary ways, continue in the Church the saving mission of Christ for the world, his vineyard.

In Parishes especially, but also in other Church institutions and communities, lay women and men generously and extensively “cooperate with their pastors in the service of the ecclesial community.”

This is a sign of the Holy Spirit's movement in the lives of our sisters and brothers. We are very grateful for all who undertake various roles in Church ministry. Many do so on a limited and voluntary basis: for example, extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion, readers, cantors and choir members, catechists, pastoral council members, visitors to the sick and needy, and those who serve in programs such as sacramental preparation, youth ministry, including ministry with people with disabilities, and charity and justice.

We are blessed indeed to have such gifted and generous co-workers in the vineyard of the Lord to which we have all been called. Let us continue to work together as a “community of people united in Christ and guided by the Holy Spirit in (our) pilgrimage toward the Father's kingdom, bearers of a message for all humanity.”

WHAT REALLY MATTERS

Scripture themes for August

As we make our way through life, there are certain experiences that cause us to pause, assess, and redirect our focus and energies. The death of a dear one can be life-altering. So can a life-threatening illness or a calamity of nature. Looking death in the face often instills a sense of urgency in us, which, in turn, causes us to appreciate life more dearly and prompts us to adhere more closely to what is essential and everlasting rather than what is temporary. In the sacred texts for August, there is a similar underlying sense of urgency, as the ancient but ever-relevant authors urge us to pause, assess, and redirect our focus toward people and entities that are durable and portable unto eternity.

Qoheleth (Aug. 4) begins the month on a sober note. Seemingly frustrated by what he perceived as the futility of life, the ancient philosopher pronounces in Ecclesiastes that all is vanity or vapor. A further reading of his work reveals his conviction that there is joy to be had in this life, and it is found in God. In the Gospel, the Lucan Jesus warns his listeners that life does not consist of possessions. Therefore, we will need to adjust our goals and priorities periodically in order to keep our eyes on what really matters. This lesson will be repeated on August 11, as Jesus' followers are invited to share their worldly possessions (give alms) so as to accrue treasure in heaven.

We will be reminded by the Hebrews author on August 18 of the great cloud of witnesses who surround us and support us in our believing and belonging to Christ. With their help, we can rid ourselves of every burden and fix our eyes on Jesus. Similarly, on August 25, the Lucan Jesus will emphasize the

narrowness of the "gate" that leads to salvation. To enter through that gate, believers must be free and unencumbered. This freedom is made possible by our daily cooperation with God's gifts of grace.

To live our lives gracefully in this world, and to prepare for the forever future, it is necessary to pause here and now and assess what really matters in our lives and what does not. Jeff Cox's lesson *The Mayonnaise Jar* (Inkwell Pub. Co. Inc., Facebook) might prove helpful to prompt our pondering:

A professor stood before his philosophy class with some items in front of him. When class began, he wordlessly picked up an empty, commercial-size mayonnaise jar and filled it with golf balls. Then he asked the class if the jar was full. They agreed that it was.

Then the professor picked up a box of pebbles and poured them into the jar. He shook the jar gently and the pebbles rolled into the empty spaces between the golf balls. Again, he asked if the jar was full. They agreed that it was.

Next, the professor picked up a box of sand and poured it into the jar. After a little shake, the sand settled into the empty spaces between the golf balls and pebbles. "Is it full?" asked the professor, to which the students responded, "Yes!"

Then the professor produced two cups of coffee and poured them into the jar. All watched as the coffee was absorbed into the sand. At that, the students laughed.

"Now," said the professor, "I want you to recognize that this jar represents your life. The golf balls are the important things—God, family, children, friends, health, and

favorite passions. These are things that, even if everything else were lost and only these remained, your life would still be full. The pebbles are the things that matter, like your home, your job, your car. The sand is everything else. If you put sand in the jar first, there's no room for the pebbles or the golf balls. The same goes for life. If you spend all your time and energy on the small stuff, you will never have room for the truly important things.

"So, pay attention to the things that are critical to your happiness. Worship with your family. Play with your children. Take your partner out to dinner. Spend time with good friends. There will always be time to clean the house and fix the dripping tap. Take care of the golf balls first—the things that matter. Set your priorities. The rest is just sand."

One of the students raised her hand and asked what the coffee represented. "I'm glad you asked," said the professor. "No matter how full your life may seem, there's always room for a cup of coffee with a friend."

This modern-day parable and the parables of Jesus inspire us, as Jesus' disciples, to renew our efforts to focus on the golf balls, or the enduring entities in our lives, and allow the shifting sands to slip through our fingers.

Dear Parishioners,

I hope you enjoyed all the pictures online from Kingdom Rock! It was truly a week of transformation, not only for the children, but also for the many teens and adults involved.

This was evident to me as the children of all ages sang with us at the 10:30am Mass last Sunday. The faces of the children showed that this was not a “performance,” but witness to their confidence of standing strong on the Rock of Jesus.



Several families are core to our ministry during VBS. They work many months out of the year for the success of this week, and they do it out of love for God and the children. We are truly blest! Thank you.

When VBS began (for me) 13 years ago, I had a difficult time finding teen volunteers to be our crew leaders. They are the heart of the program, for they bring the Word of God to their small crews. This year the 32 teens needed were the first group to fill up! Many have been members of VBS for years and, having experienced God at work in their lives, look forward to sharing this with younger members.

The children have an exciting week, but it is evident it is “not just about them.” They, through their families, supported three social justice projects providing a moat full of school supplies for the children at Solutions of Change, gently-used shoes to support a new ministry beginning in our Parish, and over \$425 for “Change for Chicks.”

Through Heifer International, a flock of chicks can be purchased for a family for \$20. We supported 21 families!



A flock of chicks can help families add nourishing, life-sustaining eggs to their inadequate diets. The protein in just one egg is a nutritious gift for a hungry child. Protein-packed eggs from even a single chicken can make a life-saving difference.

Heifer helps many hungry families with a starter flock of 10 to 50 chicks. A good hen can lay up to 200 eggs a year—plenty to eat, share, or sell. With Heifer recipients’ commitment to pass on the offspring and training, the exponential impact of adding chickens to communities in poverty is truly a model that helps end hunger and poverty.

Because chickens require little space and can thrive on readily available food scraps, families can make money from the birds without spending much. And chickens help control insects and fertilize gardens.

An emphasis during VBS is becoming aware of “God-Sightings,” and there certainly were a lot of them in July!

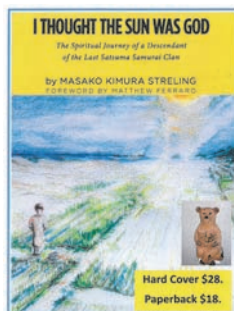
Fr. Mike’s Bookies

Christian Stewardship Spiritual Benefits of Giving

Tom Gildee broke out of a tough Baltimore neighborhood, got rich on software and retired a few years ago . . . to a full-time job giving away his money.

Somebody forgot to tell Tom he was supposed to retire to a yacht and a private island. He started spending all of his time in charitable activities, giving away several hundred thousand dollars a year, mostly for scholarships to Baltimore private schools.

Soon he was giving away \$1 million a year to help pay for 300 poor kids, from kindergarten through high school. When he dies, he plans to leave his entire estate to his Kids-R-VIP's program.



Take a look at his upbringing. Gildee grew up in a poor area of Baltimore, raised by his maternal grandmother, who stepped in after his mother abandoned him when he was five years old. His grandmother, on welfare at times, persuaded a parochial school, St. Ambrose, to accept him on a full scholarship.

Many years later he sold his company. Now it was payback time. He is giving St. Ambrose, his elementary school, \$50,000 a year for several years for scholarships. "Some donor obviously had to pay for my education," Gildee says. "I want to do the same thing for other disadvantaged kids."

This story reminds me of a good friend and dear paternal grandfather to my children. He was also abandoned by his mother at a very young age and raised by his step-grandfather on a poor farm in Missouri. Many times he slept with the pigs to keep warm, never complaining, as he grew up with a hard work ethic. His formal education ended in sixth grade, but he didn't let that stop him from working his way up in life and supporting a family with a very decent lifestyle.

To those who didn't know him well, he might have seemed a bit rough around the edges. But for those fortunate enough to know him in his lifetime, we simply called him a diamond in the rough. His heart, generosity and wisdom were as great as the sun. He celebrates his July birthday in heaven now, as we remember his life and example and try to carry on in that tradition. —Chris

AN IMPERATIVE TO SOLVE FAMILY HOMELESSNESS




