Let Whoever Is Simple Turn in Here!

This is one of my favorite pieces of Scripture: "Let whoever is simple turn in here!" (Proverbs 9:4)

I think it would make a great message for a sign in front of our Church or any Church, for that matter!

But I wonder how many people would turn in because of it? Would more people "turn away" rather than "turn in" because they would not want to be considered "simple?"

"Simple" has a negative connotation in our world today. When we say that someone is "simple-minded," it describes a person who seems to be unable to fully cope with life; someone who has less than what is necessary to properly navigate through the waters of this life.

Yet, here is the dictionary definition of "simple": ...easy to understand, deal with, use; not elaborate or artificial; not ornate or luxurious; unaffected, unassuming, modest; not complicated.

Reflecting upon that definition, I would be happy to call myself "simple," and I would see "simplicity" as a goal worthy of achievement!

Wisdom calls: "Let whoever is simple turn in here." To the one who lacks understanding, she says, "Come, eat of my food, and drink of the wine I have mixed! Forsake foolishness that you may live; advance in the way of understanding."

This piece of Scripture tells us that if we are to enter into God's presence and to be fed and nourished by our God, we must let go of artificiality, ornateness, luxuriousness, and to experience God, we must be unaffected, unassuming, modest, and not complicated.

All of this so goes against the world in which we live! We create artificial shells in which we live, and we pride ourselves in trying to have more, be more, and do more than others. We live in an environment of competition rather than in a spirit of cooperation.

We are constantly comparing and judging others against ourselves. Material possessions, educational background, income status, titles and degrees, all seem to be the qualities by which we judge ourselves and others.

And yet, all of this is foolishness! None of it lasts. None of it is important in the eyes of our God.

All that matters is our "simplicity." Our willingness to accept life on its terms and not ours, to see ourselves as pilgrims on a journey of faith, to realize that we have come from God, and that we are making our way back to God.

"We are spiritual beings having a human experience, not human beings having a spiritual experience" (Rev. Pierre Teilhard de Chardin).

Along the way, we need to be fed and nourished, and this is what our God desires to do for us, and will do for us, if we heed the advice of Wisdom, as she speaks to us: "Let whoever is simple turn in here!"

THE RADICAL CHALLENGE OF THE GOSPEL

We listen, we ponder, we respond, we sing, we pray. Hungry for God, we are fed with the bread of the word and the bread of Jesus' body. Sent forth in peace, we witness to the world what we have seen, heard, and experienced.

But do we truly recognize and accept the radical character of the word, its message, and its challenges? Are we willing to let the word dictate and inspire our thoughts, words, and actions-or is our weekly worship nothing more than а comfortable. familiar interlude that keeps the real world at bay, if only for a little while?

Ideally, our weekly gathering should put us in touch with the truth of the Gospel and grace us with the courage and conviction we need to live that truth in the world.

This month, the challenges put forth in the sacred texts can be encapsulated in Jesus' response when he is questioned about the greatest commandment (Oct. 26). Love God with all your heart, soul, and mind, and love your neighbor as yourself. These are words that demand to be heard and heeded: these are words that describe the manner in which we are to live and relate to one another. On that same Sunday, the 30th in Ordinary Time, the authors of Exodus challenge us to treat aliens, widows, orphans, and the poor with generous care. "If they cry to me, I will hear them, says God, for I am compassionate."

How can we who profess to listen to God's commands be any less compassionate? Being generous to those in need is what makes real Jesus' challenge to love.

At the moment, there are millions of aliens, or immigrants, throughout

our world, looking for compassion. They leave their countries in search of work to feed and clothe their families. Thousands have died crossing the sea in makeshift boats. Others arrive, cold and starving, on a foreign shore only to be turned away. In the United States, those without documents are incarcerated and then deported. As a result, families are separated. Children are left without parents. It devolves upon those who live according to the radical challenges of the Gospel to be compassionate, to work for justice, and not to rest until that justice is a reality for all.

scripture themes for October

As Pope Francis has said, "A change of attitude toward migrants is needed on the part of everyone, moving away from attitudes of defensiveness and fear, indifference and marginalization...towards attitudes based on a culture of encounter, the only culture of building a better, more just, and fraternal world" (Sept. 24, 2013, Message on the World Day of Migrants and Refugees).

In the second readings for this month, Paul assumes his role as pastor of us all and urges us to express our love for God and neighbor by cultivating truth, honor, justice, and purity and allowing these realities to shine through in us (Oct. 5). Offering himself as an example, Paul challenges each of us to make the best of our circumstances. At times, we may experience abundance. At other times, we may know need. But in all we are and all we do, Jesus is our strength and our courage (Oct. 12).

On Oct. 19, Paul, Silvanus, and Timothy assure us of their prayers for us; they encourage our faith and praise us for our service, which they describe as "a labor of love." Urging us to "endure in hope," these great L'entre

disciples of Jesus also remind us that the Gospel did not come to us in word alone but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with much conviction.

On the strength of that conviction, bolstered by the sure and powerful presence of the Spirit, we can continue to realize Paul's vision for the Thessalonians (Oct. 26) and for all believers. "From you," wrote Paul, "the word of the Lord has sounded forth, not only in Macedonia and Achaia," or in Missouri and Mississippi, or in New York and California, or in France and Spain, but also in Chad and China, in Nigeria and Ukraine, in Bolivia and Brazil. Paul understood that faith is God's gift; it is also a necessary "contagion" that can spread from believer to believer. In the process, a community grows and witnesses to the world that there is a God. This God has called every human into being and blessed each with unique gifts to be used and developed for the benefit of others.

Not only that, our God desires a loving involvement with humankind, such that we are united to God and to one another in a relationship of mutual love. This brings us full circle to the radical challenge issued by Jesus. Love God fully and freely, and love one another as your very self. Could there be any better witness to the good news in a world so much in need of good news?

Update on Child Refugees

from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops Office for Migration and Refugee Services (MRS)



The response to our request for assistance has been tremendous. It is truly a testament to the good will present in so many communities that so many people are ready and willing to open their homes and as Jesus taught us "welcome the stranger".

When we were approached by DHS in June, they were concerned about the number of families that they were forced to detain because they did not have family ties in the U.S. They asked us to reach out to our networks for help and you all responded with overwhelming compassion.

Unfortunately, the Department of Homeland Security's Immigration and Customs Enforcement unit (ICE) has recently notified us *that they do not intend to release the families arriving on the southern border currently held* in their facilities. In addition, *they will be increasing the capacity of their detention facilities and expediting the deportation of these families*. This is a new policy decision that comes directly from the Administration.

As you can imagine, we are not only disappointed by the decision, but very concerned about the fate of these hundreds of families and future arrivals, which include a significant number of women and children. Several years ago, ICE detained families and the psychological impact on the families, particularly children, was devastating. So much so that, following a 2007 lawsuit, families have not been detained- until now. ICE is currently holding over 600 people at a newly opened detention center in Artesia, New Mexico and plans to begin housing families in a 600-bed detention facility in Karnes City, Texas.

As Catholics, we are not only called to show compassion and welcome the stranger, but protect family values, irrespective of one's nationality or immigration status. Detaining families is inhumane, undignified, and violates basic human rights. In addition to the moral and human rights concerns, immigrant detention has proven to be costly to taxpayers and an ineffective migration deterrent.

Here at USCCB, we will be working diligently to continue to assist detained migrants through our Alternatives to Detention Program, as well as our advocacy work. We ask that you stand in solidarity with us and also work to ensure that the most vulnerable are protected. So, while there does not appear to be an immediate need for housing, there is a clear need for advocacy on behalf of the detained families and there are likely local opportunities to assist with the families that were initially released (ICE reported that about 30,000 individuals in family units were released in the early weeks of the influx), as well as those families who are now caring for their children, nieces and nephews, etc. who arrived unaccompanied.

Here are a few things that you can do:

- **Reflect** on <u>Catholic Social Teaching on</u> <u>Migration</u>. (*http://www.justiceforimmigrants.org/ documents/immigration-and-catholic-socialteaching.pdf*) **Pray** that migrants all over the world are protect, provided with safe passages, and treated with dignity and respect.
