"Truly This Is a New People, and There Is Something Divine in Them"

Aristides was a second century Greek philosopher who admired the followers of Jesus and defended them in a letter addressed to Emperor Hadrian sometime around the year 120AD. Of those early believers, Aristides wrote:

Christians love one another. They never fail to help widows; they save orphans from those who would hurt them.

If one of them has something, he gives freely to the one who has nothing without boasting.

If they see a stranger, Christians take him home and are happy as though he were a real brother.

They don't consider themselves brothers in the usual sense, but brothers instead through the Spirit of God.

And if they hear that one of them is in jail or persecuted for professing the name of their redeemer, they all give him what he needs and, if possible to redeem him, they set him free.

And if there is among them any poor or naked and if they have no spare food, they fast two or three days in order to supply the needy.

They live with much care, justly and soberly as the Lord their God commanded...and they do not declare in the ears of the multitude the kind deeds they do but are careful that no one should take notice of them.

Truly this is a new people and there is something divine in them.

How do Christians live up to the spirit, attitude, and behavior of our early ancestors?

Can others look at us, and say, "They are a new people and there is something divine in them."

How do we live with and treat others: our family members, our neighbors, our co-workers in our places of employment, our classmates in our schools?

Do we attempt to bring the spirit of Christianity to our political thinking or do we allow the politics of the Left and the Right to drown out the voice of this "new people?"

Do we try with the spirit of our faith to look at issues in a new way, trying to find solutions and resolutions to societal issues?

Two monumental issues facing us as a country today are the Affordable Health Care Act and Immigration.

Are we aware of the Church's position on these issues and do we bring that voice to the public square?

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) position on health care: "In our Catholic tradition, health care is a basic human right. Access to health care should not depend on where a person works, how much a family earns, or where a person lives. Instead, every person, created in the image and

likeness of God, has a right to life and to those things necessary to sustain life, including affordable, quality health care. This teaching is rooted in the biblical call to heal the sick and to serve 'the least of these,' our concern for human life and dignity, and the principle of the common good."

Although the USCCB does not support the present Affordable Health Care Law because of abortion coverage and the lack of protection of conscience rights, it does not mean that the Church is against universal health care. That is a goal that we need to continue to work towards.

Do we bring this voice to the public square?

Where does the USCCB stand on Immigration Reform? The USCCB supports comprehensive immigration reform and a pathway to earned citizenship for the over eleven million undocumented immigrants in our midst. This teaching can be found in the USCCB document, "Strangers No Longer: Together on the Journey of Hope."

The majority of undocumented immigrants are Christian and, most probably, Catholic. Do we see them as our brothers and sisters in Christ, as members of the Body of Christ, the majority of whom only want a better life for their children and grandchildren?

Seeing them in this light can be the beginning of a new understanding and a new voice to bring to the public square.

Let us pray and work hard to live the spirit of our ancestors in faith. Let us bring a new voice to the private and public squares of our lives.

Let us be a new people and may we recognize, and may others see the divine that is within us!

Scripture themes for November

The time has come, once more, when we stand on the threshold: The year now ending fades into memory, and the year about to begin lies ahead, unknown but full of hope and promise. As is customary, several of the sacred texts this month speak sobering words about the end times, challenging us to be prepared to welcome the returning Jesus. Such

mother. We regret the office supplies we pilfered and the times we lied and called in sick when we just wanted a day off. We regret, we regret, we regret...but rather than wallow in self-loathing, we can heed the sacred texts, which invite our sincere repentance.

To inspire our efforts, Luke offers the example of Zacchaeus (Nov. 3), who not only repented of his sins but also resolved to make restitution to those he cheated and to use his half his wealth for the needs of the poor. We are also reminded of the courage we need to respond to God and to grace, consistently, so as to avoid sin. In the professions of faith of the seven brothers Maccabee and their mother (Nov. 10), we witness a faith so authentic that each was willing to than breach rather their with God. relationship When suffering comes our way because of our faith and commitment to Jesus, we are reminded of his promise to give us words and wisdom our adversaries will be powerless to refute (Nov. 17). In those times when courage fails us and we are not strong enough to resist evil, we need not lose heart. From one of the men who was crucified with our King and Brother ("Remember me, Lord, when you come into your kingdom," Nov. 24), we learn that it is never too late to reach out and be reconciled to God.

Once we have asked God and one another for forgiveness, we are then to let go of our regrets. Imagine packing a virtual suitcase. Fill it with all the guilt that has accrued over the past year. Fold up and pack away all your broken promises, your fits of anger and your resentments. Stuff in all your refusals to forgive or to ask forgiveness. Cram in every desire for revenge and every nagging doubt. When the bag is full,

words are not meant to frighten us; they are not intended as cudgels to whip us into submission. On the contrary, words concerning the end times call forth in us a heightened sensitivity to God and to grace. Such words also encourage us to grow rather than stagnate, and urge us to give ourselves seriously and wholeheartedly to the demands of discipleship.

For many of us, a glance over our shoulders at the past year may fill us with regret for the wrong we have done and the good we have failed to do. We regret harsh words and angry outbursts. We regret not reaching out to family and friends. We regret our apathy toward the needs of others. We regret the time we wasted feeling sorry for ourselves. We regret all those times we said we were too busy to help, too involved with our own interests to volunteer. We regret the gossip we spread or allowed to go unchecked. We regret the ethnic jokes, the racial slurs, the jokes we'd never tell in front of our and you have nothing else to add, zip it up and walk away. Free, forgiven and unencumbered, walk with open hands and an open heart into the year soon to begin. Let guilt be replaced by gratitude, and regrets by a resolve to love more tenderly, live more justly and walk more humbly with God through each new day. Let us welcome all who may come our way in the year ahead as gifts God has given us to be appreciated and cherished. Let us also set aside worry and fear and foreboding and walk into the unknown future with the heart of a child, trusting, open, and ready for unexpected surprises.

As our companions on the journey into the new year, the sacred texts and their authors will light our way, inspire our efforts, challenge our weakness, and encourage our faith and perseverance. As we and our fellow travelers make our way forward, let us lend one another strength and support as we witness together to the good news of salvation. All the while and all along the way, we are to be keenly aware of the ever-present overtures of the Spirit.

As we stand together on this threshold between past and future, the words of Dag Hammarskjöld seem quite appropriate: "For all that has been, thanks; for all that will be, Yes!" (*Markings*, Alfred A. Knopf, New York: 1964).


